1. A MESSAGE FROM THE RECTOR

The Ludovika University of Public Service (Ludovika-UPS) – established in 2012 – is the flagship educational institution of Hungarian public service, with a mission that has been part of a long-standing tradition in Hungary. With its educational portfolio, Ludovika-UPS is an important regional knowledge centre for public administration, diplomacy, security and defence, military, law enforcement, water management, and many other social and economic fields related to the public sector.

With its four faculties, the Faculty of Public Governance and International Studies, the Faculty of Military Sciences and Officer Training, the Faculty of Law Enforcement, and the Faculty of Water Sciences, Ludovika-UPS educates specialists for domestic and international public administration, the National Defence Forces and the defence sphere, law enforcement agencies, as well as water specialists. The mission of the University is to train students interested in and committed to public service so as to become successful professionals with the knowledge acquired during their studies.

Talent management is provided by nine Student Colleges for Advanced Studies and the Ludovika Collegium, training future leaders for public administration. The Europe of Nations Career Program, implemented in cooperation with the Ministry of Justice, educates professionals with a high-level of knowledge in their respective policy fields, working for different European Union institutions. The Hungarian Diplomatic Academy, in cooperation with the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade, ensures high-standard theoretical and practical training for future employees of the Hungarian diplomatic services.

Ludovika-UPS also greatly contributes to the improvement of the quality of Hungarian public service. The University established a system of continuing education for public service and runs one of the largest adult e-learning as well as public administration exam systems. Every year, it organises almost three hundred thousand continuing education courses for civil service officials. The continuing education programme is also part of a professional network among European public services to exchange their knowledge and experience.

As with ensuring high-quality education, research on the one hand and the development and maintenance of its international relations on the other are key components of the mission of the University. Students have the opportunity to obtain a doctorate in four doctoral schools, in the fields of military sciences, military engineering, public administration and law enforcement. A key institution for scientific research at the University is the Eötvös József Research Centre, established in 2019. The scientific projects, conducted by renowned and experienced researchers, professors and experts, significantly increase the competitiveness of Hungarian science and the quantity and quality of strategically important research on the international scene. The work of the research institutes further strengthens the University's international relations and cooperation with other higher education and scientific institutions.



The Ludovika Campus is one of the most beautiful and modern campuses in Hungary, where state-of-the-art infrastructure contributes to high-quality education and is in line with 21st century technological developments. The historical Ludovika Main Building underwent full renovation, respecting the rules for the reconstruction of monuments, and reopened in March 2014. In September 2017, the University opened the Education Centre, accommodating nearly four thousand persons at a time, with seminar rooms, lecture halls, laboratories and a reading room, as well as the Law Enforcement Educational Building and the Dormitory. The Ludovika Campus is also home to the Ludovika Residence Hall, the Ludovika Arena, comprising an arena and a swimming pool, several outdoor sports fields, a shooting range and the Ludovika Hussar Drill Platoon. The Ludovika-UPS Sports Association includes twenty-two sections. The beautiful green space of the Ludovika Campus and the surrounding Orczy Park provide the university community and the general public with a calm environment away from the hustle of the city for recreation and sports, as well as for cultural, musical and family events, such as the Ludovika Festival or the Orczy Summer Chill.

During the 2021-2022 academic year, a great number of high-quality, large-scale professional events were organised. Even though the Covid-19 pandemic made the promotion of joint projects with domestic and international partners and the organisation of events and programmes more difficult in 2020 and the first half of 2021, during the second half of the past academic year, life at the University returned more or less to normal as far as education and academic exchanges were concerned.

I am confident that our results, collaborations and educational programmes aiming to develop public service in Hungary are of benefit to both the country and the Hungarian nation.

Let me express my gratitude to the university community, as well as to our domestic and international partners, for their work and support in contributing to the academic success of past and present times.

2. HIGHER EDUCATION IN HUNGARY



2.1. ABOUT HUNGARIAN HIGHER EDUCATION IN GENERAL

Hungarian higher education has a long history, dating back to the 14th century. The country's first university was founded in 1367 in Pécs, around the same time as other central European universities, such as those in Prague, Krakow and Vienna. Due to the expansion of higher education in the last two decades, both the number of enrolled students and the capacity of the institutions have increased considerably. From 1990 to 2010, the population of students in higher education more than quadrupled, from 90,000 to around 400,000.

Hungary, together with 48 other European countries, participates in the Bologna process, in which the member states voluntarily undertook to coordinate their higher education systems. The Bologna process has brought unprecedented changes in European higher education and has fundamentally defined the recent history of Hungarian higher education.

As a result of the independent intergovernmental process launched in 1999, the higher education systems of each country have become (or will become) part of a large European system, the European Higher Education Area. The three main directives of the unified structure are the introduction of a similarly structured multi-cycle education system, the creation of a credit system to ensure the mutual recognition of learning periods and qualifications, and the promotion of mobility between institutes of higher education and countries.

2.2. UNIVERSITIES AND COLLEGES

Today there are 64 higher education institutions (HEIs) in Hungary that are recognised and accredited by the state – including state, church and private universities and colleges. Of the 64 institutions, there are 5 state (public) universities, 24 non-state (private) universities, 10 non-state (private) universities of applied sciences, 1 state (public) college of education and 24 non-state (private) colleges of education. All Hungarian universities are located either in the capital or in traditional university towns, each of which boasts a lively and extremely diverse multicultural or international student life. This makes Hungary a magnificent destination for students in higher education.

2.3. DEGREE STRUCTURE

In accordance with the common European higher education principles, Hungary introduced the three-cycle degree structure in 2006 (BA/BSc, MA/MSc, PhD/DLA). Within the framework of this multi-cycle system, BA/BSc courses lead to a first degree, whereas master-level courses require a first degree as part of their admission criteria. There are a few fields of tertiary education (e.g. law and medical studies) where undivided long courses have remained the standard form of study (10 to 12 semesters) leading to a first degree, which is equivalent to an MA/MSc. All BA and MA degrees allow easier access to the labour market. In addition to full degree courses, HEIs also offer shorter courses, such as summer schools and partial training.

3. VISION, MISSION, STRATEGY

3.1. VISION

Ludovika-University of Public Service (hereinafter 'Ludovika-UPS') is one of the best and most attractive universities in Hungary, a stable educational and research base for the development of the Hungarian public service and for a career in public service, and is a committed supporter of Hungarian-speaking higher education in Hungary and abroad. In alliance with several leading universities in Europe and worldwide, it is an active member of various international higher education and research networks.

Ludovika-UPS is a model for effective cooperation to support social and employer needs, as well as of university autonomy. Cooperation is a value; a special kind that is created by the collaborative work of these stakeholders. Their work is for the sake of the University and thus for the sake of public service.

University autonomy is not self-serving; it is not an absolute value but a responsibility to work towards strategic social and economic goals and contribute to their improvement. These public goals are set by stakeholders, reflecting the needs of state organisations, public service employees, students, teachers and researchers. Ludovika-UPS is a special 'competitor' in higher education, dedicating a huge proportion of its autonomy – compared to other institutes of higher education – to serving and developing governance and state. Ludovika-UPS is undertaking tremendous tasks related to the undergraduate, graduate and continuing education of civil servants; as such, therefore serving public needs is fundamental to the university's own autonomous interests.

Ludovika-UPS intends to become the best and most attractive university in Hungary by strengthening its teaching and research capacities. We do not consider it a disadvantage that Ludovika-UPS has to compete in the research field with a significant level of non-higher education types of public service tasks, such as the career-related continuing education of civil and public servants, military and police officials. Our participation in these kinds of activities is considered in our favour in the competition for national and EU funds, enabling us to strengthen our teaching and research capacities further.

Ludovika-UPS aims to be the best at national and international educational and research cooperation. We believe that being a successful co-operator is a more decisive success factor than being a successful competitor, and we believe that the future belongs to successful co-operators in higher education.

3.2. MISSION

The mission of Ludovika-UPS, in the intersection of the public service profession and academia, is to serve as an effective educational and academic base for state-building and public service development. Through its educational and further training programmes, Ludovika-UPS supports the development of highly trained and efficient personnel in the fields of public administration, law enforcement, defence and other areas of public service. Ludovika-UPS defines its mission at the national, regional, European and global level.

The national dimension of Ludovika-UPS's mission comprises strengthening the Hungarian State and the education and research-based establishment of public service.

The "science of public governance and state" (that is, research on the state based on a comprehensive, multidisciplinary, comparative and applicable approach) serves as the centrepiece of Ludovika-UPS's academic mission.

The fundamental values of public service – the ethos of public interest, the demand for integrity and efficient operation – overarch countries and cultures. The objective of Ludovika-UPS is to improve the value-system of public service through research and education thus strengthening the confidence of social and economic actors in the public sector.

At regional level, the focus of Ludovika-UPS is two-fold. On the one hand, the national policy mission of the University includes establishing of cross-border relations and providing support for Hungarian higher education institutions in neighbouring countries. Accordingly, enhancing the strategic cooperation with Hungarian-language institutions Slovakia, Ukraine, Romania and Serbia is a priority for the University.

At the European level, top priorities include enhancing student and staff mobility and strengthening inter-institutional relations through joint research. Europe is a community of values in higher education and university traditions, and is a common area of higher education. In accordance with the Europe 2020 strategy, the international mobility of students, staff members, and researchers shall be increased and facilitated, while institutional relations need to be strengthened through joint training and research programmes.

Regarding the global level, Ludovika-UPS has to determine its international strategy based on the solid foundations of its national and European cultural identity. It has to synchronise Euro-Atlantic orientation with the values of eastern and southern partnerships. The common issues of higher education include the autonomy of universities, ethics of science and the role of public service and state-building in the establishment of peace and security. As a member of the International Association of Universities (IAU), the University has to play an active role in universities' international dialogue.



FOR THE FUTURE OF OUR STUDENTS, where the University mentors and orients creative, educated young people with community-building ambitions who want to learn and new generations who respect national values, embrace the values of solidarity and cooperation and take responsibility for the future, to build Hungary and Europe using their best knowledge.

FOR THE FUTURE OF OUR EMPLOYEES, where the University provides a motivating environment in which its employees are committed to serving the goals of the University through the continuous development of their knowledge, a predictable vision and in line with their ambitions.

FOR THE FUTURE OF PUBLIC SERVICE WORKERS, where the University provides support, encouragement and knowledge to the corps of administrators and officers who chose the service of the Hungarian nation and the protection of the country as a vocation above all.

FOR THE FUTURE OF HUNGARY AND THE HUNGARIAN NATION, where the University reinforces the protection of Hungarian national identity and its cultural heritage, the population retention power of the country and national competitiveness.

FOR THE FUTURE OF EUROPE, where the University promotes the construction of a Europe of nations, respect for Christian values and the cultural traditions of other nations, tolerance, and the protection of individual freedom and human dignity.

FOR THE FUTURE OF SCIENCE AND CULTURE, where the University builds bridges and a community of values between science without borders, social development, sustainability and national cultures.

FOR THE FUTURE OF HUMANITY, where the University supports the security of social coexistence and well-being. Due to its understanding of the challenges of accelerating ecological changes and technological transformation, and analysing their regional and global impacts, it considers research and education in the fields of social innovation, environmental sustainability and security technology as a strategic goal.



3.3. STRATEGY

In the spirit of Article X of the Fundamental Law of Hungary, Ludovika-UPS is an institution based on the freedom of scientific research, learning and teaching. The University sees education and research as a service: to contribute to the common goals of European integration and the cause of international peace, security and solidarity through the development of Hungarian public service.

The intention to build good governance and committed officials, thus enabling the state to respond to the challenges of the 21st century by means of science and education, is at the heart of Ludovika-UPS's strategy.

To fulfil its mission, Ludovika-UPS strives to:

- provide public service-oriented training for young adults, in combination with modern and comprehensive knowledge based on solid moral values;
- participate in the further training of civil servants and public administration executives;
- be successful in public service development 2020;
- provide outstanding education and training;
- conduct successful research;
- follow high-quality international standards using state-of-the-art infrastructure and services;
- maintain sound institutional functioning embedded in a culture of quality and excellence.

The strategic environment and challenges of Ludovika-UPS can be interpreted in the space of domestic higher education and research, domestic public service, international higher education and research, and international public service relations.

Strategy 2020–2025

The Institutional Development Plan (IDP) is a common set of university development goals set by the maintaining Minister and the university strategies and development plans that serve them, as adopted by the University Senate in June 2020.

Our University's strategy from 2020 to 2025 identifies the main directions, goals and principles along which the organisation is consciously developing. By this, the University will be able to respond to the narrower and wider environmental changes, and, as a learning organisation, possess the ability to give good, agile and reasonably safe responses to these changes.

The strategy is entitled "The University of a Secure Future", indicating that although we are experiencing a continuum of global and local social and environmental changes, we intend, based on the best traditions of the European university ideal, to operate as a predictable, stable and sustainable place of education and research in the future as well.

A secure future is inconceivable without a balance between continuous innovation and tradition, which is why our strategy breaks with traditional strategic thinking while retaining and acknowledging its importance. It intends to inspire all university citizens to think and act together to strengthen the performance of the university community and the university organisations in a renewed way, both in terms of form and content. Our strategy does not contain tasks in the classical sense but identifies nearly 250 development actions that will support the strategic goals of at least one of four main strategic directions, to which it assigns target indicators.

Main strategic objectives for the period 2020–2025:

- A Hungarian and European University, known worldwide
- Balanced geostrategy in its institutional partnerships
- Agile international science diplomacy
- All lecturers and every third student take part in international mobility
- Vibrant international life on campuses
- Bachelor's, Master's, and joint courses in foreign languages, postgraduate programmes, summer universities
- Listed in the top 500–1000 in international rankings

Strategic directions

In the developed world, there is a paradigm shift in strategic planning. Methods based on strategic planning are operating with less and less efficiency, especially medium- and long-term planning. This is explained by the fact that the social, economic, and technological environment of large organisations is changing at an accelerating pace and it has to cope with greater uncertainty and complexity. Nevertheless, all organisations need to plan but, in addition to making plans, there is an increasing emphasis on the ability of an organisation's leadership and management to make decisions quickly and intelligently and become effective (agile) in response to changes in the operating environment.

In addition to defining strategic directions, aspects of agile/effective management and decision-making skills, as well as fast and efficient management development, are becoming increasingly important.

Present and future national governance and state-building are facing increasingly serious challenges. New forms of regional and global risks are emerging. Planning, change management, digitalization, and greater complexity require increasingly complex leadership skills and determination. Governance and managerial work cannot be continued using the old approach and methods. The participants in our degree programmes and training courses prepare for the governmental and administrative tasks of the future by learning from each other and for each other, with the help of the most recognised experts.

Strategic directions:

- a) Education strategy
- b) Research and development strategy
- c) Strengthening community (organisational) performance
- d) Individual performance principle

Education strategy

The education strategy aims to update how a traditional university education is practiced with a pedagogical shift, as a result of which education will focus on the effective development of student skills, mentoring individual learning pathways and creating and maintaining creative learning communities based on the personal element. To achieve this desired pedagogical turn, the strategy includes a Creative Learning Programme, the main emphases of which are to help individual development and community learning and work. In addition to the change in pedagogy as a change of the intellectual force field, the programme puts emphasis on renewing the training content and methodology based on learning outcomes, the technological development of the learning environment and the development of digital technology.



Research and development strategy

The basic pillars of the research and development strategy identify the research directions that are organically in line with the University's national and global mission, and also serve the University's educational content development using the scientific results created in these directions. The classic institutionalised forms of university research are doctoral schools, but research and innovation are of paramount importance for all university citizens and organisations. Improving the quality of research in terms of methodology and content is of key importance for the international visibility of the University. International visibility can provide the basis for student and faculty collaborations that can ensure the University's embeddedness in the national and global academic community.

Strengthening community (organisational) performance

The third main direction of the strategy is the strengthening of community (organizational) performance. With this direction, the strategy also declares that it is a cooperating community that can create a safe environment. Under the concept of community performance, the strategy presents the already mentioned teaching and research directions from the context of the organisation. The aim of the educational renewal is to strengthen our educational competitiveness; that is, to ensure that more and more students and teachers choose our university. Also, the educational renewal aims for the university to discover talented students and nurture their creative work, not only within the organised frameworks of colleges for advanced studies, but throughout the whole educational process. The task of talent promotion is key for the renewal of the scientific capacity of our University and to ensure the reserves for our teaching activities. Community achievement in this sense contributes to the growth of our research and innovation potential and our scientific and cultural reputation, as well as efficient operation and management. In our age, these results are inconceivable without digitalization, so the digitalization of education, research, and operation will comprehensively contribute to increasing the community performance of the University.

Individual performance principle

No organisation, and in particular no university, can achieve its community / organisational goals without the performance of the individuals who make up the community. That is why the individual performance principle is included in the directions of the strategy. It assigns competencies to the most important job groups. The measurement and evaluation of competencies serves as the basis for performance evaluation at the University. The development of individual competencies, or support for their development, is in the basic interest of our university community. The support of individual learning within organised or informal frameworks will continue to be an important activity of the internal training at Ludovika–UPS in the future as well.

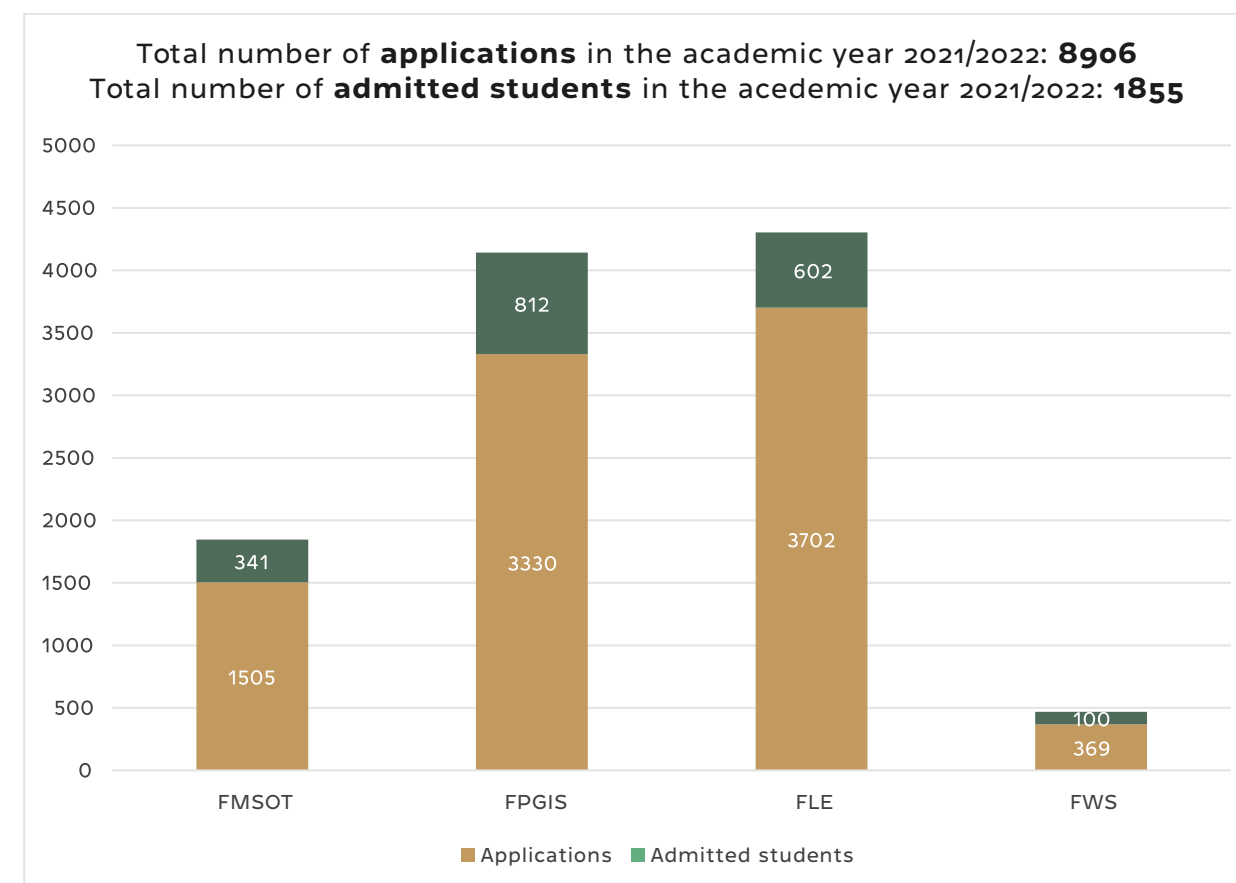

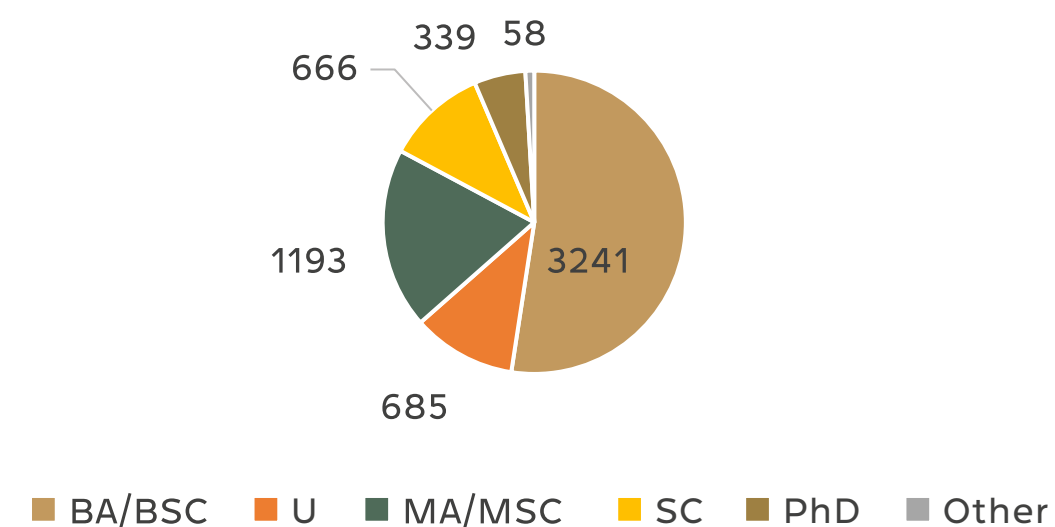




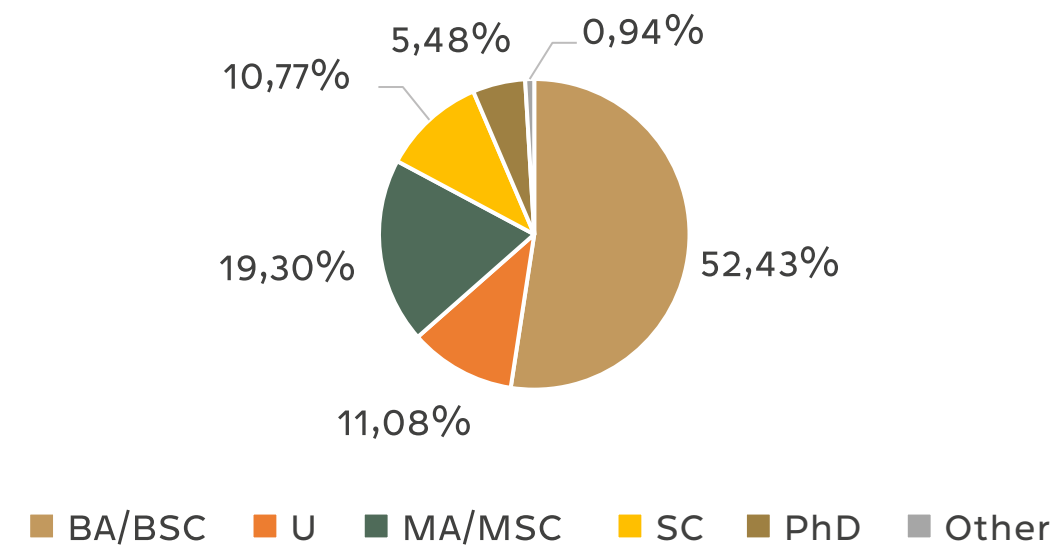

Total number of **enrolled students** in the academic year 2021/2022: **6182**

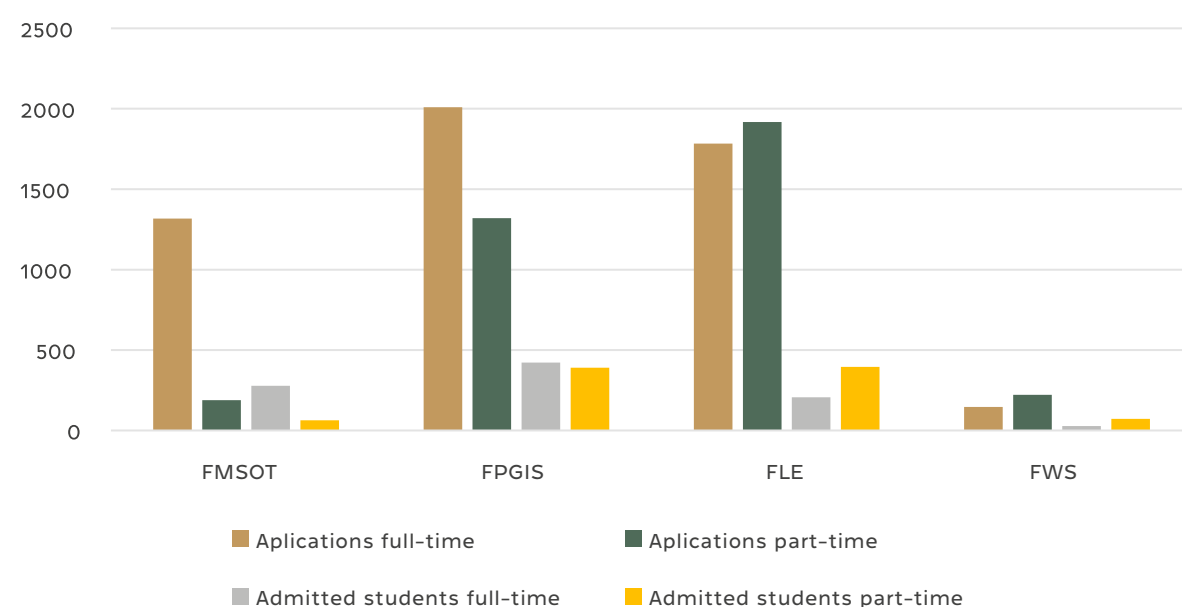
Number of enrolled students according to the education (person)



Distribution of enrolled students according to the education

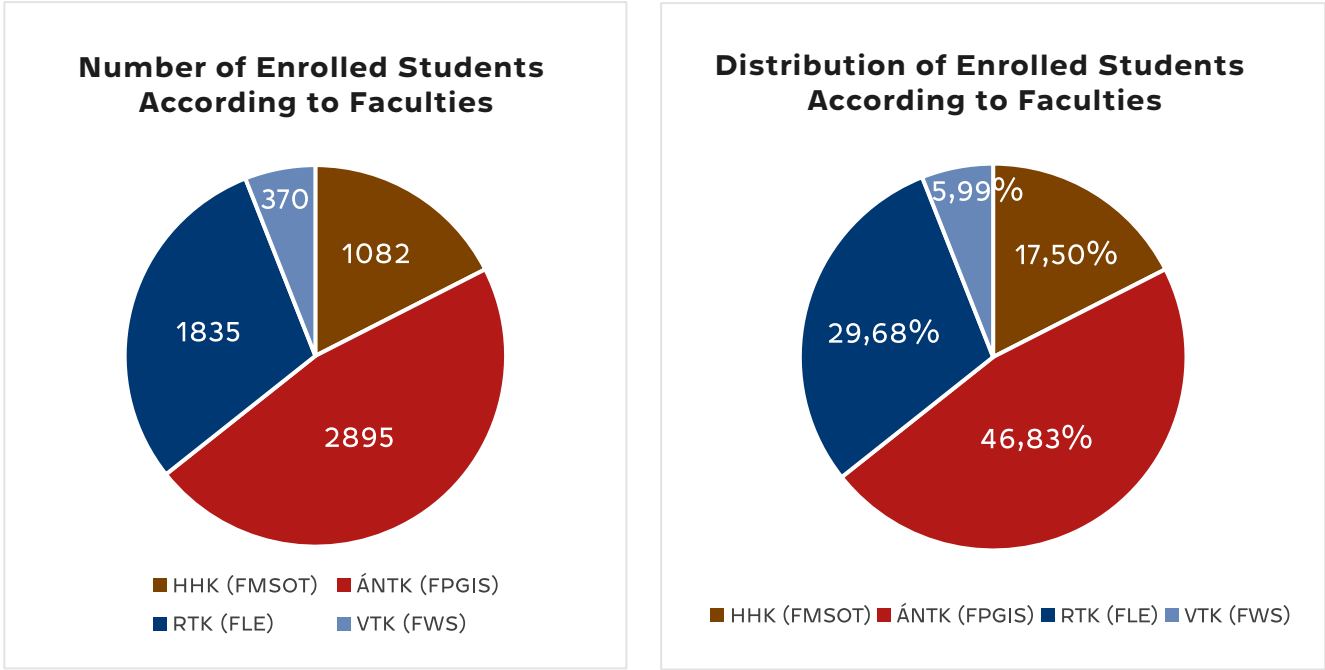

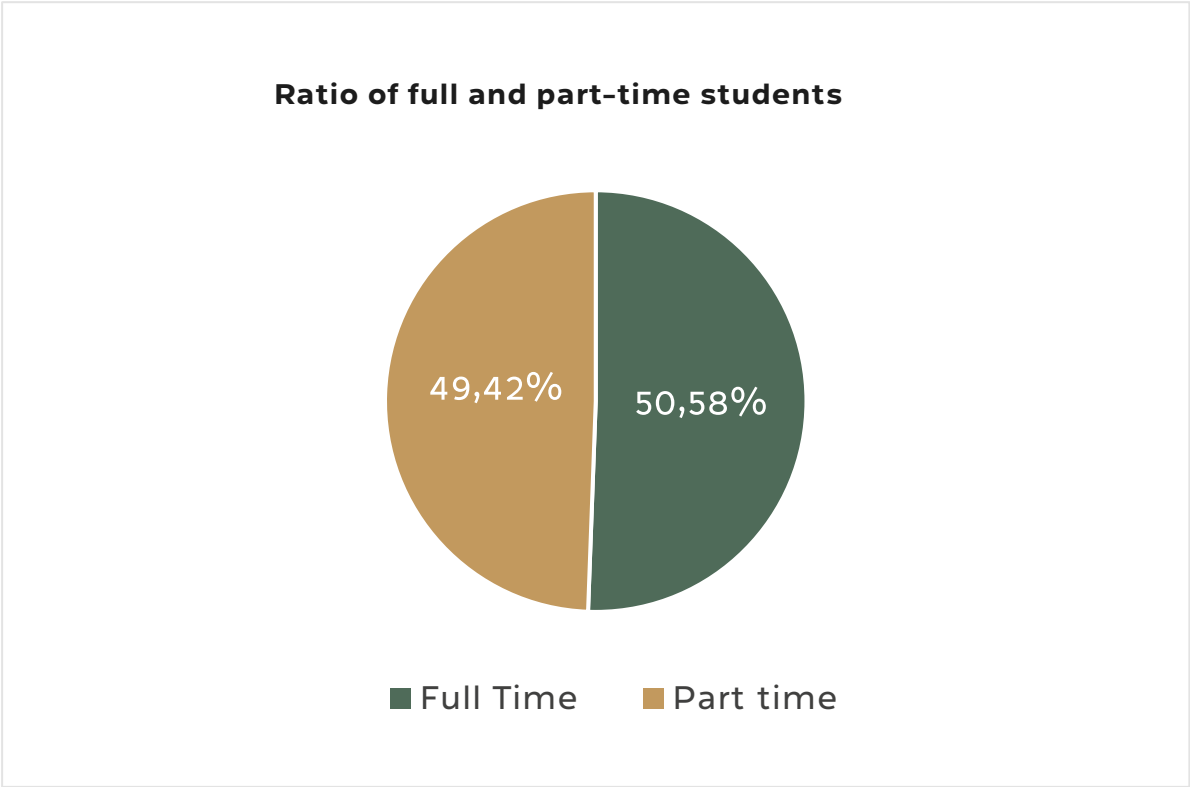

4.1.4. RATIO OF FULL AND PART-TIME STUDENTS



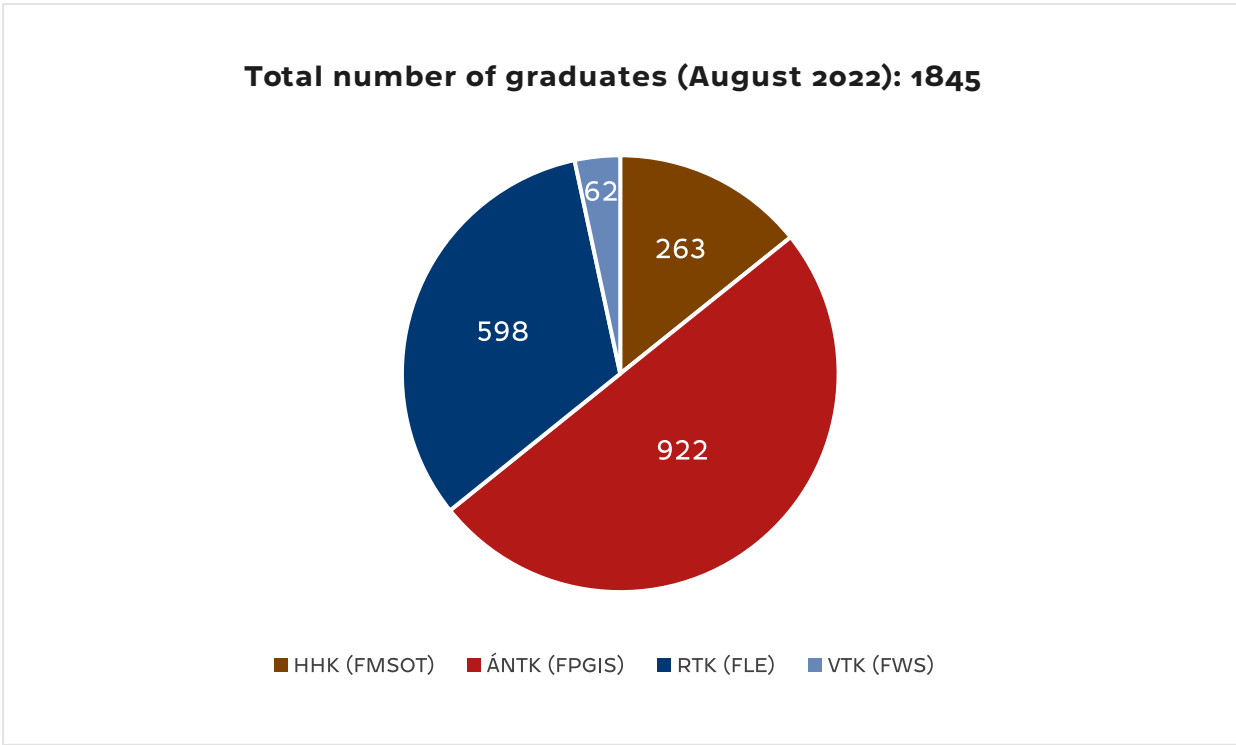

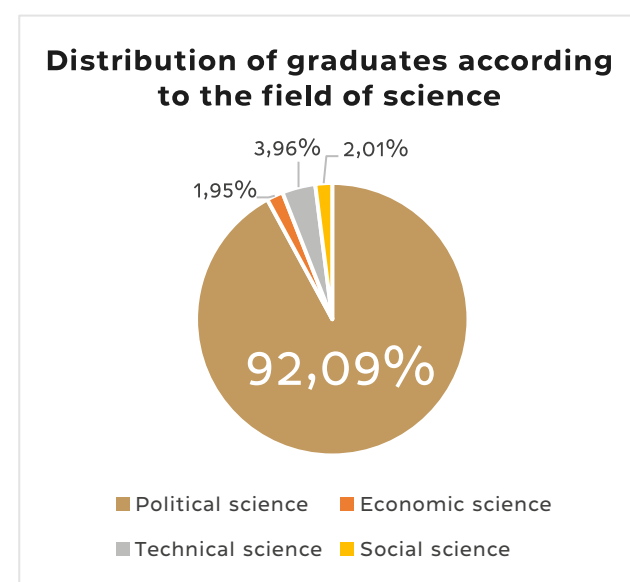
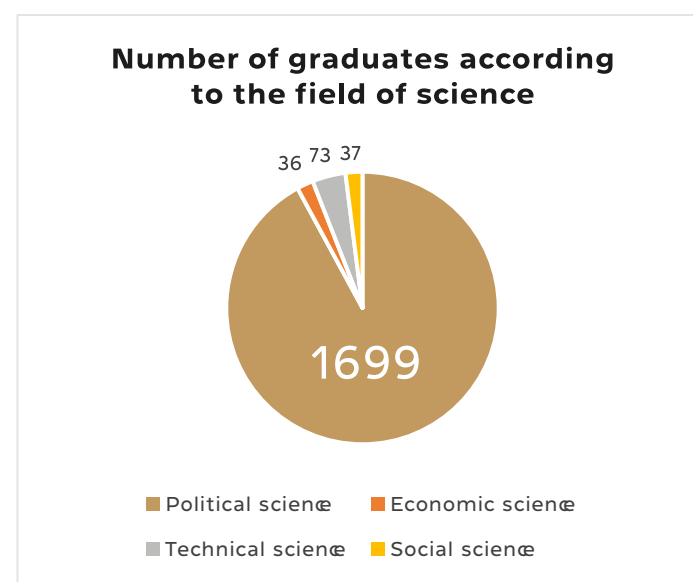

Number of **graduates per faculty** (August 2022):



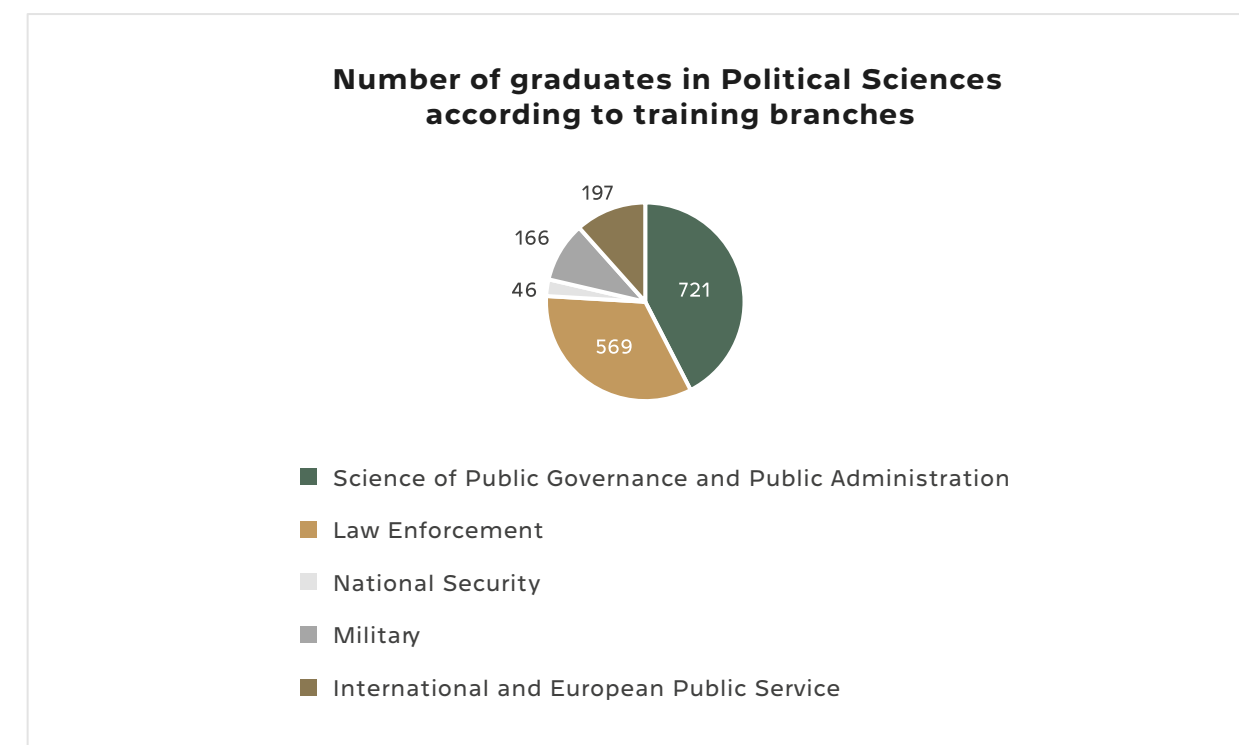


Number and distribution of **graduates according** to the field of science:

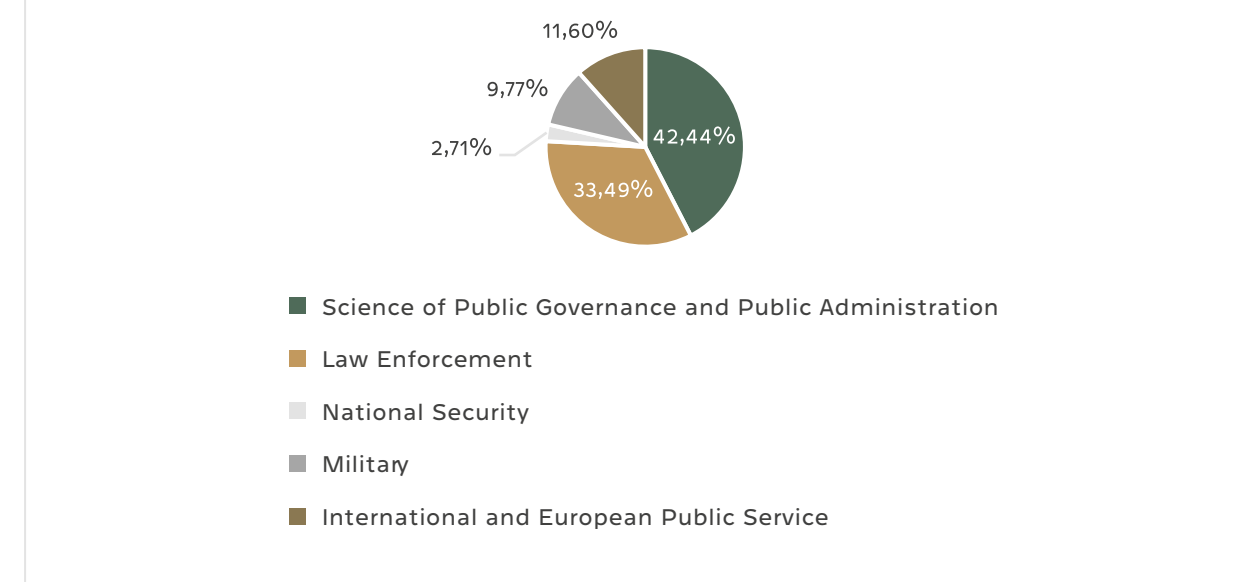


Number and distribution of **graduates in Political Sciences according** to training branches:

5. INSTITUTIONAL MILESTONES

1808: The Royal Hungarian Ludovika Academy was established as the national military educational institute of Hungary.

1872: Hungarian officer training started at Ludovika Academy.

1920: The Royal Hungarian (Honvéd) Military Academy was established to follow the traditions of Ludovika Academy.

1955: The Zrínyi Miklós Military Academy was established.

1971: Establishment of the Police College.

1977: The College of Public Administration was established enabling the education of professional civil servants for all levels of the state administration.

1996: The military higher education institutions were separated from the organisation of the Hungarian Defence Forces, and the Zrínyi Miklós National Defence University was formed.

2004: The College of Public Administration and the University of Economics Budapest were merged and became one of the predecessors of Ludovika-UPS.

1 January 2012: Act XXXVI of 2011 established Ludovika-UPS as the legal successor of the Zrínyi Miklós National Defence University, the Police College, and the Faculty of Public Administration of the Corvinus University of Budapest.

2014: Inauguration of the main building of the new central campus of the University, named Ludovika. The building housed the Hungarian Royal Military Academy in the 19th century and was renovated in 2014.

2015: Establishment of the Faculty of International and European Studies and the Institute for Research and Development on State and Governance.

2016: Redesign of the Faculty of Public Administration, re-naming it as the Faculty of Political Sciences and Public Administration.

2017: The Faculty of Water Sciences was established in Baja, by the two merging institutes of the Eötvös József College, the Institute of Water Supply and Environmental Engineering and the Institute for Hydraulic Engineering and Water Management, joining Ludovika-UPS. Establishment of the Doctoral School of Law Enforcement with the aim of providing an education based on scientific innovation.

2018: Pursuant to the amendment to the NUPS Act, the maintainer of the University is the Minister responsible for public administration development. Alongside the University, under the direction of the Maintainer and with the participation of the delegates of the Ministers responsible for justice, defence, education, innovation and technology, foreign policy and law enforcement, the Advisory Board provides a basis for certain decisions by the Maintainer as well as professional support.

2019: A new faculty – the Faculty of Public Governance and International Studies – was established with a merger of two former faculties, the Faculty of Science of Public Governance and Administration and the Faculty of International and European Studies. In February 2019, the Eötvös József Research Centre was established and started operating, together with the nine research institutes established within its framework. The Institute of Strategic Studies has been established as a new organisational unit, which contributes to the development of university excellence by planning and implementing Hungarian and international training programmes that prepare participants for strategic and managerial tasks in the public sector.

2020: In cooperation with the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade, Ludovika-UPS launched the first cycle of the Hungarian Diplomatic Academy. The Academy started with two training programmes, the Diplomat Training Programme and the Diplomatic Leadership Programme. These programmes will ensure a supply and further training of specialists in foreign affairs.

6. LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENTS

6.1. THE ADVISORY BOARD AND THE SENATE

Alongside the University, under the direction of the Maintainer and with the participation of the Ministers responsible for justice, defence, education, innovation and technology, foreign policy and law enforcement, the Advisory Board provides a basis for various decisions by the Maintainer, as well as professional support.

The Advisory Board

The main task of the Advisory Board, established in September 2018, is to give an opinion on the regulations and training programmes that fundamentally affect the life of the University, as well as to make proposals for the number of students to be admitted. The Board discussed, in several rounds, the University's recently adopted new institutional development plan and the amendments to certain elements of the Organisational and Operational Regulations. The main points of the agenda for the second half of the academic year were the measures in and amendments of the regulations in the context of the coronavirus epidemic in order to safeguard jobs and ensure the successful completion of the academic year. There has also been a change in the composition of the Advisory Board in the past academic year. The place of Dr. Major General Frigyes Janza, representing the Minister of Interior, was taken over by Dr. Major General József Boda. Dr. Márton Bálint Lacsny, who had represented the Ministry of Human Resources, also resigned from the Board due to his transfer to another field and was replaced by Endre Miklós Sík, Chief of Staff of the Ministry.

The Senate is the main decision-making body of the University. The Senate decides on all matters assigned to its competence by legislation – with some exceptions – where the approval of the Advisory Board is required, such as the adoption of the University's education and research programmes, the adoption of by-laws and the quality improvement programme, the initiation or review of the new development plan or the adoption of the University budget and the annual budget report. The Senate comprises 25 members with voting rights. Concerning its composition, the Rector – as Chairman – and the Deans are ex officio members, whereas the elected members include one professor or associate professor, one senior lecturer or one assistant lecturer/assistant research fellow from each faculty, one researcher from the Eötvös József Research Centre, the director of the Institute for Public Administration Further Training, and three administrative staff members. The delegated members are six members (including the presidents) of the students' unions of the university and that of the faculties, one member of the doctoral students' union, and one member of the representative trade unions.

6.2. UNIVERSITY LEADERSHIP

The Rector is responsible for the operation of the University. He is appointed by the Advisory Board and is therefore accountable to the Board and the Senate at the same time. Beyond matters reserved to the Board and the Senate, the Rector has full authority to achieve the University's objectives. His work is underpinned by the Vice-Rectors with separate portfolios, the Faculty Deans, and the central management.

The **Vice-Rector for Academic Affairs** coordinates all the educational affairs including the work of the Office of Education, the Central Office of Studies, and the Institute of Disaster Management. The **Vice-Rector for Institutional Development**, as a basic task, prepares a strategic action program to improve its position in the domestic and international higher education of the University, to develop its operational efficiency and institutional capabilities, furthermore, it supervises the implementation of development programs. The **Vice-Rector for International Affairs** is responsible for establishing and maintaining the international relations of Ludovika-UPS via the International Directorate. The Vice-Rector for Science manages all scientific activities of the University, oversees the Doctoral Schools, the Office of Scientific Affairs, the Central Library of the University, the Institute of National Security, and the scientific quality assurance processes.

Other important positions are that of the **Secretary-General** and the **Chief Financial Director**. The Secretary-General is responsible for the work of the Rector's Office and the central management of the University. The Chief Financial Director controls and directs the work of the Financial Office and is responsible for all financial matters regarding the operation of Ludovika-UPS.





Dr. Gergely Deli – Rector

Dr. Gergely Deli has been rector of the University as of the 1st of February 2022.

Professor Deli has been with the University since 2021 as Dean of the Faculty of State Sciences and lecturer at the Department of State and Legal History.

He is a lawyer, university professor, senior advisor to the Constitutional Court and professor at NKE, ELTE and the Széchenyi University of Győr, where he is head of the German Law Centre as well. Gergely Deli is fluent in six languages (English, German and Spanish at an advanced level) and his hobby and one of his specialisms is Roman law.

Prof. Deli received his law degree from ELTE and his doctorate degree summa cum laude from Pázmány Péter Catholic University. He habilitated at Széchenyi University and studied in New York and Cambridge. He is the author of several books and publications and a member of the editorial boards of many scientific journals.



Dr. András Koltay – Rector until December 2021

Dr. András Koltay was the rector and professor of Ludovika-UPS from 2018 until the end of 2021.

He has been a lecturer at Pázmány Péter Catholic University Faculty of Law and Political Sciences in Budapest, Hungary since 2002. In 2018, he was appointed professor of law. He received an LLM degree in public law from University College London in 2006, and a PhD in law at the Pázmány Péter Catholic University in 2008. He attended the human rights course of the International Institute of Human Rights in Strasbourg in 2003.

His principal research areas are freedom of speech, personality rights and media regulation, but he also deals with other constitutional questions. He is the author of more than 300 publications, and numerous monographs on freedom of speech; in English: Freedom of Speech – the Unreachable Mirage (Wolters Kluwer 2013), The Troubled Relationship between Religions and the State. Freedom of Expression and Freedom of Religion (Whitelocke 2017) and New Media and Freedom of Expression (Hart 2019). He has already been a speaker at more than 100 conferences in numerous countries.



Dr. Boglárka Koller – Vice-Rector for International Affairs

Dr. Boglárka Koller is a European Studies expert, university professor, currently serving as the Vice-Rector for International Affairs. She graduated from Corvinus University, Budapest as an economist in 1998; she also holds an MA in Nationalism Studies from the Central European University and an MSc in European Studies from the London School of Economics and Political Science. She defended her PhD thesis in International Relations in 2004. She is a former Chevening scholar. Her main research areas are governance and policy-making in the EU, history and theories of integration and identity issues in Central and Eastern Europe. She has already had more than 20 years of teaching experience in Hungary and abroad and authored numerous international publications on European integration. She served as a chairman of the National Office for Research Development and Innovation (NKFIH), Political Science and Law Jury (formerly OTKA Jury) for four years. She is currently the elected Vice-President of the Central European Political Science Association (CEPSA), a member of the Social Science Committee of the Hungarian Accreditation Committee (MAB), member of the Board of the Hungarian United Nations Association, and member of the Social Science Committee of the National Scientific Students' Conference (OTDK) and also serves as the Head of the Editorial Board of the European Mirror scientific journal (Európai Tükör).



Dr. Norbert Kis – Vice-Rector for Institutional Development

Norbert Kis is a professor of public law at Ludovika-UPS, currently serving as the Vice-Rector for Institutional Development. His research focuses on public policy-making, public governance and legislation. He served for 20 years in the executive management of various Hungarian public institutions (ministries, tribunals, universities) as deputy-state-secretary, director-general, dean and vice-rector. He spent 10 years in the governing boards of the International Association of Universities (Paris) and the European Institute of Public Administration (Maastricht). Since 2011, he has been in charge of supervising the further training system of public servants and is co-chair of the National Board of Further Training of Public Administration in Hungary. He is the author of 130 publications, books and proceedings.



Dr. Col. Tamás Csikány – Vice-Rector for Science since 1st January 2020

Continuing several tasks of the previous period, Vice-Rector Tamás Csikány is responsible for keeping the scientific development of Ludovika-UPS in line with its core mission of being an internationally recognised high-quality educational and training centre for present-day and future public servants. After his graduation as Lieutenant, Missile and Artillery Officer, and Teacher of Pedagogy in Primary Education from the Kossuth Lajos Military Academy in 1980, his life has been intertwined with military life; his proficiency has been determined by the spirit of military sciences and generalship.

He has been an educator in Hungarian officer training for almost 30 years, since 2010 as a university professor. In 2009 he successfully defended his dissertation 'Military Leadership in the Hungarian War of Independence in 1848-49' for the title of 'Doctor of the Hungarian Academy of Sciences'. His research field is European and Hungarian military science and the art of warfare in the 19th century; primarily the relationship between the army and society, military organisation, military leadership, the history of the battles of castles during the War of Independence of 1848-1849 and the history of Székely frontier regiment.

As Head of the Doctoral School of Military Sciences and an expert in supervising PhD students, he makes every effort to ensure a high-quality education in military sciences.



Dr. Pol. Col. László Christián – Vice-Rector for Education since 1st January 2020

László Christián, Vice-Rector for Education at Ludovika-UPS, is a police colonel and lawyer. He has been the Head of the Department of Private Security and Municipal Law Enforcement of the Faculty of Law Enforcement of Ludovika-UPS since 2013. He is a habilitated associate professor and has been teaching in higher education since 2002. He started his professional career at the Customs and Finance Guard in 2002, then continued at the National Tax and Customs Office in various management positions. Since 2016 he has been a regular member of the Police. He is the Editor-in-Chief of Magyar Rendészet (Hungarian Law Enforcement) and the author of 100 publications. László Christián is the holder of several awards; he has participated in 30 foreign study trips on several continents and regularly gives lectures at national and international conferences. His main fields of research are public administration, law enforcement, private security and municipal policing.



Dr Balázs Korim-Éberfi – Secretary General

Dr Balázs Korim-Éberfi had been serving as a Deputy-Secretary General since the 17th January of 2022. After that, he was appointed to the position of the Secretary-General of the University of Public Service. He has held the title since the 1st February of 2022. The prime task of the Secretary-General is providing functional support for the university's professional work, as well as to guarantee its legal operation.

Dr Balázs Korim-Éberfi graduated from Eötvös Lóránd University, then studied at the University of Ghent. He was awarded a Comparative law Masters at the Université Paris II Panthéon Assas. He also worked in Paris as a lecturer.

Before he joined the University of Public Service, he held several legal and leadership positions. He worked as a legal specialist in data protection at an international company and currently serves as a property inspector for various foundations. Between 2020 and 2022, he was political advisor to the State Secretary for Parliament and Strategy in the Prime Minister's Office.



Dr. Barbara Szalontainé Czettisch – Secretary-General until the end of 2021

Ms Szalonatiné Czettisch, the Secretary General of Ludovika – UPS, is a lawyer specialised in labour law but also the holder of a degree in Computer Engineering. Before joining the University, she worked in various leadership positions in the State Treasury in Budapest and in Tatabánya. In 2012 she became the Head of Section in the HR Department; later she led the University's Coordination Office and in the six years preceding her appointment in 2020 she worked as its Deputy Secretary General.



Tünde Dr. Nászné Brózsely – Chief Financial Officer

As Chief Financial Officer of Ludovika-UPS, Tünde Dr. Nászné Brózsely is responsible for the planning and management of the University's budget. It is of key importance to organise the financial affairs of a higher education institution in a stable and accurate way, especially in the case of Ludovika-UPS, which participates in various programmes and projects co-funded by international actors such as the European Union. Mrs. Tünde Dr. Nászné Brózsely is experienced in directing financial affairs, including that gained in top positions at various public sector organisations.



Henrik Rósa – Campus General Director

The position of the Campus General Director has been filled by Henrik Rósa since September 2021.

Mr Rósa graduated from Budapest Business School with a degree in economics. For a long period, from 1993 to 2007, he was a professional athlete.

He started his professional career in Budapest, employed by National Tax and Customs Office as a finance manager, where he carried out full budgetary, financial, technical and operational tasks.

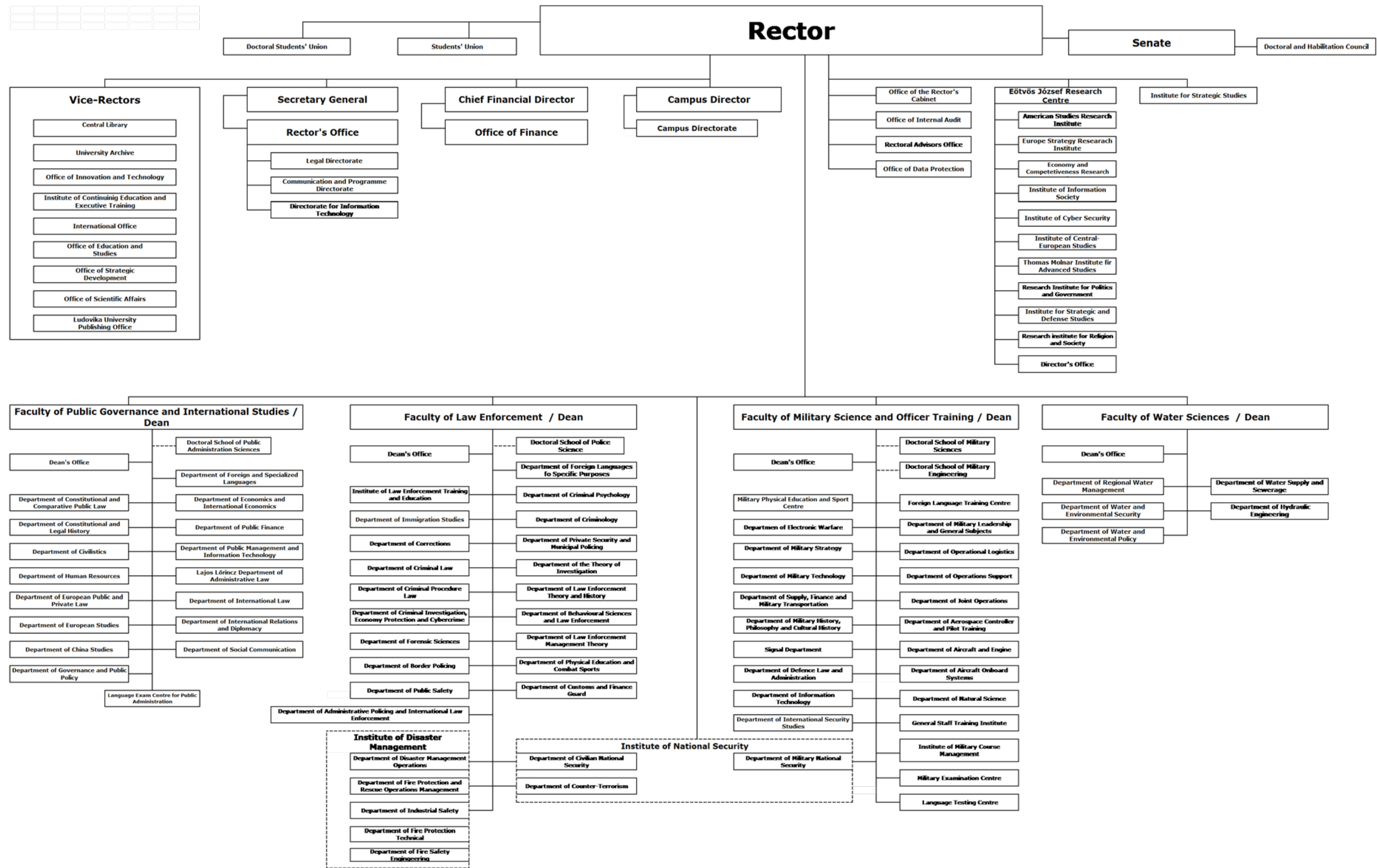
In 2019, he was assigned as Deputy Director of the newly-established Campus Directorate of Ludovika-UPS. He was responsible for facilities operations.

7. FACULTIES



Ludovika-UPS is the only institution in Hungary to offer degree programmes in public service with a comprehensive approach that focuses on the needs of the government. It educates the next generation of experts and leaders in the fields of military, law enforcement, public management, international affairs and water management. As such, our University operates in a model of cooperation with national stakeholders and international actors.

Ludovika-UPS was established in 2012 as a result of a merger of three separate higher education institutions. The legal predecessors were Zrínyi Miklós National Defence University, the Police College, and the Faculty of Public Administration of the Corvinus University of Budapest. In 2017, Ludovika-UPS integrated two Institutes of Water Science at the Eötvös József College of Baja, which now operates as the Faculty of Water Sciences. In 2019, a new faculty – the Faculty of Public Governance and International Studies – was established with a merger of two former faculties, the Faculty of Science of Public Governance and Administration and the Faculty of International and European Studies.

As of today, Ludovika-UPS has four faculties (the Faculty of Military Sciences and Officer Training, the Faculty of Law Enforcement, the Faculty of Public Governance and International Studies, and the Faculty of Water Sciences), four doctoral schools, and a dedicated research hub, the Eötvös József Research Centre. The latter was established at the beginning of 2019 to maintain and develop high-level scientific work and discussion, in order to become a leading source of knowledge in the region.

7.1. FACULTY OF PUBLIC GOVERNANCE AND INTERNATIONAL STUDIES

7.1.1. ABOUT THE FACULTY

The Faculty of Public Governance and International Studies (FPGIS) was established on 1st August 2019 by merging two previously independent faculties, the Faculty of Science of Public Governance and Administration and the Faculty of International and European Studies. While maintaining the strengths of the professional and training portfolios, the main objective of the Faculty is to secure new generations of experts working in national and foreign representations, in the areas of foreign affairs within public administration and to train officials working in the Hungarian central administration, as well as in international and European Union institutions.

The unique programme portfolio of the new Faculty responds to current changes and challenges and offers courses in both Hungarian and English. Moreover, the Faculty offers several practice-oriented programmes and training courses tailored to the needs of potential employers, providing competitive knowledge to its students. In addition to high-profile representatives of the academic world, the teaching programmes also involve senior experts from public administration and diplomacy with outstanding experience.

During their bachelor's or master's studies, students can acquire not only the necessary knowledge to manage public administration, organise administrative work, or prepare and implement administrative decisions, but also to pursue an international career in public service.

After completing the master's programme, graduates are capable of dealing with spatial planning, strategic, analytical, legal and managerial tasks, even at the highest levels of the decision-making mechanism.

Students graduating from the Faculty will be professionals in administration, who are able to cope with tasks in both domestic and international administrative environments. Students might have various job opportunities in the private sector, in multinational corporations or civil organisations in the fields of administration or project management. Having a degree from FPGIS makes it possible to work in foreign representations, in the areas of foreign affairs of the public administration, international and European Union institutions or even in the defence sector.

Graduates committed to public administration and international studies can continue their research work at the Doctoral School of Public Administration Sciences, founded in September 2013. It is the only doctoral school specialising in the field of public administration in Hungary.



7.1.2. DEAN OF THE FACULTY

Dr. Réka Varga Dean – Dean as of 15 July 2022

Dr. Réka Varga is an international lawyer, Associate Professor at the Department of International Law of the University of Public Service, Associate Professor at the Pázmány Péter Catholic University, and a former Senior Research Fellow at the Eötvös József Research Centre. She also taught as a visiting lecturer at the Zrínyi Miklós University of National Defence and the Faculty of Public Administration of Budapest Corvinus University.

After her studies at ELTE and Regensburg, she obtained her law degree from ELTE Law Faculty and defended her doctoral thesis at Pázmány Péter Catholic University on the subject of proceedings before national courts for war crimes.

Her specialisation is in international humanitarian law and international criminal law. Since its foundation, she has been the editor and an editorial board member of the Hungarian Yearbook of International Law and European Law. In addition to her academic work, she has extensive practical experience in several areas of international law and – as a former diplomat – in multilateral diplomacy and negotiations.

Dr. Katalin Kristó – Acting dean between 1 February and 14 July 2022

Dr. Katalin Kristó, Associate Professor and a certified administrative expert, graduated from the Faculty of Public Administration's predecessor at the University in 2009 and obtained her PhD in 2012. She

has been working at the University since 2009 in various operational departments and as a lecturer at the Lőrincz Lajos Department of Administrative Law in the Faculty of Political Science and International Studies. She held a variety of positions, including as head of teaching methodology, training development and research organisation, at the University. She has been working as the Dean's Registrar from 2017 and held the acting Dean's position in 2022 for 6 months.

Professor Dr. Gergely Deli – Dean between 1 August 2021 and 31 January 2022

Professor Deli has been with the University since 2021 as Dean of the Faculty of State Sciences and a lecturer at the Department of State and Legal History. He is a lawyer, university professor, senior advisor to the Constitutional Court and professor at NKE, ELTE and the Széchenyi University of Győr, where he is head of the German Law Centre as well. MA in Public Administration (2-year programme – 120 ECTS)

Graduates with an MA in Public Administration are familiar with the goals, methods and practices of public administration and they gain thorough knowledge and competence in state sciences, the basics of law, law-making and law enforcement and the operation of the fundamental institutions, as well as human rights and basics of other social sciences related to public administration. They are administration experts who are capable of leading, overseeing, and controlling various tasks and processes, thus supporting decision-making and management activities.

MA in Public Policy and Management (2-year programme – 120 ECTS)

Graduates of MA in Public Policy and Management are knowledgeable in economics, social sciences, management, law and methodology. In line with their technical and theoretical experience, graduates are capable of analysing complex questions and issues in public administration, implementing planning, coordination and management tasks, and contributing to public projects in public and private institutions, non-profits, central and local governments, and national and international (European) organisations.

MA in Development Policy and Programme Management (1-year programme – 60 ECTS)

The immediate objective of the master's study course is to provide the experts involved in the preparation and implementation of development plans and operational programmes with the necessary advanced knowledge – directly related to policy and programme management – for the use of direct and indirect EU funds and the successful implementation of international projects. The students will be able to manage programmes and projects using international finance, in particular direct EU funds and structural and investment funds: they will be familiar with and understand the direct and related regulations, in particular the mandatory standards and their context, to fulfil the objectives and content requirements of the tasks related to preparing and managing programmes and specific activities (schemes, projects). They will also be able to prepare strategic and operational decisions on the use of funds, to define the conditions for launching and running programmes and to monitor their implementation. They will have the necessary background to monitor the progress of programmes and projects, to assess the problems encountered and to identify alternative solutions. After the study courses, students will be able to advise and take a position on issues relating to resource planning, the implementation, financing, monitoring, evaluation and control of measures and the significance and management of risks.

7.1.3. STRUCTURE OF THE FACULTY

After several changes in its history and name, the Faculty of Public Governance and International Studies is now one of the four faculties of Ludovika-UPS. The newly reformed Faculty provides a vibrant community designed to ensure that students at the undergraduate level acquire highly developed professional skills, while they can also learn the basics of political and legal sciences and classical international relations and diplomacy from practitioners. The Faculty aims at educating professional civil servants for all levels of state administration and has done so since 1977.

The departments of the Faculty:

7.1.4. DEGREE PROGRAMS

Degree Programmes in Hungarian

BA in Public Administration Management (3-year programme – 180 ECTS)

with specialisations in:

- General Administration
- International Public Administration
- Tax Administration

Graduates with a BA in Public Administration Management are “generalists,” who are capable of leading, managing and organising various tasks at various levels of the central and local administration. Based on the broadening competence of administration, this requires sufficient knowledge of law, management, administration and economics. In line with these requirements, graduates are able to fulfil various expectations in the fields of public service, human resources, financial management and controlling, along with having adequate competence in IT and project management.

BA in International Administration (3-year programme – 180 ECTS)

This 6-semester programme is aimed at training professionals who are able to serve as international administrators, organisers and contact persons in the international relations of public bodies, with a special focus on cooperation within the European Union and its Member States. Graduates of the BA programme can also work as managers of international organisations. One of the programme's cornerstones is competency-based training, aimed at providing students with practical knowledge that they can use effectively in their everyday work. Graduates of the BA programme can continue their studies in one of the master's in public administration or management.



MA in Science of Public Governance
(5-year programme – 300 ECTS)

Graduates are experts capable of handling complex tasks related to the structure and roles of the state with a high level of planning, strategic, analytical and managerial skills. The degree programme aims to create experts who are able to manage strategic planning, effect evaluation with policy and economic aspects, and who are knowledgeable on the methods, techniques and framework of administrative law. Graduates are also capable of effectively managing changes in state administration and they acquire the necessary skills to compare state activities and analyse international models and the social, economic, political and human factors that define and affect state operation. The diploma entitles the holder to use the title of doctor (dr. rer. pol.).

MA in International Public Service Studies
(2-year programme – 120 ECTS)

The four-semester programme aims to train experts to fulfil tasks within international and EU agencies, in the administration of foreign affairs, defence policies and law enforcement. Our students will be acquainted with a broad range of contemporary questions in international relations, from the phenomenon of globalisation to the law and policy-making of international organisations, or international law and the law of the European Union, as well as ‘hot topics’ such as good governance and integrity management. Upon completion of the programme, graduates will benefit from a thorough and comprehensive understanding of today’s international affairs, and they will be able to apply those methods that will enable them to assess, analyse and answer global and international problems and policy issues with a critical eye.

Four specialisations are available:

- International public administration studies,
- Security studies,
- Law enforcement studies,
- European studies

MA in International Relations
(2-year programme – 120 ECTS)

The curriculum of the MA programme in International Relations was framed, in collaboration with the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade, to fulfil practical needs.

The syllabus, having been created to provide practical knowledge and to prepare students for careers in diplomacy, is in alignment with the requirements of the foreign affairs administration.

Topics related to foreign economy and economic diplomacy are dominant segments of the study programme.

The following specializations are available:

- International Economic Relations
- Regional and Civilisational Studies
- European Studies

Upon completion of the programme, in addition to gaining competitive skills and knowledge, graduates will not only be able to build careers in the field of public administration but also in the public sector, the academic sphere and in the field of international relations.

MA in Cyber Security
(2-year programme – 120 ECTS)

The aim of the study programme is to prepare professionals with higher education qualifications who are able to implement the planning, organisation and management of cybersecurity tasks effectively in expert positions, whether in the fields of public administration, defence administration or foreign affairs administration. The Master’s programme focuses on cybersecurity issues and current and future challenges facing both the public and private sectors and society. Students will acquire a broad knowledge of the theoretical and practical aspects of cybersecurity and its security, environmental, social and economic aspects. Through a differentiated professional curriculum (international relations in cybersecurity, public cybersecurity management, protection of critical electronic information systems), they will be able to perform research, development and planning tasks in their field of expertise, in order to analyse security problems in a scientific manner.

MA in Government and Leadership
(2-year programme – 120 ECTS)

The study programme focuses on training professionals who can manage public administration in an integrated way, using a systematic approach to public resources. The aim is that graduates will be able to carry out high-level planning, strategic, analytical and managerial tasks. Through the different subjects, the aim is to train experts who are able to interpret public functions in an international and regional context, and who can apply a sectoral, policy-based, budgetary-economic approach to strategic public policy planning and impact analysis. The programme trains prospective leaders who are familiar with governance models, techniques, basic public and administrative legal frameworks and able to manage change in the organisation and administration of the state effectively and to organise public action using comparative methods and international models. It is important to prepare experts performing management tasks in the government and public sector with comprehensive knowledge and understanding of the social and political, economic and human factors that determine and influence the functioning of the state.



Degree Programmes in English

BA in International Public Management
(6-semester programme – 180 ECTS)

The new BA programme is aimed at training professionals who are able to serve as international administrators, organisers, and contact persons in the international relations of public bodies, with a special focus on cooperation within the European Union and its Member States. The courses help them understand better the 21st century’s fast-evolving reality, in which new priorities emerge at unprecedented speed. Identity, belonging to a culture and traditions and also understanding the common values upon which a community is built is becoming ever more prominent. Rediscovering the unique European heritage, based on ancient Greek and Roman cultures and more than 2000 years of Christianity, is essential. Our globalised world has been dealing with a series of dramatic shocks, and the European Union is no exception. More than ever, there is a need for a league of young and educated people who can safely navigate uncharted territories. There is a need for future administrators and leaders of complex governance structures – who have the skills, the knowledge and the courage to face an ever more volatile geo-economic and geopolitical reality. The main courses in the BA programme help to achieve these ambitious goals.

This new developed BA programme has just been launched for the 2021/2022 Academic Year.

MA in International Public Service Relations – MIPuS
(3-semester programme – 90 ECTS)

The three-semester MA programme was launched in February 2016. This comprehensive course is offered both to Hungarian and foreign citizens, focusing on security and defence studies and European studies. The programme delivered in English language synthesises the methods and approaches of the disciplines of international relations, public administration, law and economics. The effects of globalisation, the law and policy-making by international organisations and the institutions and sectoral policies of the EU, as well as good governance or integrity management, are among the topics covered in this programme. It aims to educate and train students to become experts in their fields, in their future positions either at international or EU institutions or in their respective national public administration roles.

Upon completion of the programme, graduates will benefit from a thorough and comprehensive understanding of today’s international affairs, as well as the tools that will enable them to assess, analyse and answer global and international problems and policy issues with a critical eye. The programme aims to produce experts capable of undertaking duties at international and EU institutions and agencies and in the administration of foreign affairs, defence policy and law enforcement, as well as in the international departments of NGOs or business entities. MIPuS is open for Hungarian and international students and applicants representing international public services. To ensure the training’s standard of excellence, every applicant has to meet the same criteria.

They must

- have a good command of English, as a minimum requirement
- hold an appropriate BA/BSc degree or verify the completion of at least 180 ECTS credits in the given fields

The applicants’ language skills and competences will be tested during a personal or Skype interview.

MA in International Relations
(4-semester programme – 120 ECTS)

The curriculum of the MA programme in International Relations was framed, in collaboration with the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade, to fulfil practical needs.

The syllabus, having been created to provide practical knowledge and to prepare students for careers in diplomacy, is in alignment with the requirements of foreign affairs administration.

Topics related to foreign economies and economic diplomacy are dominant segments of the study programme. 7.1.5. DOCTORAL SCHOOL OF PUBLIC ADMINISTRATION SCIENCES

The Doctoral School of Public Administration Sciences was established in 2013 and, currently, it is the only doctoral school in Hungary specialising in the field of public administration. The Doctoral School's programme aims to provide high-quality postgraduate-level education to professionals (researchers and practitioners) working in the field of public administration.

The PhD programme in Administration – the only one in Hungary (available both in Hungarian and English) – focuses on the following research areas:

- History of state and public administration (Head: Dr. Attila HORVÁTH PhD)
- Legal studies (Heads: Dr. András PATYI PhD, Dr. Tekla PAPP PhD)
- Public administration management and sociology (Head: Dr. István TÓZSA PhD)
- Economics (Heads: Dr. Gábor KUTASI PhD, Dr. Péter HALMAI DSc)
- Public governance (Head: Dr. Iván HALÁSZ PhD)
- International and European studies (Head: Dr. Boglárka KOLLER PhD)
- Human resources in public administration (Head: György KISS DSc)

7.1.6. JEAN MONNET

Jean Monnet Activities, as part of the ERASMUS+ Programme, are designed to promote excellence in teaching and research in the field of European Union studies worldwide. The activities also foster the dialogue between the academic world and policy-makers, in particular to enhance the governance of EU policies.

Our Faculty is an active member of the Jean Monnet Community. In 2015, the former Faculty of International and European Studies successfully applied for a Jean Monnet Module. This was the first step of our involvement in this priority and the successful implementation of the Module triggered eligibility for larger future projects, such as Chairs and Centres of Excellence activities. The Jean Monnet Module was a short teaching programme in the field of European Union studies with a duration of three years. Ludovika-UPS offered two courses in the field of EU policy-making to provide theoretical knowledge and practical skills to analyse several current EU policy issues and to provide up-to-date reference knowledge on the most important EU sectoral policies.

In the autumn of 2021, Professor Boglárka Koller, Vice-Rector for International Affairs and Head of Department for the European Studies Department was awarded the post of Jean Monnet Chair. Her bEU Project aims to promote EU knowledge and to foster European resilience by enhancing European identity, especially among young people. The three-year project entails a variety of teaching, training and promotional programmes.

7.2. FACULTY OF MILITARY SCIENCES AND OFFICER TRAINING

7.2.1. ABOUT THE FACULTY

The Faculty of Military Science and Officer Training is the legal successor of the Zrínyi Miklós National Defence University, established in 1996. Hungarian officer training, with a history of nearly 200 years, continues at the Faculty, within Ludovika-UPS since 1 January 2012. The Faculty is the only one in Hungary entitled to provide BSc, MSc, and PhD degrees in military science.

The Faculty educates officer cadets in various undergraduate programmes such as infantry, armour, artillery, reconnaissance, maintenance, logistics, military engineering, signalling, electronic warfare, CBRN (Chemical, Biological, Radiological, Nuclear) defence, ground-based air defence, air traffic controller, and pilot. Besides gaining the highest standards of professional knowledge and skills, officer cadets learn about proper military traditions and acquire the competencies required to successfully deal with the complex challenges of the unfolding century. The Faculty also educates serving officers in three graduate programmes, focusing on military leadership, military operational logistics, and military info-communications and electronic warfare.

The highest level of military education is also incorporated into the Faculty in the form of postgraduate education. Graduates of the so-called General Staff Training Centre regularly take up high positions in the Hungarian Defence Forces. Owing to the special nature of the military profession, education is tailored to the needs of the Ministry of Defence and the Hungarian Defence Forces Command.

The Faculty is also responsible for educating civil experts for the national and international defence spheres in the fields of international security and defence policy, defence C3 systems management, and radicalism and religious extremism. Graduates are guaranteed a job in the defence sector or other sectors of the state administration, but many of them make an international career in notable international organisations, such as NATO, the EU or the OSCE.

The Faculty's main campus, the Zrínyi Miklós Barracks and University Campus (1101 Budapest, Hungária körút 9-11) is located near downtown Budapest, guaranteeing spectacular view of the cityscape from many of the students' dormitory rooms. Seminar rooms, special language labs, a library with more than 600 thousand books, sports facilities, a restaurant and a buffet are all at the disposal of the cadets and students. The departments of the Faculty related to aviation are located in Szolnok Helicopter Air Base. Those who study International Security and Defence Policy are educated at the Ludovika Campus.



7.2.2. DEAN OF THE FACULTY

Brig. Gen. Dr. Árpád Pohl

Brigadier General Pohl serves as Dean of the Faculty of Military Science and Officer Training. He graduated from the Zalka Máté Military Technical College, and studied later at the Zrínyi Miklós Military Academy. He successfully completed the General Staff Course in Vienna in 1997. In 2008, he obtained his PhD degree. His research field is logistical support for military operations. He has been involved in academic matters for more than 30 years and assumed various lecturing and leadership positions at the University as Assistant and Associate Professor, Head of Department, and Head of Institute. In addition to his academic roles, he fulfilled duties with the Hungarian Defence Forces at different levels, including a mission in Afghanistan.

7.2.3. STRUCTURE OF THE FACULTY

The Faculty's unique responsibility as the intellectual hub for military science and military technical science helps to retain and grow talent. Initiatives that enhance the Faculty's excellence and diversity are supported by crafting faculty-related plans, a vigorous analysis of existing programmes and events, and thorough and close monitoring of leadership development curricula. The Faculty has a wide range of activities ultimately

designed to improve researching, lecturing and learning. The attempt to improve overall competence gives the Faculty a unique position at national and international levels.

The educational units of the Faculty are the following:

General Staff Training Institute

The so-called General Staff Course conducted at the General Staff Training Institute (GSTI) in the form of postgraduate education is the highest level of national military education that offers an 11-month resident programme. The curriculum prepares selected Hungarian and foreign military leaders for the responsibilities of strategic leadership and educates them on the development and employment of strategic power, both military and non-military. Upon graduation, students will be prepared for leadership positions in the Hungarian Defence Forces, the Ministry of Defence and other government agencies, or in various high positions in NATO assignments.

Military Examination Centre

The Military Examination Centre (MEC) works as a functional organisational unit of the Faculty. The MEC has a two-fold mission, to prepare and conduct officer and non-commissioned officer certification and classification examinations, both of them based on voluntary application.

Foreign Language Training Lectorate

The Foreign Language Training Lectorate (FLTL) has a wide range of missions, which include the training of officer cadets and preparing them for intermediate or advanced (special) language examinations in accordance with the education requirements. FLTL also conducts language training courses where officers, non-commissioned officers and MoD employees can acquire high-level language skills. Upon request of the Alliance, NATO-accredited international language training is also conducted here.

Language Testing Centre

The Language Testing Centre (LTC) conducts accredited language examinations in three different language examination systems. Candidates can take

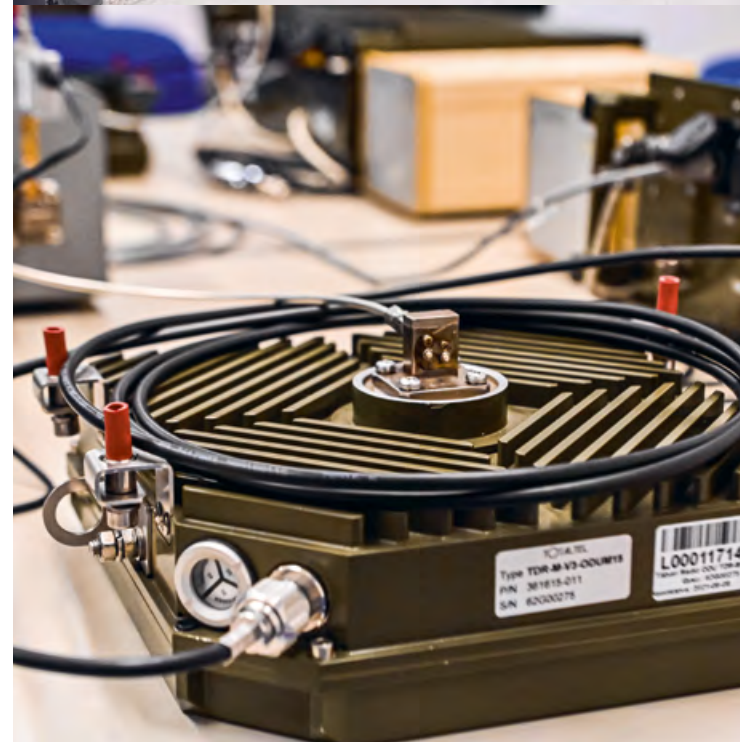
ARMA bilingual military language examinations in 9 languages (English, French, German, Italian, Russian, Croatian, Serbian, Slovak, Ukrainian), NATO STANAG 6001 monolingual military language examinations (in English) and Origó general language examinations in five languages (English, French, German, Italian, Russian). In the event of a successful language examination, candidates receive accredited certificates that are recognised everywhere in Hungary and do not expire.

Military Physical Education and Sports Centre

The Military Physical Education and Sports Centre (MPESC) offers a comprehensive programme of physical training and education for cadets, students and serving officers of the Faculty. MPESC is also responsible for carrying out the annual physical fitness test of the military personnel serving at the Faculty.

Military Course Organisation Office

The Military Course Organisation Office (MCOO) is responsible for the organisation of non-accredited training programmes in the form of so-called static courses, the planning of exercises included in those courses, and coordinates their implementation. The MCOO plans, organises, coordinates and teaches in those courses needed for military retraining, further training and military promotion, as well as for assignments for posts included in the yearly Educational Plan. The MCOO also takes part in planning and accomplishing the exercises at the University and the Faculty. Based on a government decision, it accomplishes the planning, organisation and implementation of certain tasks regarding the Programme of Patriotic and Defence Education, as stipulated in the Memorandum of Understanding between Ludovika-UPS and the MoD, in cooperation with military organisations, civilian secondary schools and institutes of higher education.



7.2.4. DEGREE PROGRAMMES (UNDERGRADUATE)

The Faculty's unique responsibility as the intellectual hub for military science and military technical science helps to retain and grow talent. Initiatives that enhance the Faculty's excellence and diversity are supported by crafting faculty-related plans, a vigorous analysis of existing programmes and events, and thorough and close monitoring of leadership development curricula.

BSc in Military Leadership

(4-year programme, 240 ECTS)

This programme aims to educate and train officer cadets who, after commission, are entitled to lead and organise the work of different subunits, mostly platoons. All military cadets conduct a professional internship at different levels of the Hungarian Defence Forces.

The programme offers the following specialisations:

- infantry,
- armour,
- reconnaissance,
- artillery,
- engineering;
- ground-based air defence, CBRN defence.

BSc in Military Economics

(4-year programme, 240 ECTS)

This programme aims to educate and train future supply and accounting officers who, after commission, are entitled to lead and organise the work of different subunits. During their study, military cadets serve a professional internship at various levels of the Hungarian Defence Forces.

The programme offers the following specialisations:

- supply;
- military finance.

BSc in Military Infocommunications and Electronic Warfare

(4 year programme, 240 ECTS)

This programme aims to educate and train officer cadets capable of understanding, maintaining and managing military information and communication systems and devices, and also of handling new technologies. Graduates have military career opportunities allowing them to work for the Hungarian Defence Forces and the Ministry of Defence and its institutions.

The programme offers the following specialisations:

- military informatics;
- military communication and information security;
- radio-electronic reconnaissance; and electronic warfare.

BSc in Military Logistics
(4-year programme, 240 ECTS)

This programme aims to educate and train future military logistics leaders who are commanders of logistic subunits in the fields of supply, military transportation and maintenance. The programme also offers the possibility to educate cadets in the field of military finances to become financial leaders of the units and the institutions of the MoD. Qualified military logistic leaders at the tactical level are military leaders and logistic experts who are able to face challenges of military transportation, organisation and maintenance, and who have a comprehensive understanding of the legal basis, structure and functions of public administration.

The programme offers the following specialisations:

- logistics;
- military transportation;
- military technology;
- military finance.

BSc in State Aviation
(4-year programme, 240 ECTS)

This programme aims to educate and train military aviation officer cadets capable of operating airplanes and helicopters, managing Air Command and Control Systems, and of organising, planning and maintaining flights. Graduates have military aviation career opportunities allowing them to work for the Ministry of Interior and the Hungarian Air Forces and its institutions.

The programme offers the following specialisations:

- state aviation pilot;
- military aerospace control officer;
- military aviation technical officer.

BA in International Defence and Security Policy
(3-year programme, 180 ECTS)

This programme provides students with a theoretical foundation for security and defence studies. This includes analysis of the Common Security and Defence Policy of the EU, NATO humanitarian and rescue tasks, conflict prevention and peace-keeping, the tasks of combat forces in crisis management to joint disarmament operations, military advice, and assistance and tasks in post-conflict stabilisation.



7.2.5. DEGREE PROGRAMMES (GRADUATE)

MSc in Military Leadership
(1-year programme, 60 ECTS)

This programme aims to train military leaders (serving officers) who are capable of successfully commanding military organisations based on their advanced skills in military science, management sciences, social sciences, natural sciences and technical sciences, and due to their theoretical and practical methodological knowledge, professional skills and a good command of one foreign language at least. Graduates are able to work at a high / medium level within international environments (NATO, EU, UN, OSCE, etc.) as staff officers or in other positions.

MSc in Logistics of Military Operations
(1 year programme, 60 ECTS)

This programme aims to develop the knowledge and skills of students who graduated from the Military Logistics BSc programme, further. These trained and qualified military logistics leaders are able to cope with the leadership challenges of logistics units and those of branches at the tactical-operational interface. Based on their skills in military economy, logistical support, methodology and leadership, and due to their knowledge of military science and understanding of economic and military law, structures, and functions of other areas of public services, they can meet the logistic requirements of an ever-changing operational environment.

MSc in Military Infocommunications and Electronic Warfare
(1-year programme, 60 ECTS)

This programme mainly aims to give further education and training for military officers from the field of military aviation technical and air traffic management, signal and military information technology, signal intelligence and electronic warfare.

MSc in Defence C3 Systems Manager
(2-year programme, 120 ECTS)

This programme aims to train both military and civilian professionals for the Hungarian Defence Forces, the disaster management services, the defence administration at large, the civilian security services, and the broader defence community who are able to provide for the proper planning, organisation, supervision and secure working of the various command, control and communications systems in use or planned to be used.

MA in International Defence and Security Policy
(2-year programme, 120 ECTS)

This programme builds upon the knowledge students acquired during their BA-level studies either at the Faculty or in other undergraduate programmes complying with the entry requirements of the Master's programme. The careful development of these programmes goes back two decades. As a result of continuous curriculum development in the field of security and defence policy, Ludovika-UPS has managed to create a unique teaching programme. No other university in Hungary has these kinds of programmes in their portfolio. There is also a PhD programme in this field within the Doctoral School of Military Sciences at the University and is available both in English and Hungarian.

7.2.6. DEGREE PROGRAMMES (POSTGRADUATE)

Senior Military Leadership

(1-year programme, 6o ECTS)

This programme, also called the General Staff Course, aims to educate those selected military leaders who, based on their analytic, planning, organisational and command and control skills, are able to act in various high- and higher-level leadership positions in the Ministry of Defence and the Hungarian Defence Forces, both in Hungary and abroad, and in the framework of international organisations such as NATO, the EU and the OSCE.

Radicalism and Religious Extremism

(1-year programmed, 6o ECTS)

This programme aims to train officers and employees of the state administration to recon religious extremism and differentiate it from the regular practices of religious communities. Graduates possess a broad knowledge on the role religious communities play in society and deep information on the various religious extremist groups active in the crisis areas of the world.



7.2.7. DOCTORAL SCHOOLS

Doctoral School of Military Sciences

The Doctoral School of Military Science (DSMS) aims to pursue the research areas of military science. According to the Hungarian Academy of Sciences' classification, military science is considered as part of the social sciences. The DSMS focuses on the issues of military science regarding the activities of the defence sphere. This includes a wide spectrum of research fields, from military history through security theories and defence administration to national security. The mission of the Doctoral School is to provide quality education and to ensure that PhD graduates become successful military theory and practice-oriented researchers at both national and international level, who are capable of utilising their knowledge and widely publishing their results.

The admission of graduates from other universities with a scientific background is also possible. The international scientific recognition of the Doctoral School can be most easily demonstrated by the number of foreign students who have completed their PhD studies and who came from countries including Austria, France, Italy, the People's Republic of China, Slovenia, Ukraine, and the United States as well.

DSMS's research areas are as follows:

- Security studies;
- Social sciences aspects of defence;
- The theory of military science;
- The theory of military art;
- Defence logistics and defence economy;
- National security;
- The theory of defence information and communication.

Doctoral School of Military Engineering

The Doctoral School of Military Engineering focuses on research fields that are specifically related to the military application of engineering. This includes training and preparation for scientific research in various related fields, ranging from basic and applied research and development, through technology and technology-transfer to technological innovation. The mission of the Doctoral School is to provide quality education and to ensure that PhD graduates become successful military theory and practice-oriented researchers at both national and international level, who are capable of utilising their knowledge and widely publishing their research findings.

The admission of graduates from other universities with a scientific background is also possible. The international scientific recognition of the Doctoral School can be most easily demonstrated by the number of foreign students who have completed their PhD studies and who came from countries including Austria, Chile, China, France, Germany, Jordan, the Netherlands, Pakistan, Romania and Slovakia.

Research areas:

- Military engineering infrastructure;
- Military technology and robotics;

7.3. FACULTY OF LAW ENFORCEMENT

7.3.1. ABOUT THE FACULTY

The predecessor of the Faculty of Law Enforcement, the Police College of Hungary, was established in 1970. Since then, it has been the top organisation in law enforcement education. Currently, the Faculty of Law Enforcement is the only higher education organisation in Hungary which is entitled to issue degrees required for the appointment of commissioned officers of the law enforcement agencies.

The mission of the Faculty of Law Enforcement is to provide training for future mid-level and high-level leaders of the Hungarian law enforcement agencies, such as the Hungarian National Police, the National Tax and Customs Office, the Prison Service of Hungary, the National Directorate-General for Disaster Management, the National Directorate-General for Alien Policing and the Counter-Terrorism Centre. The Faculty also has educational programmes for civilians who would like to work in the private security sector or municipal policing, and special educational programmes in the field of national security and disaster management as well. According to its mission, the main study and research fields at the Faculty of Law Enforcement are criminal law, criminal procedural law, criminology, criminalistics, forensic sciences, criminal psychology, cybersecurity, criminal pedagogy, border policing, traffic policing, counter-terrorism, covert intelligence, law and economics of taxation, alien law, national security studies, disaster management, protection of facilities and persons, private investigation and law enforcement leadership management.

The Faculty of Law Enforcement has the features of both a university school and a police academy: students (who are law enforcement cadets under Hungarian law) have to attend theoretical classes, take exams and write papers, but they also have to wear uniforms while at the university, attend special training classes (shooting, officer safety etc.), obey the formal rules governing the life of law enforcement officers in the field, pay respect to the traditions of the law enforcement community and, in the first academic year, it is compulsory for them to reside in the dormitory on the campus.



7.3.2. DEAN OF THE FACULTY

Prof. Dr. Gábor Kovács, Major General

Major General Gábor Kovacs is serving his first term as Dean of the Faculty of Law Enforcement in this academic year (from 2012 to 2019 he was the vice rector for education at the University of Public Service.) He is also the Head of the Department of Law Enforcement Management Theory. He started his career as a border guard officer in 1987.

He has been working in the field of officer training since 1989. During his work, he was continuously involved in the high quality education of the courses offered by the Faculty of Law Enforcement; he has regularly been conducting research in the field of law enforcement leadership and organisational theory, he published scientific articles in Hungarian and other languages as well; he was an active participant in the development of course and research materials of the Faculty; furthermore, as an academic and a supervisor, he has led the scientific and professional work of the students and doctoral students and the educational work of the lecturers.

From May 2009 to November 2011 he was the Resident Twinning Advisor of the “TR 07 IB JH 04 Action Plan on Integrated Border Management-Phase 1.” project for 18 months in Ankara, Turkey. He is a member of the public body of the Hungarian Academy of Sciences. The general has been the Vice President of the Association of European Police Colleges (AEPD) since 2019. He has many significant publications in the field of management theory.

7.3.4. DEGREE PROGRAMMES

Students at the Faculty are offered four-year full-time and three-year part-time BA programmes, two-year part-time MA programmes, three-term specialised further training courses, and also a four-year doctoral programme.

Degree Programmes in Hungarian

BA in Criminal Investigation
(4-year full-time programme, 240 ECTS)

Specialisations in:

- Criminal Intelligence
- Criminal Investigation
- Economic Crime Investigation
- Financial Crime Investigation
- Cybercrime Investigation

The goal of the Criminal Investigation BA Programme is to train highly qualified detectives who are able to conduct and eventually to lead investigations and to solve criminal cases. The specialisations prepare students for the different types of criminal investigations, but all focus on the special knowledge of criminalistics, criminology, criminal law and criminal procedural law needed to handle criminal cases and to obtain evidence regarding suspects. The Criminal Intelligence specialisation, which is not open to civilian applicants, introduces the covert intelligence methods allowed by law for use in Hungary in criminal cases. The Economic Crime Investigation specialisation adapts the existing overt and covert investigative methods to the fight against economic crimes and offers special classes in the field of financial law, commercial law and accounting. The Financial Crime Investigation specialisation prepares students to work in the Criminal Division of the National Tax and Customs Office. This BA programme is offered as a part-time programme as well, a good choice for non-commissioned law enforcement officers to obtain a BA degree in three years while working, to become eligible for appointment as a commissioned officer.

BA in Criminal Investigation Administration
(3-year part-time programme, 180 ECTS)

Specialisations in:

The goal and the content of the Criminal Investigation Administration BA Programme are mostly identical to the Criminal Investigation BA Programme mentioned before. The main difference between the two is that this is a part-time course, and the students are non-commissioned officers who are working in the field.

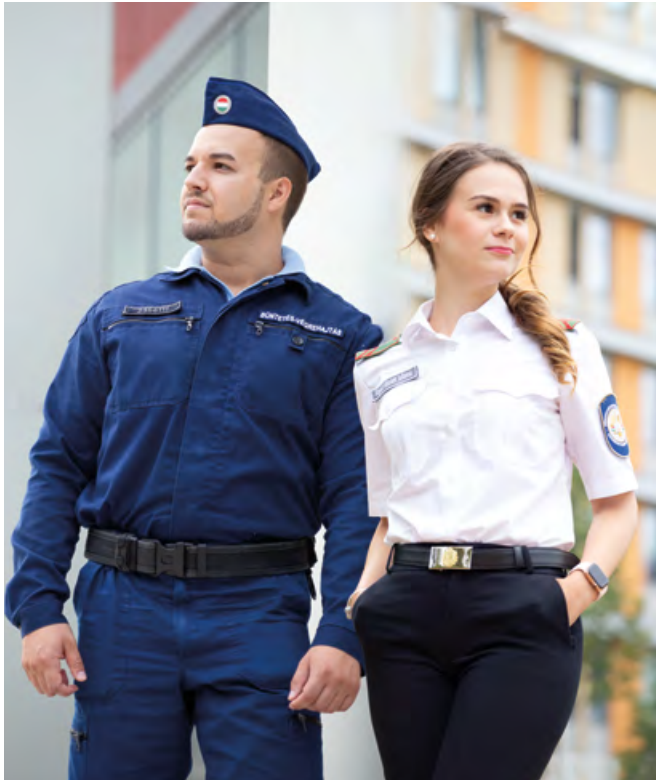
BA in Law Enforcement Administration
(3-year part-time programme, 180 ECTS)

Specialisations in:

- Private Security (for civilians)
- Corrections (for correctional officers only)
- Administrative Policing
- Border Policing
- Migration Administration (for civilians)
- Traffic Policing
- Public Order Policing
- Customs and Excise Administration

The Law Enforcement BA Programme is the most diverse educational programme at the Faculty of Law Enforcement. It includes specialisations for classic police fields, but two civilian specialisations are also part of the programme. One of them is on private security, which prepares students to become CEOs or other leaders of private security companies offering protection for persons and property (even as armed security guards), or eventually private investigation services. The other civilian training is Migration Administration: students will have career opportunities in the National Directorate-General for Alien Policing, handling immigration cases. The Corrections specialisation is not open for the general

public; only correctional officers can be enrolled into the programme, where they can improve their knowledge on handling, guarding, educating, and rehabilitating inmates. Traffic Policing is one of the classic police fields; the specialisation prepares police cadets to carry out tasks in traffic control. Public Order Policing specialisation graduates are trained to organise and carry out leadership tasks in activities related to police support units, maintaining public order, and managing special situations. The Public Administration in Police Matters specialisation is for police cadets who will work as police officers handling cases and matters under the jurisdiction of the police except for criminal cases and law and order matters, such as gun control administration, control over private security companies and procedures conducted against perpetrators of administrative infractions. Hungary does not have a separate border guard agency; the Border Policing specialisation is for police cadets who will later carry out tasks related to border enforcement (e.g. border surveillance, administration of aliens, conducting criminal investigations and handling asylum cases.) Students choosing the Customs and Excise Administration specialisation will learn about the policy and law of tariffs, excise and trade. The Private Security, Corrections, and Migration specialisations are offered in the form of full-time studies as well.



BA in Law Enforcement
(4-year full-time programme, 240 ECTS)

Specialisations in:

- Border Policing
- Migration administration
- Customs and Excise Administration
- Administrative Policing
- Public Order Policing
- Traffic Policing

The contents of the specialisations in this BA programme are for the most part identical to those in the Law Enforcement Administration BA Programme presented above. The main difference is that this is a full-time programme that lasts for four years instead of three. Originally, these specialisations were three years long as well but, in 2017, the programme was modified in order to improve the curricula of the specialisations and to be able to provide increased knowledge for students during their studies.

BA in Disaster Management
(3-year programme, 180 ECTS)

Specialisations in:

- Disaster Management Operations
- Fire Protection and Rescue Control
- Industrial Safety

The programme aims to train Disaster Management specialists who, employed by full-time professional local government or industrial fire brigades, are capable of carrying out tasks related to disaster management, fire protection, and industrial safety. They also need to possess the necessary knowledge of legislation, standards, principles, procedures, and devices applied in disaster, fire protection and industrial safety management. Graduates have career opportunities in disaster management, within fire prevention and fire brigades, in public administration and many different sectors of the economy.



BSc in Fire Safety Engineering

(4-year programme, 240 ECTS)

Applicants can acquire the necessary authorisations and knowledge to carry out fire safety engineering activities linked to various qualifications. Such authorisations and knowledge are necessary to deal with fire prevention planning activities, to manage fire protection expert activities, to acquire knowledge of the fire protection of buildings, fire extinguishing technical equipment, industrial fire protection and fire inspection. The state administration and business organisations also can employ graduate fire safety engineers. The qualification can also enable its holder to implement technical planning, organisation, analysis and evaluation tasks related to disaster management, civil protection, industrial safety and fire protection positions, which are subject to a higher professional qualification in the fire protection branches of business organisations. Another important area of application for the programme's graduates is performing technical engineering tasks to be undertaken in the firefighting specialist areas of professional disaster protection, in the fire protection service of local governments, facility fire departments, and volunteer firefighting associations.

MA in Law Enforcement Leadership Management

(2-year part-time programme, 120 ECTS)

Specialisations in:

- Law Enforcement Theory
- Commanding Police Support Units
- Crime Analysis and Assessment
- Combating Organised Crime
- Integrated Border Management

Applicants can be enrolled into this master's programme if they are employed by a law enforcement or national security agency at the time of the application, they hold a university degree and they have served as officers at least for two years at a law enforcement or national security agency after graduating from university. The goal of the master's programme is to improve students' leadership and management skills, to train law enforcement professionals who are suitable for mid-level or high-level leadership positions in the fields of justice, local government, corrections, policing, disaster management, private security and national security, as well as in the financial sector and positions at the National Tax and Customs Office.

MA in Disaster Management

(2-year programme, 120 ECTS)

The Disaster Management MA course integrates the three professional fields of Disaster Management, namely civil protection, fire protection, and industrial safety, putting special emphasis on the development of the leadership skills of disaster management. The course aims to provide graduates with knowledge of disaster management law, defence and security policy, human resources policy and leadership, and management methodology as well. These main skills are all necessary to fulfil middle and senior management positions in disaster management, public administration and municipal bodies, and in private sector safety organisations.

MA in Criminalistics

(2-year part-time programme, 120 ECTS)

Specialisations for:

- civilians,
- law enforcement officers.

Applicants can be enrolled into this master's programme if they are employed by a law enforcement agency at the time of the application, they hold a university degree, and they have served as officers at least for three years at a law enforcement agency after graduating from university. The goal of the master's programme is to improve the investigation skills of the students by introducing the traditional tools and methods used in criminalistics, but also the newest achievements in forensic sciences, by presenting and explaining all effective investigative measures and tactics that detectives have to use to solve criminal cases. Most of the subjects in this programme are connected to criminalistics and criminal procedural law. Graduates from the specialisation for law enforcement officers will be qualified to fill mid-level and high-level positions in law enforcement agencies.

MA in Security Management

(2-year programme, 120 ECTS)

Applicants can be enrolled into this master's programme if they have 60 ECTS deriving from prior studies, in the following fields: law enforcement, social studies, legal studies, general management studies, special professional management studies, financial-economic studies, public administration and law studies, economic management studies and European Union studies. A precondition for admission to the master's training is that the applicant holds at least 30 credits in the studies listed above. Fifteen credits from work experience may be acknowledged. Missing credits must be acquired concurrently with the master's training. The goal of the programme is to train security managers who are capable of designing and operating the integrated security systems of civil law legal entities and public institutions, in cooperation with state and municipal law enforcement, security technology and security management specialists. Most of the subjects in this programme are connected to close protection and property protection, leadership skills, information protection and general corporate security studies. Graduates from the Security Management MA programme will be qualified to fill mid-level and high-level positions in private security agencies.

7.3.5. DOCTORAL SCHOOL OF LAW ENFORCEMENT

Established in 2015, the Doctoral School of Law Enforcement is currently the single doctoral school in Hungary explicitly focusing on research issues of law enforcement. Police sciences are in a unique position in the field of higher education in general, particularly in what pertains to research, development and training. The doctoral education in the Doctoral School of Law Enforcement is based on research-oriented scientific knowledge to facilitate the spread of knowledge-based police culture. The Doctoral School bears responsibility for ensuring the scientific quality of research in policing and also for conducting experiments that are “exploratory” in nature and serve as a scientific foundation of police science education and the operation of law enforcement organisations in alignment with the rule of law. The aim of the scientific activities of the Doctoral School of Law Enforcement is to improve the quality of national public service and to provide for its constant renewal; furthermore, its goal is to become an innovative and internationally acknowledged knowledge and development centre. In addition to the other faculties, institutes and organisational units of Ludovika-UPS, the Doctoral School intends to involve scholars from external partners (international partners, universities, and research institutes) to enhance the research programmes in law enforcement. The Doctoral School offers several formats of education; hence PhD students have the choice of full time (scholarship or self-financed) studies, part-time (self-financed) studies and individual training (self-financed) or individual preparation.

The research themes of the Doctoral School of Law Enforcement fit into three main fields:

- general theory, history of policing, national security and policing
- special policing fields, EU and international relations within policing
- legal, sociological and criminological aspects of policing activity, including criminalistics in the field of policing.



7.3.6. INSTITUTE FOR DISASTER MANAGEMENT

The Institute of Disaster Management is an educational unit of the Faculty of Law Enforcement. It is responsible for providing high-quality training through the six-semester bachelor's and four-semester master's programmes in Disaster Management. The bachelor's programme offers three specialisations, namely Disaster Management Operations, Fire Protection and Rescue Management, and Industrial Safety. The Institute also provides the possibility to pursue doctoral studies in the field of Disaster Management at the University's Doctoral School of Military Engineering.

The aim of the Disaster Management education programmes at the Institute is to train experts who are capable of carrying out tasks related to disaster management, fire protection and industrial safety, and who have the necessary knowledge of legislation, standards, principles, procedures and tools applied in disaster management. The mission of the Institute is to provide harmonised and planned training based on shared values and to enhance mobility in the students' future careers, as well as to support cooperation between public services.

Director of the Institute

Colonel Dr. habil. Gyula Vass was born in 1957. He has been leading the Institute of Disaster Management since 2017. Colonel Dr. Vass holds Master's degrees in civil engineering (1991) and fire engineering (1986). He defended his PhD thesis in the field of military sciences, disaster management in 2006 at the Zrínyi Miklós National Defence University. In 2016 he habilitated at Ludovika-UPS and he has been a full-time associate professor since 2017. He holds positions at fire and disaster management organisations as a firefighter, fire prevention officer, industrial safety expert and fire chief. He is a member of the Scientific Council for Disaster Management, the Technical Scientific Section for Nuclear Accident Prevention, and the Nuclear Energy Certification Commission.

7.4. FACULTY OF WATER SCIENCES

7.4.1. ABOUT THE FACULTY

The Faculty of Water Sciences (FWS) is the youngest faculty of Ludovika-UPS, beginning its operation in Baja on 1 February 2017. Thanks to our predecessors, the Faculty has a legacy of 60 years in higher education. The water science education in Baja has nationwide significance and appreciation. The water management of the future will fundamentally define the world's and Hungary's development, economic performance, food security, environmental status and also the life quality of the population. The availability of water in adequate quantity and quality and protection from water damage make water management a strategic sector, with engineering and water diplomacy knowledge being among the most important assets of our time. In the Civil Engineering, Environmental Engineering and Water Operation Engineering degree programmes of FWS, students are trained to meet the greatest environmental and social challenges of the 21st century as well to handle the problems of water shortage and water management. In our two-year MA programme in International Water Governance and Water Diplomacy, a new programme started in 2020, we offer up-to-date, practice-oriented education for practicing and future water managers, diplomats and national and international civil servants engaged in transboundary or global environmental issues.

7.4.2. DEAN OF THE FACULTY

Dr. habil. Tibor Bíró PhD

Dr Tibor Bíró graduated from the University of Debrecen as an agricultural engineer in 1994; and from the University of Veszprém as an environmental engineer in 2005. He defended his PhD thesis (Examination of the major environmental parameters required for the establishment of water management interventions) in 1998.

His special field is the investigation of excess inland water phenomena and the application of integrated and adaptive water management. He also deals with precision drainage and irrigation systems.

He is a member of the Public Body of the Hungarian Academy of Sciences (HAS), the Hungarian Hydrological Society (HHS) and also of its Scientific Council. Mr. Bíró is the Chairman of the Section of Agricultural Water Management. He is a permanent member of the Scientific Council of the Government Coordination Committee at the National Directorate-General for Disaster Management and its Industrial Safety Advisory Board; he is also a member of the Scientific Council at the General Directorate of



Water Management. He is a member of the National Council for Water Resource Management and Secretary of the Subcommittee on Water and the Environment (HAS). He was a permanent member of the Presidential Water Science Committee (HAS), the Professional Advisory Board of the National Water Strategy and a member of the Professional Advisory Board of the National Water Strategy (Kvassay Jenő Plan).

Our graduates are qualified to manage simple planning and research tasks independently, at a level aligned with the regulations. They are also able to participate in more complex planning tasks. After the acquisition of the necessary practice, our graduates also qualify as registered civil engineers at the Hungarian Chamber of Engineers

for design and consultancy.

Most of our graduates establish their careers at public regional water management authorities and companies in the water sector. The practical knowledge gained by our graduate civil engineers is internationally recognised.

With specialisations in:

- regional water management (flood control, river management, drainage and irrigation, hydrology and hydrometry, integrated river basin management)
- water supply and wastewater treatment (urban water management and sewerage)

BSc in Environmental Engineering

(a 7-semester, 210 ECTS training programme) in Hungarian and English

This course provides environmental engineers with up-to-date skills in ecology, technology, economics and management, so that they can organise and supervise disaster management and remediation activities. Our graduates have professional skills that enable them to reduce and eliminate existing environmental risks, harms, and damage, make sustainable use of natural resources, and implement and operate low-waste technologies. They can devise technological solutions for reclaiming waste and disposing of hazardous waste.

Our graduates possess general knowledge in the fields of environmental policy and the protection of nature and the landscape. They also have a good command of at least one foreign language and are able to liaise with foreign experts and participate in international teamwork.

BSc in Water Operation Engineering

(a 6-semester, 180 ECTS training programme) in Hungarian

The course trains water operation engineers, who will be able to work independently in the operation, maintenance and management of regional and urban water management facilities and contribute to administrative tasks. Our graduates establish their careers at public regional water management authorities and companies in the water sector. The practical knowledge gained by our graduate engineers is internationally recognised.

With specialisations in:

- regional water management (flood control, river management, drainage and irrigation, hydrometry)
- water supply and wastewater treatment (urban water management and sewerage utilities)
- hydrogeology and water acquisition.

MA in International Water Governance and Water Diplomacy

(a 4-semester 120 ECTS training programme) in English

The two-year MA programme in International Water Governance and Water Diplomacy offers up-to-date, practice-oriented education for practicing and future water managers, diplomats, national and international civil servants engaged in transboundary or global environmental issues. Based on a blend of natural and social sciences, extensive field training and project-based teamwork, the programme is aimed at enabling students to master complex water policy challenges, and decision and conflict situations, as the knowledge of how to prevent, manage and resolve water conflicts at the domestic and international level will be a critical asset for the prosperity and stability of any nation in the 21st century.

8. NON-FACULTY DEPARTMENTS

8.1. EÖTVÖS JÓZSEF RESEARCH CENTRE

The Research Centre was established on 1 February 2019 and currently operates with ten institutes and a research group. The main objective of the Centre is to conduct multidisciplinary research on a strategic level through its institutes on key research areas that have the potential to be incorporated into the educational activities and curriculum of the faculties. Due to its structure, the Centre is able to cover a broad range of research topics through its institutes. Research is conducted – among others – on America-related issues and American-Hungarian relations, cybersecurity and cyber-awareness, audiovisual media, intellectual property, the processes of the European Union, political theory, defence policy, strategic planning and military operations.

The Centre also aims to strengthen cooperation between Ludovika-UPS and other institutes of higher education and research institutions.

Director of the Eötvös József Research Centre

Dr. Bernát Török has been leading the Eötvös József Research Centre since 2019. He is a lecturer at Ludovika-UPS from 2015 onwards and since 2019 he has been an associate professor at the Department of Constitutional and Comparative Public Law of Ludovika-UPS. His areas of research are freedom of expression and new technologies, the regulation of platforms, artificial intelligence and fundamental rights. Director Bernát Török earned his PhD degree from the University of Szeged, Faculty of Law and Political Science in 2018. Between 2010 and 2018 he worked as a senior advisor at the Constitutional Court of Hungary. Prior to that, between 2006 and 2010, he was the head of Cabinet at the National Board of Radio and Television.

8.1.1. INSTITUTE FOR AMERICAN STUDIES

Complementing the diverse faculties of the University, the Institute brings together scholars, practitioners and career professionals of their fields to provide access to an array of multidisciplinary research tools and information resources on contemporary political, economic and national security developments in the United States. The Institute regularly welcomes visiting scholars and professionals from the U.S. and Europe, particularly those whose expertise includes not only America-related issues, but also matters directly or indirectly relevant to the interests of Hungary and its Central European neighbourhood. The Institute also sponsors a host of educational and research programmes and activities of interest both for students and faculties, and has launched a publications programme aimed at addressing many of the top U.S. policy issues of our time, particularly those that impact the Central European region.

Balázs Mártonffy is the director of the American Studies Research Institute and a non-resident fellow at the International Center for Security and Leadership in Colorado. In his policy career, Balázs was most recently the Deputy Director for Security Policy at the Hungarian Ministry of Foreign Affairs. He previously served as a civilian defence official with the Hungarian Ministry of Defence and as a defence policy intern with NATO's international staff in Brussels. His work on international security, great power politics and alliance cohesion has been published by Routledge and ABC-CLIO, and appeared in The Washington Post's Monkey Cage, War on the Rocks, The Conversation, International Security Network, Atlantic Community, and in various Hungarian outlets as well.



8.1.2. EUROPE STRATEGY RESEARCH INSTITUTE

The Research Institute contributes to the development of the European policy of Hungary, analyses Hungarian and European processes, and conducts and organises multidisciplinary research in relation to the history, functioning, and future of the European Union, the common values of the European states that underpin the European unification process, the European idea and the issues of European integration.

Until the end of May 2022, the Europe Strategy Research Institute was led by Dr. Tibor Navracsics, currently Minister for Regional Development and elected MP for the Veszprém 03 individual constituency district. Tibor Navracsics was European Commissioner for Education, Culture, Youth and Sport between 2014 and 2019. In 2010–2014 he was Minister for Administration and Justice and Deputy Prime Minister.

Since June 2022, the Europe Strategy Research Institute is led, as its managing director, by Dr Balázs Tárnok.

8.1.3. RESEARCH INSTITUTE OF COMPETITIVENESS AND ECONOMY

The Research Institute analyses the conditions of and trends in national competitiveness, and its international methodology, with special regard to the economic policy and public finance conditions. The Institute develops its research connections with international and domestic organisations involved in measuring and developing competitiveness. The Institute strengthens the synergies and cooperation between the University's economics departments and other Hungarian economic research institutes.

Dr. Gábor Kutasi, who holds a PhD in economics, is the head of the Research Institute of Competitiveness and Economy at Ludovika-UPS. He was a docent at Corvinus University of Budapest between 2002 and 2017. His PhD thesis was about the fiscal policy of new EU member states in relation to monetary integration and competitiveness. He habilitated in 2016 at Corvinus University of Budapest. His main research fields: fiscal policy, exchange rate policy, labour migration in the EU, trade theory and industrial clusters. Previously, he was a researcher in the ICEG European Centre's economic research team, and lecturer at the International Business School; he also worked for GKI Economic Research Co. as an external researcher.



8.1.4. INSTITUTE OF THE INFORMATION SOCIETY

The Institute of the Information Society at Ludovika-UPS (Budapest) advances interdisciplinary research that aims to explore the deep impact of information services and new technologies on our individual and social life, fundamental rights and democratic public discourse. In the Institute, researchers with diverse academic backgrounds and practical experience work together to analyse and understand the complex features and dilemmas of the information society. The Institute seeks to follow the flowing reality of information, big data and communication, to identify developments that need to be addressed by regulation and to elaborate policy recommendations. The Research Institute seeks to take an active part in the vibrant international academic and public discussions about the challenges of our 21st-century digital culture.

The Institute of the Information Society is led by Director Dr. Bernát Török.

8.1.5. INSTITUTE OF CYBER SECURITY

The Research Institute aims to promote the University's research effectiveness and to coordinate the research cooperation with the relevant higher education, governmental and international actors, building upon the synergies between university research projects on cyber-security, especially through the coordination of research in the field of information security, cybercrime, cyber-warfare, cyber-defence, and related information technology studies.

The head of the Institute is Dr. Csaba Krasznay, who has been an Associate Professor at Ludovika-UPS since 2012. Csaba Krasznay conducts research into cyber-security at Ludovika-UPS, where he also leads several projects and a Master's Degree programme. He has been a research fellow at TalTech University in Estonia since 2019. He is a member of the board at the Hungarian E-government Association and Voluntary Cyber-Defence Coalition. He received his MSc in Electrical Engineering at Budapest University of Technology and Economics, and his PhD at Ludovika-UPS in 2012. He was elected as the "Most Influential IT Security Expert of the Year 2011".

8.1.6. INSTITUTE OF CENTRAL EUROPEAN STUDIES

The Research Institute conducts multidisciplinary research on the common historical and cultural heritage of the Central European countries, their political and administrative traditions their relationship with other European countries with different constitutional traditions, and highlights possibilities for future cooperation between these states. The Institute also organises inter-institutional training courses on these subjects.

Dr. Pál Hatos is a historian and legal expert. He began his career as a high-school teacher at the Piarist High School of Budapest then taught at the Department of Cultural History at ELTE. He earned his PhD in 2000 with a dissertation on the history of ideas of the Reformation of Geneva. In 2001/2003 and 2004/2005 he was a guest lecturer at Indiana University in the USA. Besides his academic work, he worked at the Ministry of Justice and the Ministry of Education. He was the Head of the Office of the Hungarian Committee of Scholarships, then he was the Chancellor of the Moholy-Nagy University of Art and Design between 2006 and 2010. From 2010 until 2014 he was the Director of the most important institution of Hungarian cultural diplomacy, the Balassi Institute. In 2014 he was elected Vice-President of the EU National Institutes for Culture. Since March 2015, he has been the Dean of the Rippl-Rónai Faculty of Art of the University of Kaposvár, where he is also the Director of the Institute of Theory of Art and Cultural Studies.



8.1.7. THE THOMAS MOLNAR INSTITUTE FOR ADVANCED STUDIES

The main aim of the Thomas Molnar Institute for Advanced Studies is to conduct research on the development of the Hungarian and international political thinking in the 19-20th centuries and to support those researchers who deal with this research area.

The so-called “Research Group for the Present Times,” charged with the preservation of the most important documents of the political transitions of 1990, also belonged to the Centre until 2016. From now on, the Archive and Library of Ludovika-UPS is taking on the preservation of the archive documents.

Dr. Attila Molnár Károly is an Associate Professor with habilitation and the Head of the Thomas Molnar Institute for Advanced Studies. His research areas are sociology and political sciences including the history of ideas. He has been a researcher at Ludovika-UPS since 2013. He habilitated at Pázmány Péter Catholic University in 2005, presenting a dissertation written about Edmund Burke. He is a guest lecturer at many foreign universities.

8.1.8. RESEARCH INSTITUTE FOR POLITICS AND GOVERNMENT

The mission of the Research Institute is to pursue research into political theory and the theory of government within the disciplinary frameworks of government studies and political philosophy. Its main objective is to publish in the reputable national and international fora of these disciplines, but it will also organise conferences at home and abroad to become integrated into the leading national and international research networks of the aforementioned sciences. The Institute takes responsibility for researching in both Hungarian and English. It is also eager to participate in international programmes, in the best traditions of Hungarian academia. Its primary aim is high-standard theoretical work, excluding partisanship or party-political engagement, but with the intention of providing research output for educational benefits to the alma mater and also of serving the general public in well-established as well as novel forms of academic communication.

Dr. Ferenc Hörcher is a political philosopher, historian of political thought, and philosopher of art. He studied in Budapest (Hungary), Oxford (UK), and Brussels/Leuven (Belgium). He is director of the Research Institute of Politics and Government and senior researcher at the Institute of Philosophy of the Hungarian Academy of Science. He was visiting professor at the Jagiellonian University, Kraków (Poland), and the Babes-Bolyai University in Cluj-Napoca (Kolozsvár, Romania). He researched in Vienna (Austria), Göttingen (Germany), Wassenaar (the Netherlands), Cambridge (UK), Edinburgh (UK), and at Notre Dame University (USA). His research interests include conservatism and liberalism, the history of early modern political thought, classical Hungarian political thought, urban political thought in a historical perspective and early modern and contemporary philosophy of art.

8.1.9. INSTITUTE FOR STRATEGIC AND DEFENCE STUDIES

The Institute for Strategic and Defence Studies is the successor of the Institute for Strategic and Defence Studies established in 1992. As a consequence of the continued reform of the wider institutional framework, the former Institute functioned in various arrangements under the Hungarian Ministry of Defence, then from 2007, under the National Defence University, and finally, from 1 January 2012, under Ludovika-UPS.

The Institute’s mission is to provide decision-makers with appropriate and up-to-date background analysis in the fields of security and defence policy, strategic planning, and military operations, as well as to observe and analyse the relation of the Hungarian armed forces to Hungarian society. Besides, the ISDS is actively involved in the social dialogue and discourse on ‘security’ through the media and education.

The Head of the Institute is Dr. Péter Tálas, senior research fellow of Ludovika-UPS. Péter Tálas was the Dean of the Faculty of International and European Studies at Ludovika-UPS between 2014 and 2019. He was also the Director of the predecessor of the Institute, the Centre for Strategic and Defence Studies. Péter Tálas earned his Master’s degree from Eötvös Loránd University of Sciences, Faculty of Humanities in 1985. In 1993 he completed his PhD in Modern and Contemporary History. In 1997 he was a Candidate in Political Sciences at the Hungarian Academy of Sciences. Péter Tálas is the Editor in Chief of the Hungarian journal “Nemzet és Biztonság” a peer-reviewed journal on security and defence policy in Hungary.



8.1.10. RELIGION AND SOCIETY RESEARCH INSTITUTE

The research institute, as the legal successor of Religion and Security Research workgroup of the Faculty of Military Sciences and Officer Training at Zrínyi Miklós National Defence University, is in charge of maintaining the various research activities on religions and security studies. Furthermore, the institute examines the broader scope of the various implications and effects of religions on society. The research institute shares an extensive network of foreign relations. It is of outstanding importance to unfold the religious and social characteristics of the Central and East European countries. Among the academic research fields, one may find disciplines such as Holy See studies, the religious implications of migration, religious affairs in democratic societies, religions and secular challenges, interfaith dialogue, minor churches and denominations and the special nexus between state and church.

The Head of the Institute, Lóránd Ujházi, a theologian and canon law jurist, gained his Ph.D. at Santa Croce University, Rome in 2007, and at the University of Public Service, Budapest in 2012. He habilitated in military sciences in 2017 and his research areas are religion and security, the role of the Holy See in international law and conflict management.

8.1.11. SPACE LAW AND POLICY RESEARCH CENTRE

The use and exploration of outer space is now one of the most dynamically developing areas, the results of which are becoming part of our everyday lives. While natural science research related to space has been at a high level in Hungary for a long time, legal and other social sciences have hardly been discussed with scientific needs in relation to space exploration.

However, at the dawn of the new space age, the problems and uncertainty surrounding the questions of space mining, space traffic management, space debris, inter alia, need clear legal, regulatory answers. Moreover, Hungary is preparing to develop its space capabilities significantly in this decade.

In view of the above, the University of Public Service of Hungary has decided to take the initiative and address legal, security and sociological issues. The tasks of the recently established research group are threefold:

1. Bringing together the leading researchers and experts from Hungarian scientific life with the aim of researching space law and space policy.
2. Promoting the education of future practitioners and researchers through curriculum development.
3. Involving the university, in cooperation with other Hungarian and foreign universities, in international scientific cooperation through joint research projects and conferences.

The head of the research group is Balázs Bartóki-Gönczy, who is an assistant professor of the Faculty of Public Governance and International Studies, Department of Public Communications at Ludovika-UPS and a member of the Council of the Institute of Telecommunications and Space Law, Paris (IDEST). His research interests are space law, electronic communications law and new media regulation.



8.2. OTHER CENTRAL INSTITUTIONS

8.2.1. INSTITUTE FOR NATIONAL SECURITY

The Institute for National Security is responsible for national security education and training under the direct control of the Rector. The Institute is rooted in the Department of Military National Security, which began the training of military national security specialists at the former military higher education institution in the early 2000s. Given the increasing number of civilian national security experts involved in the training, it was a logical step from the new university to organise training courses within its institutional framework, through military and civilian departments, in the form of civilian and military specifications corresponding to the needs of the clients. The bachelor's and master's programmes are provided mainly through correspondence courses and may be attended by members of the military and civilian national security services or of law enforcement agencies authorised to collect secret information. In addition to responding to the general statutory requirements, applicants must have the recommendation of the commander in charge of training enrolment and undergo security screening that does not reveal any risk factors. All this is needed to create and maintain a safe environment, a precondition for deep factual education and research. Throughout the training, we strive to bring practice and theory into synergy to provide qualified professionals and commanders to the military and civilian national security services and special police services.

The Institute offers a wide range of training courses: National Security Bachelor's and Master's Training (military national security specialisation), Civil National Security Bachelor's and Master's Training (human intelligence, technical intelligence and counter-terrorism specialisation).

In cooperation with the Military National Security Service, the Institute provides a national security senior management course, in the form of a correspondence course, with a duration of a year and a half. The Institute also provides teaching at various doctoral schools. The National Security College for Advanced Studies and the National Security Review, established in 2013, actively contribute to scientific research on the theory of national security.

The Institute enjoys the distinguished attention of the University's management and the personal and professional support of its clients, which are the national security services. The Institute has developed and aims to develop further its extensive cooperation with the actors of the public administration, law enforcement, and higher education sectors.

The purpose of the Institute

The basic purpose of the Institute is to provide Bachelor's (BSc) and Master's (MSc) training for the professional staff of national security services within the framework of university education.

In addition to this, the Institute organises, directs and participates in the implementation of the tasks related to the doctoral (PhD) and senior management (general staff) training provided in the field of national security science.

The Institute plans the educational tasks of national security and civilian national security training. With the involvement of officers responsible for the training, specialisations, and courses, it guides and coordinates the education and curriculum development of all related subjects. In accordance with the training programmes of the University and the training courses and specialisations of other faculties and institutes of the University, and based on curricula developed according to the justified needs, the Institute provides knowledge on the theoretical framework of national security, intelligence and disarmament to establish and develop the knowledge of university students and broadening their general knowledge, thus helping to promote awareness of national security.

The Institute organises and conducts scientific research on national security with the involvement of the lecturers and students of the BSc, MSc and PhD programmes.

The tasks of the Institute

Teaching tasks: The Institute fulfils its educational tasks through participation in Bachelor's (BSc), Master's (MSc) and Doctoral (PhD) courses, both in full-time and correspondence courses. Following the needs of the clients and the commitments of the University, the Institute contributes to the educational tasks of various training courses through its work with different departments. At the request of different departments and corresponding to their BSc, MSc, PhD courses, the Institute expands its supply of subjects in accordance with the goals and needs of the University.

Research tasks: The Institute carries out its research tasks following the University's scientific plans and contributes to their development. The Institute publishes the research findings in the form of university notes, other teaching materials, textbooks, monographs and other publications, in particular journal articles.

Director of the Institute for National Security

Dr. Imre Dobák has been the Director of the Institute for National Security since 2019, and the head of the Department of Civilian National Security since 2017. In 2001 he graduated summa cum laude in the Zrínyi Miklós National Defence University. In 2011 he was awarded a PhD degree in earth sciences at University of Pécs. He is the founding and an editorial board member of National Security Review (2013). In 2018 he habilitated at Ludovika-UPS in military sciences.

8.2.2. INSTITUTE FOR STRATEGIC STUDIES

The Institute, –, established in February 2019 – is responsible for planning and organising Hungarian and international training programmes of special importance for the strategic management of the public sector. The Institute focuses on the professional management of the “Europe of Nations Career Program”, on Central European and kin-state cooperation, international relations, talent management and global development policy, and its task is to coordinate and support the cooperation of university colleges for advanced studies.

However, the main pillar of the activities of the Institute is the supervision and professional management of the “Europe of Nations Career Program” – a joint course of the University of Public Service and the Ministry of Justice, launched in September 2020 with the aim of preparing young Hungarian officials for a successful selection procedure at the European Personnel Selection Office. The Institute is committed to ensuring and constantly improving the high standards of the Program, organises “Club Europe” events with the participation of high-level Hungarian and foreign invited guests and also a “study trip to Brussels” for the participants in the Programme to gain first-hand experiences from EU-diplomats on EU public service. In order to build a pool of Hungarian EU-experts, the Institute seeks regular contacts with the Alumni network of the Program. Detailed information about the “Europe of Nations Career Program” can be found in section 8.3.2.

The Institute organised several successful events (conferences, podium discussions, etc.) with the participation of distinguished international guests in 2021/2022 as well:

- Conversation series “Quo vadis Europe – after the German and before French elections”: Clément Beaune, French Secretary of State for European Affairs (12 October 2021), Jean-Thomas Lesueur, Managing Director of the Thomas More Institute, Paris (15 November 2021) and Jean-Louis Boulanges, Chairman of the Foreign Affairs Committee of the French National Assembly spoke about the future of Europe from a French point of view (French Presidency of the Council of the European Union 2022);
- “Club Europe” events – invited guests: Íñigo Mendez de Vigo, former Spanish Secretary of State for the European Union (19 November 2021), György Fóris, EU Expert, Founder of Bruxinfo (28 February 2022), Ursula Plassnik, Ambassador, former Austrian Foreign Minister (6 May 2022);
- Opening Ceremony of the John Lukacs Lounge at the University (2 December 2021): Exquisite pieces of John Lukacs’s legacy has been permanently exhibited in the Lounge named after the famous American historian of Hungarian descent;

- Conference on the occasion of the Hungarian Visegrad Presidency: “Common interests, common values? Germany and the Visegrad Four in a time of new challenges” (22 April 2022);
- “Essential Europe” – Podium discussion between Jean-Dominique Giuliani, President of the Robert Schuman Foundation in Paris and Tibor Navracsics, former Minister and EU Commissioner (10 May 2022);
- „Quo vadis, Bosnia and Herzegovina? Religion, Identity, and Statehood in Turbulent Times” – Keynote speaker: Dževada Šuško, Professor of International Relations, International University of Sarajevo, Head of International Cooperation, Islamic Community in Bosnia and Herzegovina (23 May 2022).

The Institute for Strategic Studies has also launched an online blog – or even an online space for mini-essays – called “Messzelátó” (Telescope) in 2021 in order to put developments into the spotlight that directly or indirectly affect national lobbying activities and to facilitate an understanding of Hungarian intentions and the political, economic and social processes of other European countries. The blog also provides good opportunities for the participants of the “Europe of Nations Career Program” to practice and improve their writing skills.

Director of the Institute

The director of the Institute is Ambassador Gergely Pröhle. He studied German, Hungarian studies and International Relations at Universities in Budapest, Jena and Hamburg. He graduated from the Faculty of Arts of Eötvös Loránd University in 1989. During his professional career, he worked at the Department of Foreign Languages of the Eötvös Loránd University, headed the Hungarian representation of the Friedrich Naumann Stiftung and, in 1998, became State Secretary for Administration at the Ministry of Culture. From 2000 to 2005 he served as Ambassador of Hungary in Berlin and then in Berne. After that, he worked in various positions in the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, with an interruption of four years when he worked in the business sector for an international consulting company. As Deputy State Secretary at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and then at the Ministry of Human Resources, he oversaw EU relations but his portfolio also included V4 Cooperation and the Central European Initiative. Since 2006, he has been the secular leader of the Hungarian Lutheran Church. He has received high German, Italian and Polish state awards. He is also the father of four children.



8.2.3. INSTITUTE FOR PUBLIC ADMINISTRATION FURTHER TRAINING

Head of Institute – Balázs Klotz

Balázs Klotz is a public administration consultant and certified public administration manager. He has been involved in the further training of public administrators and the administrative examination system since 2001. Since 2012, he has been working at the Institute for Public Administration Further Training at Ludovika-UPS, which he has overseen as Director since 2017.

He actively contributes to the development of the legal environment of the public service training and examination system with professional proposals. He has been involved in the design and implementation of several EU-funded projects.

His responsibilities include coordinating the organisation of administrative examinations at the national level, developing the electronic training management interface, and communicating and networking with the strategic partners of the public service training system of Ludovika-UPS.

Since 2012, Ludovika-UPS has been operating the public service further training system. The Institute for Public Administration Further Training is responsible for the conduct of further education and training in public service and the development of training programmes. The further training system has undergone significant changes in recent years, as it has to cope with the ever-changing social environment and meet the challenges posed by the new generation entering the civil service as well. As a result, the further training system today offers training programmes based on the individual development needs of administrators, modern learning tools (e-learning training, virtual classrooms), development programmes for the personalised career mobility of administrators (new in-service training, qualification

training programmes). Based on real training needs, it offers self-improvement and learning experience for the entire civil service corps.

The training courses consist of competence development classes based on active participation and creative, compelling study materials that facilitate the acquisition of theoretical knowledge. In addition to experiential learning, the sessions available in the training encourage administrators to think independently and improve their problem-solving skills.

Main tasks of the Institute:

- to run the entire education and examination system of further training, in order to ensure the continuing education of 68,000 civil servants countrywide;
- to develop and provide compulsory training for all public servants (except for a few institutions);
- to secure the most effective “learning environment” by creating e-learning platforms and providing online virtual classrooms;
- to improve teaching and learning methodologies (on-the-job; action learning) and to foster learning effectiveness;
- to provide leadership development and training programmes for executives of public administration

Target group

The target group for public service further training is government administrators and civil servants. Civil servants and government administrators obliged to undergo further training may fulfil their training obligation by enrolling in the courses included in the list of further training programmes. The completion of further training is measured by a system of study points.

Further training programme offer

In 2021–2022, Ludovika-UPS provided nearly 200 public service training courses for civil servants, most of which were e-learning courses, but it also included blended learning and attendance trainings. As in previous years, in 2021–2022, Ludovika-UPS’ e-learning training materials were the most popular among administrators. This lies in the flexibility of e-learning training: administrators can complete training in accordance with their own learning needs and schedule, regardless of time and geographical location. Nearly 2,500 people were trained within the framework of training based on attendance and blended learning methodology. This includes the training of about 500 managers.

Actors in the further training system

The operation of the public service training system is ensured by the continuous cooperation of several governmental and non-governmental actors. In addition to the ministerial management of the further training system, the Council for Public Service Further Training is responsible for the inclusion of further training programmes in the further training system (qualification, assignment of points) and the selection of trainers and experts.

The Institute for Public Administration Further Training performs the task of developing public service training programmes, as well as the training of the participating lecturers and experts, and also ensures the quality assurance of the system; and the institute is a producer of e-learning materials and a maintainer of the Probono training platform.

Methodology and technology

The Probono system is the digital teaching/learning portal of Ludovika-UPS, which provides a wide range of services to administrators to expand their professional knowledge and to develop their competencies, as well as to organise training sessions. Probono is also one of the largest e-learning portals in Hungary; it is the University’s own development. The system serves the needs of nearly 120,000 active users, taking the relevant legislative framework into account.

Probono provides an opportunity for users to plan and track their learning and training paths. The system also supports the learning activities of administrators, as the system can be used to complete training courses based on an e-learning methodology, as well as for competency measurement.

It uses the most up-to-date tools of learning methodology and technology, in the form of interactive videos with live characters, simulation e-training, rapid learning training materials, intelligent documents, “serious” games, and quiz applications offered for the civil servants in order to expand their knowledge and foster skills development.

The most impressive and typical elements of the system are the user-friendly presentation of the materials, self-evaluation tests, and further extras in order to intensify the learning experience. A system of further training and examinations cannot operate properly without the support of quality assurance according to the European standards. The operational processes are described by quality procedures that apply to all organisers and participants.

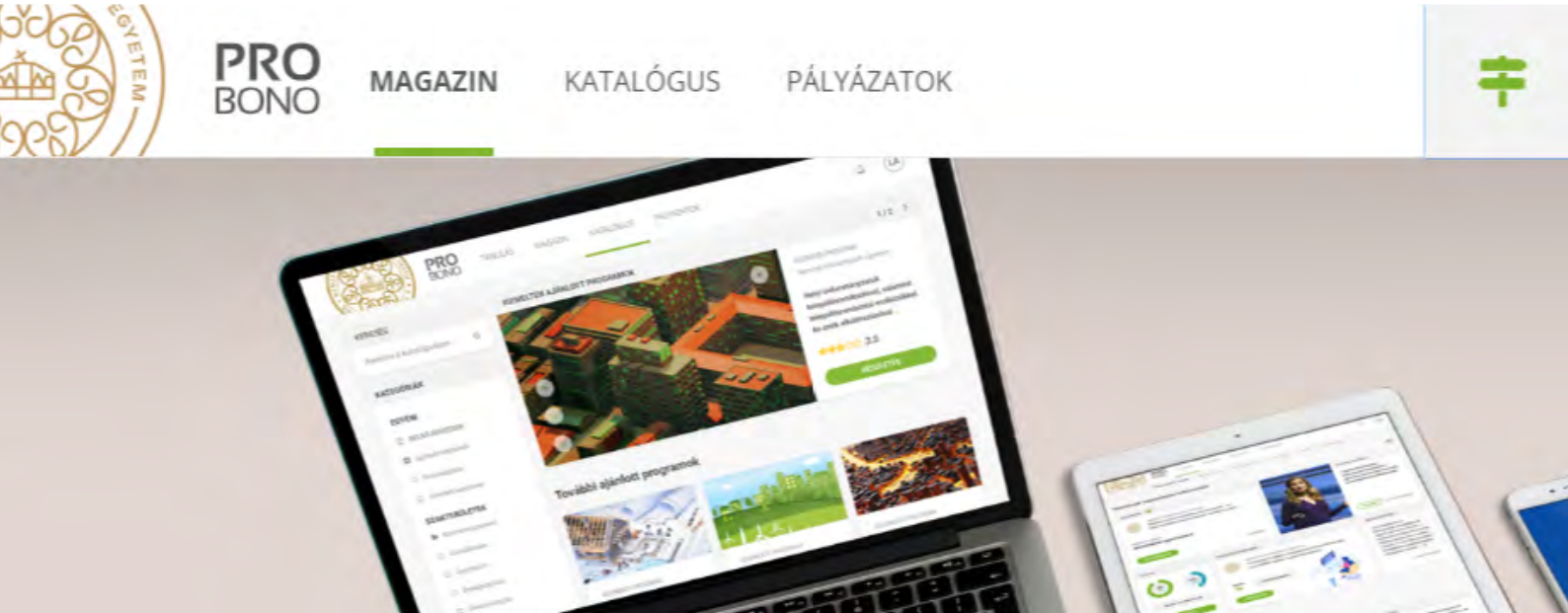


Postgraduate and specialist training programmes

In 2022, the Institute handled 16 specialised further training courses, in which a total of 389 people obtained diplomas certifying specialised professional qualifications.

In 2022, more than 20 students could finish their studies in two new further training programmes: Communication Specialist in Public, Service and in Social Administration.

8.3. INTER-INSTITUTIONAL EDUCATION PROGRAMMES

8.3.1. HUNGARIAN DIPLOMATIC ACADEMY

The Hungarian Diplomatic Academy, through the cooperation of Ludovika-UPS and the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade, is launching two training programmes: the Diplomat Training Programme and the Diplomatic Leadership Programme. These will provide for the supply and further training of specialists needed to implement the tasks of the public service in the field of foreign affairs.

The Diplomat Training Programme aims to provide the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade with a large supply of specialists having a wide range of skills. The training programme is open to anyone who meets the requirements for admission. The basic requirements having Hungarian citizenship, full legal capacity, a clean criminal record and a degree at BA/BSc-level at least (the degree certificate must be available by the start of the Programme), an adequate level of knowledge of foreign languages (advanced knowledge of English and intermediate knowledge of another foreign language). Candidates must also consent to undergo national security screening.

In the first semester, participants complete theoretical and practical courses. In the framework of various skills development courses and interactive thematic training sessions, they can acquire the professional and linguistic knowledge necessary for a career in the foreign service, while in the second semester they complete internship programmes at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade and Hungarian missions abroad. Students in the training programme receive a ministry scholarship during both semesters. The languages of the training are Hungarian and English. Graduates of the Diplomat Training Programme will have the opportunity to join the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade: the positions offered will be in Hungary, depending on the vacancies, and later, as for other ministry employees, the opportunity to apply for positions at missions abroad will be open to new employees as well.

The Diplomatic Leadership Programme aims to establish a hybrid approach – so far unknown in Hungary in the field of diplomatic training. The training programme combines the elements of professional diplomatic training, skill-oriented development training, and business-focused higher education programmes. The target group for the training programme is government administrators and civil servants working in the field of diplomacy or international relations in the public and central administration sector. The training programme is designed for invitation-based participation: the call for applications will be sent to the institutions of the target group. The languages of the training are Hungarian and English. Since January 2021, the Diplomatic Leadership Programme is an accredited postgraduate specialist training course of Ludovika – UPS, providing the participants with the qualification of an Executive Diplomatic Consultant with a university certificate.

8.3.2. EUROPE OF NATIONS CAREER PROGRAM

The Europe of Nations Career Program was launched in September 2020, in cooperation with the Ministry of Justice, with the objective of preparing young Hungarian professionals and public servants for a successful selection procedure at the European Personnel Selection Office, thus increasing the overall number of Hungarians in the institutions of the European Union. In order to enhance the efficiency of the lobbying skills of Hungary within the EU it is of vital importance to educate highly qualified, well-prepared young Hungarian professionals and public servants who possess the proper EU-institutional, legal and language knowledge.

The Program is supervised by Gergely Prőhle, Program Director and Head of its Governing Board. The duration of the first “Europe of Nations Career Program” was 6 months but from the second year (2021/2022) on, it has been extended to a one-year programme. The location of the training is the Ludovika Campus.

The main aims of the course:

- professional preparation for European public service, conducted by distinguished professors and lecturers;
- preparation for the selection procedure of the European Personnel Selection Office (EPSO),
- improving language skills through professional language courses.

Requirements for application:

- Hungarian citizenship,
- At least 8 completed university semesters, or
- BA-/MA-degree
- Under the age of 35 / no age limit in the case of public servants
- High level of English knowledge
- Successful fulfilment of the selection process (written test and orientation interview).

Main subjects of the Program:

History of the EU and its institutions, EU law, EU policies and decision-making, Differentiated integration in theory and in practice, EU communication, Current economic challenges of the EU, EU Diplomacy, EU policy of Hungary – efficient lobbying, Functioning of the European Parliament in practice, EU policies of the Member States; EU professional language, Career planning.

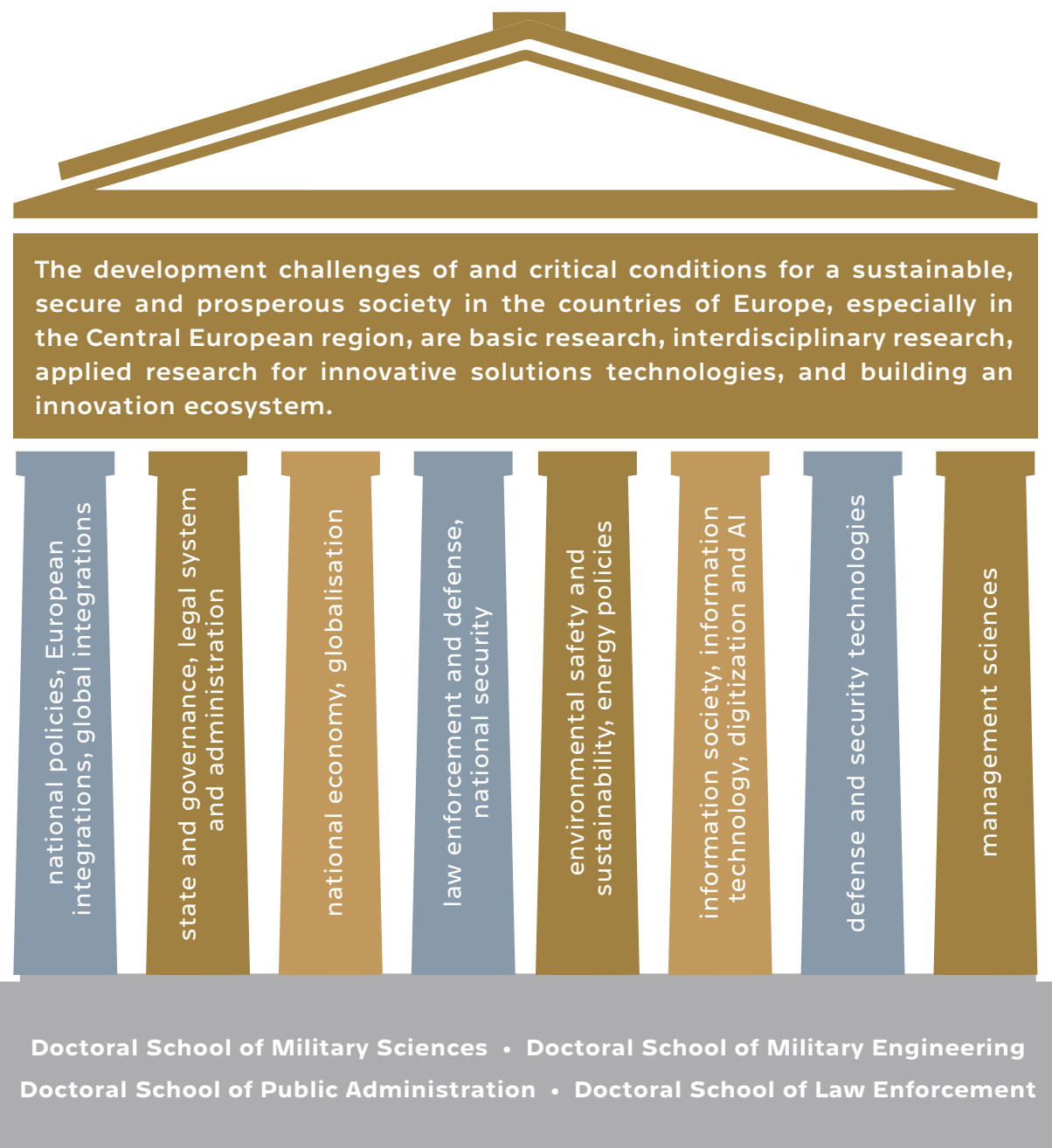
The courses (5 professional and 5 English EU-language classes a week) run in smaller groups for better efficiency. Contributing to the EU-professional training, there are other skills development (communication, negotiation, conflict management) courses as well. The Program ends with a final exam and a practice EPSO test. Those who pass the exam (with a result of at least 70%) receive a certificate. In 2021/2022 18 participants passed their final exams successfully and received their certificates.



9. RESEARCH

The research priorities of Ludovika-UPS are:

- focusing on developing state efficiency indicators related to state reform priorities (defence, public safety, justice system, corporate competitiveness, tax bureaucracy), following the methodology of the Good State and Governance Report;
- strengthening the position of the discipline of governance studies and comparative governance studies;
- developing a knowledge centre concerning local governance, local democracy and local development strategies;
- conducting research on E-government services and cyber-security with a focus on IT development;
- conducting research on sustainable development with an emphasis on water governance, climate change, food security, social capital, culture of sustainable living;
- elaborating a comprehensive system of indicators and evaluation mechanisms for measuring the efficiency of the defence sector, and a set of indicators and evaluation mechanisms for the capacities of the state in the areas of public safety, law enforcement and legal certainty;
- conducting research on military science and technology in the service of national defence;
- conducting research in the field of law enforcement and police sciences in order to enhance public safety

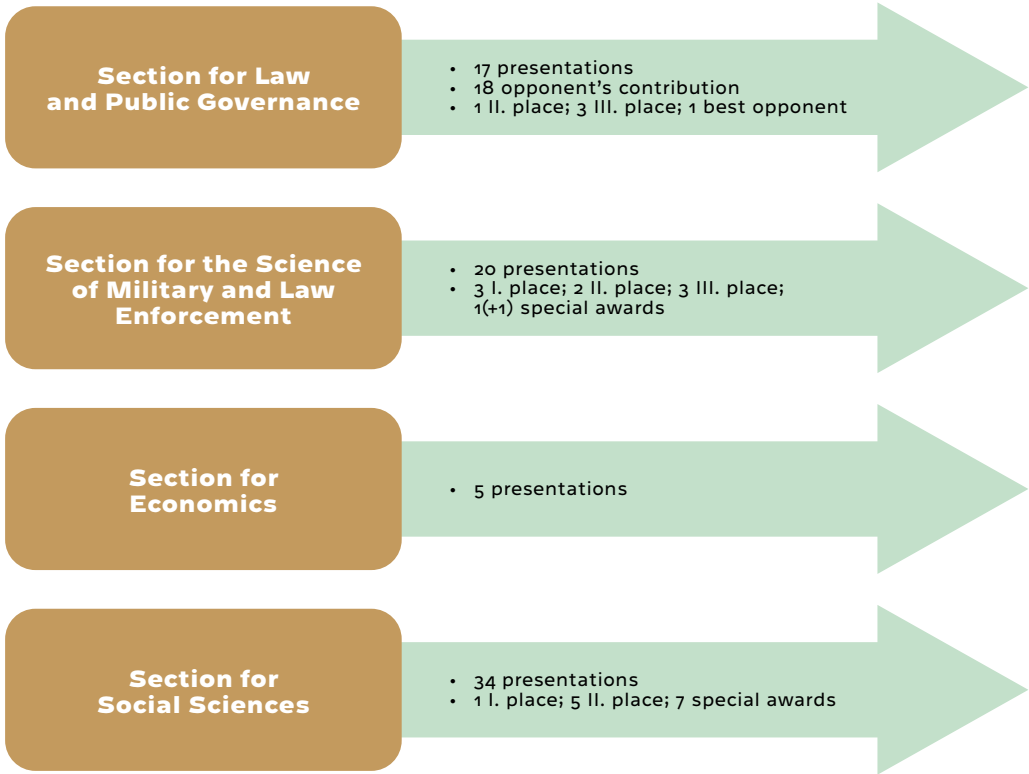


Faculty of Public Governance and International Studies

In the academic year 2021/22, the Sustainable Governance and Innovative Public Services project of the Faculty of Public Governance and International Studies received a grant of HUF 999,000,000. The project will be led by Dr Tamás Kaiser, head of the Department of Governance and Public Policy and Vice-Dean for Scientific Affairs. The technical implementation is in progress.

In addition to research activities, the Faculty’s leadership has also focused on talent management. The different scientific student circles are organised in line with the departments of the Faculty. With the exception of the Department of Public Finance, all departments have their own Scientific Student’s Association, although the number of members varies considerably (from 5 to 48). Although it is difficult to determine the exact number, the average number of members is 10-15, so the total number of students participating in extracurricular activities is around 200.

Overall, the Faculty’s annual scientific student activities were varied and successful, with a number of presentations and online events in 2021. These programmes typically included lectures, round table discussions, conference participation, quizzes, competitions, visits to institutions and a film club. In 2021, the biggest event was the participation in the National Scientific Student’s Associations Conference (OTDK). In April 2021, a virtual space was created to follow the performances of our most outstanding students in the four sections of the 35th OTDK. From the Faculty altogether gave 76 presentations with the following results:



In 2021, two Faculty’s Scientific Student’s Associations Conferences (ITDK) were organised. The spring edition of the conference, on 12th May 2021 included 38 presentations. The work of the students was mentored by 22 faculty members and the awards were granted by 5 different evaluation committees, consisting of a total of 14 members and with the help of 5 student secretaries. In the 4 different sections, 12 awards, 4 special awards and 4 best opponent awards were given. A total of 24 scientific presentations were rewarded with the right to participate at the next OTDK. At the winter edition of the conference on 1. December 2021, a total of 20 presentations were held in a hybrid format. The work of the students was mentored by 17 faculty members and the awards were granted by 3 different evaluation committees with the help of 6 student secretaries. The sections granted 9 awards, 3 special awards, 3 best opponent awards and a total of 17 scientific presentations were rewarded with the right to participate at the next OTDK.

At the Faculty’s Scientific Student’s Associations Conference in spring 2022, on 4 May 2022, 57 competitors in six sections presented their scientific findings, the vast majority of whom will be eligible to compete at the next OTDK.



Faculty of Military Sciences and Officer Training

The six most important lines of research of the Faculty are strategic leadership, future armed forces, challenges of hybrid warfare, human issues of armed forces, the use of modern technology in armed forces, and regional geopolitical crises. Successful integration into research requires university teachers to possess in-depth knowledge of the international trends to ensure compliance with federal cooperation requirements, equivalence and successful participation in multi-national operations. The Faculty supports the successful implementation of the Zrínyi 2026 Defence and Military Development Programme with its research potential. The Workshops of the Faculty are:

- The Religion and Security Research Workshop concentrates on the security aspects of religion, faith diplomacy, conflicts and wars motivated by religion. It includes four research sectors, namely historical aspects of religion and security, legal aspects of religion and security, the situation of persecuted Christians and Holy See studies.
- The Ludovika History Research Workshop aims to research the rich and diverse history of the Ludovika Academy and to make the traditions of more than 200 years of Hungarian officer education accessible to everyone. It also publishes the Pro Militum Artibus book series, publishing the works of Hungarian and international theorists of war.

Faculty of Law Enforcement

The Department of Criminology has participated in two international research projects. The project led by Virginia Tech (U.S.A.) focused on cybercrime and cyber-victimisation, the project of the Simon Fraser University (Canada) gathered empirical data on drug trading via the darknet.

The lecturers of the Faculty of Law Enforcement have published 21 papers in scientific journals with a Q index.

Faculty of Water Sciences

The research staff of the Faculty has developed significant research expertise in catchment-hydrology, environmental physics and hydraulics, stochastic processes and mathematical statistics in addition to hydrometry and hydro-geodesy, flood hydrology, sediment monitoring and hydro-dynamic modelling.

Our Faculty is internationally renowned for our measurement and data collection technology and analysis used in hydrometry, hydro-geodesy, open channel hydraulics, habitat reconstruction planning and sediment research.

Our Water Technology Centre provides quality education and research opportunities on drinking water treatment, wastewater treatment and education in connection with the state of surface water. Our researchers are also internationally recognised experts in the field of aquatic biology. Main research areas: biology of decentralised wastewater treatment; microbiologically induced corrosion; functional ecology of coating-forming algae; water quality; bank filtered well testing; and reconstruction of climatic changes by sediment analysis.

9.1. RESEARCH HIGHLIGHTS / SCIENTIFIC ACHIEVEMENTS

The future of the European Union and the role of the Visegrad Cooperation

PhD students and young researchers from V4 countries discussed the future of the European Union and the role of the Visegrad Cooperation at the University of Public Service on 24 November 2021. The conference, organised by the Europe Strategy Research Institute, was a tradition-building event, where participants first listened to presentations on the European Union and on the V4. These were followed by group workshops, after which the results were presented by the participants, laying the foundations for further international academic and scientific cooperation. The participants agreed to work on international projects in the online space after the event and to continue the discussions in a face-to-face format, organised by different V4 universities on an annual basis.

Pentagon-approved Senior Leadership Informational Environment Course

The commitment of the Institute of America Studies to further the Hungarian audience's knowledge of political, legal and economic development is also complemented by the aspiration to import original thoughts and ideas from the United States to the Ludovika Campus. The three-day Pentagon-approved Senior Leadership Informational Environment Course also took place in line with this ambition, to provide cutting-edge training for Hungarian senior civil and military officers on the recent dynamics of the information domain and the strategies corresponding to these changes. The course delivered by Robert Ehlers, retired Air Force colonel, and Thomas Drohan, retired U.S. Air Force brigadier general and Professor Emeritus of Military and Strategic Studies at the USAF Academy, was the first time of training in a European NATO country and in a non-Five Eyes member.

As the director of the Institute, Balázs Mártonffy, underlined in his opening speech, the event's opening day coincided with the 25th anniversary of Hungary's referendum on the country's NATO accession. Since then, we acquired full membership and met the military standard of the Alliance; however, the changing security environment and the pressure of emerging disruptive technologies allied nations in striving for greater interoperability. The insights and know-how delivered during the course aimed to provide a common denominator for future cooperation between Hungarian and United States authorities in the information environment.

Information security conference on the centenary of Estonian-Hungarian relations

The University of Public Service and the Embassy of the Republic of Estonia in Hungary organized a commemorative conference on e-government and cybersecurity, to mark the centenary of Estonian-Hungarian diplomatic relations. The UPS and Embassy of the Republic of Estonia therefore held a conference, "100 years of Estonian-Hungarian diplomatic relations. Contacts and mergers: from past experiences to digital transformation".



Its introduction discussed Hungarian and Estonian relations over the past 100 years. The keynotes were on Digital Security, E-Governance, and Data Governance regarding cyber security challenges. The use of public data is always an emerging question in our modern society; the panellists discussed and showed the impending issues from the use of public data. Digital identification also plays a key role in E-Governance: for any system to work, a trusted and verified way to identify the user is a must. This function has strategic importance in the European Union. The panel titled "Cyber security: regulation and international governance" showed that cybersecurity remains a central element in the online world. Digitalization is under constant change, and keeping up with the changes is difficult in itself. Furthermore, there are always new cyber-threats that need to be addressed as quickly as possible. conference not only showed the current cyber-challenges within e-governance, but also why e-governance is crucial for our modern online society.

Society of Internet Platforms

The Institute of the Information Society organised a two-day international conference on the Society of Internet Platforms. The Conference successfully brought together prominent experts and esteemed scholars from Europe and the USA, who had a lively international discussion of online platforms, which play an important role in our contemporary societies worldwide. The Conference was an event for discussing the most exciting developments in and narratives of various aspects (legal, social, economic, etc.) of online platforms that shape our societies. The Conference speakers presented the consequences of the widespread use of online platforms in terms of social and constitutional doctrines, protection of free speech, media/e-commerce regulation, and the protection of intellectual property. Jack Balkin delivered an online keynote and joined the discussion from Yale University. In his presentation, he highlighted how social media platforms use manipulative techniques, block content and users and influence people through algorithms in ways that are different than those of the 20th century. He presented a new approach to regulation, which is needed to protect

consumers and reduce vulnerability. In his view, the basic problem with social media forums, especially the largest ones such as Facebook, its subsidiaries and in YouTube, is that their business models create bad incentives. A closing keynote was presented by Lawrence Lessig, an American academic, lawyer and political activist, currently the Professor of Harvard Law School and Director of the Edmond J. Safra Center for Ethics. "Freedom of expression in democracies cannot be allowed on social media platforms, if we cannot legally regulate for-profit companies that make their revenue from our attention: it has a detrimental effect on society and its state apparatus," the US professor concluded. In this context, he called the United States of America the "canary bird of democracy", referring back to the old habit of miners: if the bird they took with them died because of the quality of the air underground, they knew they had to get out.

Legal technology and its impact on access to justice, society, and the legal industry - International Conference

The "Digital Justice" research group of the Institute of the Information Society at the University of Public Service organised an international conference on June 23-24, 2022, entitled "Legal Technology and its Impact on Access to Justice, Society, and the Legal Industry." The significance of legal technologies has increased in recent years. In addition to traditional areas such as legal research, document management or office and court administration, a number of new applications and innovative solutions have emerged. These include online dispute resolution systems, legal analysis systems based on natural language processing, and legal prediction software. These systems already often use artificial intelligence (technologies based on machine learning), which also raises a number of ethical issues. At the same time, more and more people are starting to talk about the social implications of legaltech. The conference successfully brought together the international legaltech community, where participants had the opportunity to discuss the current issues in legal technologies across three topics in twenty presentations.

A conference titled “The End of the Brezhnev Doctrine? Martial law was Introduced in Poland 40 years ago”.

On 16 December 2021, the Institute for Central European Studies organized an international conference for historians on “The End of the Brezhnev Doctrine? Martial law was Introduced in Poland 40 years ago”.

On 13 December 1981, the communist regime in Poland introduced martial law in order to oppress the mass movement called Solidarity (Solidarność). This was the most dramatic and tragic event of post-World War II Polish history, which prompts several questions. On the one hand, one may ask, why did the Soviet Red or the member states of the Warsaw Pact not intervene? In the lack of such a move, can we talk of a Brezhnev doctrine at all? On the other hand, did not the declaration of martial law mean the failure and fall of socialism? What were the experiences within Polish society and what was the imprint of the events in other states of the “Socialist Block”, especially in Hungary? Finally, one may also ask, how did experiences during or discourse on martial law influence the negotiated systemic change nine years later?

Pál Hatos, the head of the Institute of Central European Studies, welcomed the participants of the conference. Then, Katarzyna Ratajczak-Sowa, first secretary of the Polish Embassy in Budapest, Brigadier General László Christián, acting rector of the University of Public Service, and Gergely Gulyás, Minister of the Prime Minister’s Office, welcomed the participants.

In the first part of the conference, Csaba Békés gave a presentation on “Conflicts in the Socialist Block and the Brezhnev doctrine”, then, Miklós Mitrovits, representing the institute, talked about “Why the Soviets did not Intervene in 1980–81 in Poland.” In the second part of the event, Michał Przeperski, Małgorzata Choma-Jusińska, Gábor Danyi and István Miklós Balázs gave their papers on the experiences and impact of martial law.

Visegrad Fund – Workshop: „V4 challenges in Industry 4.0”

The workshop was part of a multi-year project, financed by the Visegrad Grant, in the consortium with Katowice University of Economics, Mendel University Brno and the Economics University of Bratislava. The workshop was dedicated to the issue of the industrial policy of the V4 countries, which face the challenge of Industry 4.0. Their position of on this issue is crucial for their future welfare and position in the global supply chain.

3rd Budapest Public Finance Seminar – 2021 Sustainability of Public Finances

The Hungarian Treasury, in association with the University of Public Service, organised the 3rd Budapest Public Finance Seminar with an international keynote speaker and presenters. The management of the Covid crisis resulted in sharply rising government deficits and debt levels, as a reaction to plummeting global GDP. To clarify where the world is heading regarding public finances, the following presenters, among others, participated in the discussion: Jean-Marc Fournier (IMF), Carsten Colombier (Federal Administration of Switzerland), Richárd Adorján (Deputy State Secretary, Ministry of Finance), Silvia Fedeli (Sapienza University of Rome, Department of Economics and Law), Joanna Mackiewicz-Łyziak (University of Warsaw, Faculty of Economic Sciences), Vladimir Arčabić (University of Zagreb).

Expert consultations at the Institute for Strategic and Defence Studies

In the 2021/2022 academic year, the Institute for Strategic and Defence Studies continued its expert consultations on security and defence issues with its European partners. The most outstanding of these bilateral relations have been with Swedish senior experts and researchers in such institutes as the Swedish Royal Academy of War Sciences, the Stockholm International Peace Research Institute (SIPRI) and the Swedish Defence Research Agency (FOI). Several rounds of online discussions took place, addressing shared challenges in the southern neighbourhood (regional instability, terrorism, migratory pressures) and the Western Balkans (domestic tensions in Bosnia and Herzegovina and Kosovo). This bilateral framework proved to be especially useful in relation to the Russian aggression in Ukraine, as well as when Sweden decided to apply for NATO membership in 2022. First-hand insight, elaborated expert opinion and up-to-date information were shared by both parties, making it possible to publish policy analyses and provide input to the Hungarian Ministry of Defence as well. The next chapter of our relationship is to meet in person (through possible research exchange), conduct joint research and mutually participate in each other’s events, thus developing cooperation in a results-based, bottom-up manner.

The JUDICON-EU international research project was launched by the Research Institute for Politics and Government

The JUDICON project – which is an international research project that compares the strength of the decisions of constitutional courts – has been extended to a research community consisting of 24 researchers from 20 countries of the European Union. The JUDICON-EU project is being financed by Ludovika-UPS between 2020 and 2022, and it is based on the JUDICON pilot project supported by the Incubator Grant of the Hungarian Academy of Sciences. The JUDICON-EU research network works

on coding and analysing the decisions of European constitutional courts between 1990 and 2020. During the project, data will be collected on the practice of constitutional courts. The data will be used to publish research papers, which, at the end of the project, will constitute an English language book. The JUDICON-EU project’s methodology is unique in its nature, because it breaks down the decisions of the courts and weighs the elements separately to exceed a binary approach. A scale will also be developed to enable the strength of the decisions to be measured. JUDICON-EU is a pilot project, because no quantitative research has been conducted on constitutional decision-making at European scale before. Actors, texts and intertexts of political discourse in early modern Hungary by the Research Institute for Politics and Government

The project aims to explore political and historical thought in Hungary after the Battle of Mohács (1526) through research into the most important political actors’ lives and careers and analysing the vast body of mostly unpublished or unnoticed documents and sources, which reveal the political ideas, plans and endeavours for the reunification and/or constitutional reform of the country. The wide range of sources – according to the character of contemporary public discourse – are mostly preserved as manuscripts; among the pure (and rare) theoretical works, it is also important to analyse literary and theological texts, historical narratives, diplomatic and private letters and other types of archival sources, which could document the development of such ideas. The intended outcomes are single-subject studies, text editions and a comprehensive monograph covering the political visions, ideas and alternatives of a divided political community after the loss of its independence and the cessation of its former existence as a state.

Conference on the occasion of the 95th birthday of Joseph Ratzinger

Joseph Ratzinger, Pope Benedict XVI, celebrated his 95th birthday this year. The Religion and Society Research Institute, József Eötvös Research Centre held a conference on this occasion. The keynote speaker of the conference was Father Mario Alexis Portella, priest and Vice-Chancellor of the Roman Catholic diocese of Florence, Italy. Several representatives of Hungarian Christian philosophy and theology also attended the conference, either as speakers or participants. For the special event, Pope Benedict XVI himself sent a short address to the audience, expressing his gratitude for the warm birthday wishes as well as forwarding his best wishes for all the lecturers and students of the University of Public Service in Budapest.

Faculty of Public Governance and International Studies

The rector’s order (33/2019 on the establishment and operating procedures of research workshops) provides the framework for research workshops, some of which operate under individual faculties. The administrative background of the research workshops is ensured by the Dean’s Office Administration Department (preparation of contracts, budget and procurement). The research workshops operating under the supervision of the dean at the Faculty of Public Governance and International Studies in 2021 are the Network Science Research Workshop, Election and Representation Research Workshop and the Széll Kálmán Public Finance Research Workshop.

Science dissemination at the Faculty of Public Governance and International Studies: at the faculty more than 1000 publications were produced in 2021. Of these, 730 pieces were fully scientific according to the MTMT. From the view of science metrics, these are high quality publications. Seven D1, 8 Q1 (without D1), 16 Q2, 13 Q3 and 10 Q4 papers were published. Therefore, a total of 54 items have been published in Scimago Q’s journal. In 2020, 54 items and in 2019 25 “Q” publications were produced by members of the faculty. The 2020 numbers were 9 D1, 8 Q1, 14 Q2, 18 Q3 and 5 Q4 papers.

According to Web of Science, the number of indexed publications from the Faculty in 2021 was 23 (in 2020 32 and, in 2019 21 papers).

In its IX. Scientific Section (Section of Economics and Law – including sociology, demography and political sciences), the Hungarian Academy of Sciences has the following committees and publications related to the Faculty: In the State and Jurisprudence Committee 54 publications in the “A” category (of which 2 are international), 48 “B” category publications (of which 7 are international), 24 “C” category publications (of which 5 are international) and 27 publications in category “D” (of which 1 is international). A total of 153 papers have been published in scientific journals in 2021 by the Faculty of Public Governance and International Studies. In total, 122 items on the list of the Political Science Committee, 58 on the list of Sociological Scientific Committee, 56 on the list of Committee on Economics, 51 on the list of International and Development Studies Doctoral Committee and 16 on the list of Military Science Committee have been published by the lecturers and researchers of the Faculty.

Political Science Newsletter (Államtudományi Hírlevél)

Published by the Faculty of Public Governance and International Studies, the aim of the Political Science Newsletter is to provide up-to-date information on the political sciences to the interested professional audience. In 2021, a total of 24 issues were published.

9.2. BOOKS AND SCIENTIFIC JOURNALS

9.2.1. BOOKS IN FOREIGN LANGUAGES

In the academic year 2021/22 the academic publisher of Ludovika-UPS, Ludovika University Press, published 14 magazine issues, 45 journal issues, and 86 books, including textbooks, study volumes, monographs, yearbooks, university notes, handbooks and other academic publications.

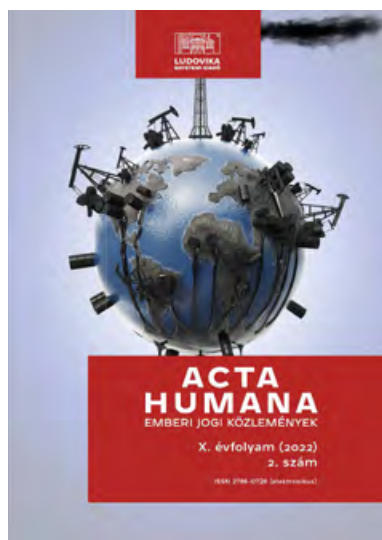

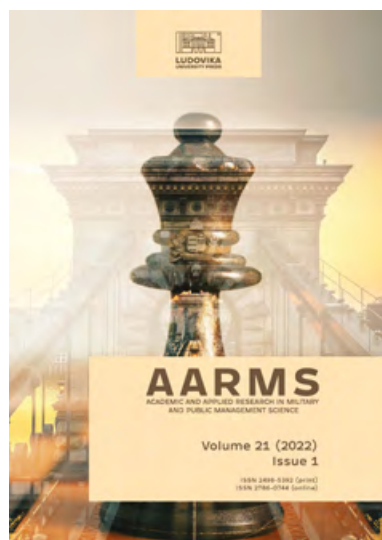

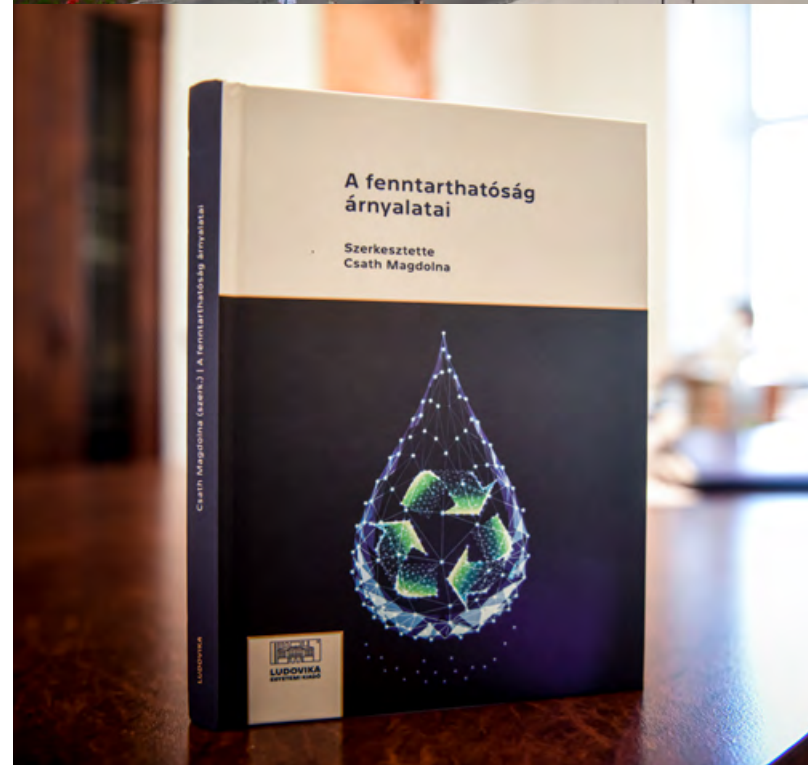

10. CAMPUS



10.1. CAMPUS DIRECTORATE

When Ludovika-UPS was established in 2012, a plan was also born to give back to Ludovika and Orczy Park the place they deserve. Weather and time were not kind to the park and its main building, and the other buildings belonging to the park did not fit into the traditions there. Accordingly, a serious task awaited the leadership of the University, as the first step was destruction, so that the cradle of Hungary's military training could rise from its ashes like a phoenix. The process was launched by the renovation of the Ludovika main building and, later on, the Ludovika-UPS Campus was developed step by step. The Orczy Square dormitory, the Educational Building, the Special Building of the FLE, the Sports Complex, and the buildings of the Shooting Range and the Riding Hall were also restored. In the meantime, the park has become one of the most atmospheric and cleanest green areas in Budapest, where old and dangerous trees have been replaced by newly planted saplings, thus ensuring the future of Orczy Garden. However, developments are not limited to District VIII. Students of the Faculty of Water Science can study in an outstanding environment on the Baja Campus, and the Zrínyi Miklós Barracks and the University Campus continue to create the future officers of the army under excellent conditions.

During the developments, it became clear that the maintenance of the renovated and newly built buildings would require an organisational unit under the auspices of the University, which would pay constant attention to the buildings, events at the University and also, due to the excellent sports infrastructures, it could build and develop a sports life at the University. For this purpose, the Campus Directorate was established in February 2019. The staff, in collaboration with the Campus XXI Non-Profit Ltd., has been carrying out this task with great enthusiasm and vigour ever since.

The Campus Directorate aims to perform the facilities management tasks of the University, takes care of the proper operation of facilities, accomplishes property security tasks and ensures that the University's fire, work, accident and environmental tasks are completed. The Directorate strives to provide a clean, safe and sustainable campus environment for everyone. It provides for the management of the properties, the related investments and renovation works and, last but not least, is responsible for organising sporting activities. The Directorate performs tasks related to the sports concept of the University, and plans the University's sports cooperation system as well.



10.2. LUDOVIKA CAMPUS

The National Assembly decided to establish the Royal Hungarian Ludovika Military Academy through Act VII of 1808. Maria Ludovika Beatrix of Austria-Este, the third spouse of Francis I., donated her coronation gift of 50,000 Hungarian Forints (which is, by today's standards, 670-830,000 Euros) to the project. This contribution was honoured by naming the institution the Ludovika Academy. The cause of training military officers in the Hungarian language united the entire nation. An unprecedented wave of public donations began, resulting in a sum of financial contributions that was more than four times larger than that establishing the Hungarian Academy of Sciences. Altogether 995,100 Hungarian Forints were offered for this purpose, which is by today's standards, equivalent to about 13 million Euros. A separate legal act listed the names of the 237 donors. The list consisted of individuals, religious communities and counties as well. This noble gesture was commemorated in the set of the coat of arms displayed in the quadrangle of the building. The cornerstone of the building was laid in 1830 by Archduke Joseph, Palatine of Hungary at the time, whereas the constructions – based on the plans of architect Mihály Pollack, a key figure of the neoclassical movement – were finished in 1836. However, the actual training of military officers could not begin, as the emperor's cabinet and military council continually set various obstacles in the way of the operation of the Ludoviceum. The building was empty for years, serving various purposes. It provided shelter for the people fleeing from the great flood of the Danube in 1838, or for the priceless collections of the National Museum. Eventually, military education was first organised at Ludovika during the 1848–49 Revolution and War of Independence. The grand opening of the Hungarian Military Academy was held on 7 January 1849, but its operation was banned 10 days later by the imperial military authorities occupying Pest-Buda, impounding the Academy's equipment and turning the building into a military hospital. The training of the officers of the Royal Hungarian Army, established under the Act on Defence Forces, was approved after the Compromise between Vienna and Pest-Buda in 1867. As a result, the Ludovika Academy began its actual operation in 1872, and was an institute of higher education which was recognised as equal to the Theresian Military Academy in Wiener Neustadt,

Austria. From this point on, cadets were trained by the best contemporary officers of the Hungarian armed forces. After World War I and in accordance with the prohibitions of the Treaty of Trianon, the Academy remained the single institution of officer training in Hungary. It was divided into two academic divisions, thereby separating infantry and engineer training. The Bolyai János Royal Military Engineering Academy continued its operation in Hűvösvölgy. As the training of air force officers was sited at the Horthy Miklós (after 1942 the Horthy István) Royal Air Force Academy in Kassa (Košice) in 1939, the training of Hungarian professional military officers during the Second World War was carried out on three separate locations. The last traditional officer (first lieutenant) inauguration ceremony at Ludovika was held on 20 August 1943, as the institution ended its operation on 25 April 1945. For decades afterward, the building hosted the departments of the Eötvös Loránd University's Faculty of Science as well as the Hungarian Natural History Museum, which had been scattered around various locations. In the meantime, however, the condition of the building continuously deteriorated.

In May 2012, the Government of Hungary decided to renovate the historical Ludovika building complex, as well as to renovate the neighbouring Orczy Park to ensure an integrated and appropriate location for Ludovika-UPS. To further accelerate the construction, the Government declared the related administrative proceedings as highly important for national economic reasons. The Ludovika Campus Project began with the reconstruction of the classicist main building, for which the Government allocated a budget of 4.5 billion Hungarian forints. The renovations were concluded by spring 2014, and the building was inaugurated and handed over to Ludovika-UPS by the Prime Minister of Hungary on 31 March 2014. In the building, students have access to up-to-date lecture rooms, community areas, a library with hard and digital copies, and a buffet. With the renovation of the impressive historical rooms, such as the Assembly Hall and the University Chapel, which have already hosted several events, the former Royal Hungarian Military Academy has regained its long-lost shine and has become the meeting point between the historical past and 21st -century technologies.



10.3. BAJA CAMPUS (FACULTY OF WATER SCIENCES)

The educational building of the Faculty is located in one of the most scenic areas of Baja, (170 km south of Budapest), the banks of the Sugovica, a branch of the Danube. Here the university provides training on modern water management procedures in its facilities and laboratories. Our Faculty has two measuring stations, one in the Eastern Mecsek area and one in Érsekcsanád, which both serve as field training facilities. We provide modern technology and measuring instruments that our students can use to acquire practical knowledge.

Accommodation for the students of the Faculty is provided in the newly renovated Beszédes József Hall of Residence, which is situated in the most panoramic surroundings in Baja. The Hall offers accommodation for up to 240 students. The university provides several special colleges which serve as intellectual and social platforms to help to develop motivated and dedicated students. The Zsuffa István Special College of the Faculty of Water Sciences aims to provide students with a series of courses, primarily in engineering, that help develop their knowledge outside of the regular university classes. In addition to higher education, the college places great emphasis on active participation in professional conferences, forums and community and cultural events, as well as in the National Conference of Scientific Students' Associations. Members of the special college continuously assist and participate in other scientific events. To acquire and maintain the qualification of the special college, it is important that students contribute to the Researchers' Night or are involved in the Youth Days organised by the Hungarian Hydrological Society (HHS). The main objective of the Students' Union of the Faculty of Water Sciences is to represent the students' interests, solving any problems arising and ensuring appropriate communication between the faculty and the students. The Union also cooperates in scholarship distribution and participates in the organisation of cultural events and promotes student life at the university.

11. INTERNATIONAL LIFE, EDUCATION AND PARTNERSHIPS



11.1. INTERNATIONAL STRATEGY

As stated in the recently adopted Development Plan of Ludovika-UPS, our University aims to be a worldwide known Hungarian and European university with a balanced geo-strategy in the institutional partnerships by 2025. Ludovika wants to be especially active in international science diplomacy and wants to create possibilities for its academic staff and students to participate in international mobility. The institution aims to have a vibrant international life on its campuses, with Bachelor's, Master's and joint course offers in foreign languages. As part of the Ludovika brand, summer courses are held in specific areas such as human rights and Central European as well as new media studies. The overall aim is to advance in the national and international rankings.

The International Office, which operates under the supervision of the Vice-Rector for International Affairs, is entrusted to be the engine and coordinator of the international activities of the University. In this spirit, the main aim of the Office's activities is to enhance the international relations of the University and create meaningful, workable ties with other higher educational institutions. These relations are to support the activities of the four faculties as well as those of the research centres. The staff of the International Office is dedicated to developing the already existing ties further, as well as to find new possibilities that will benefit students and lecturers as well as the research community of Ludovika.

In this academic year, our international activities took new impetus after the slowdown caused by the Covid-19 pandemic. We have been concentrating our efforts on finalising MoUs and other partnerships, and were granted funds for a Cooperation Partnership Project in the field of hybrid warfare with universities in Italy, Romania, Slovakia, Israel and a research institute in the UK. An Erasmus+ Jean Monnet Chair project was also deemed successful by the European Commission.

In the past 9 years, we have developed more than 70 formal institutional connections laid down in MoUs all over the world. It is Europe and especially Central Europe that Ludovika has the strongest ties but we do have, for example, Chinese, Israeli and African university connections as well. Ludovika is engaged in all sorts of Erasmus activities, which we find very fruitful for students and staff alike. We regularly hold so-called teaching weeks when professors and staff are welcomed from all over the world. The University intends to attract more foreign students as well.

Our ties to the Fulbright Commission are increasingly strong. We have also started to work with the Washington-based Hungarian Initiative Foundation on their Budapest Fellowship programme.

In the 2021-2022 academic year we continued our well-established programme, the Ludovika Ambassadors' Forum, now in a hybrid form. This programme is especially important for short term international students whom the university also intends to attract.



11.2. INTERNATIONAL OFFICE

The International Office – the successor of the International Directorate – operates under the supervision of the Vice-Rector for International Affairs, and is entrusted to be the engine and coordinator of the international activities of the University. In this spirit, the main aim of the Office's activities is to enhance the international relations of the University and create meaningful, workable ties with other higher educational institutions. The Office's staff deal with all sorts of mobility programmes such as the Erasmus+, the CEEPUS Programme, Fulbright and Stipendium Hungaricum scholarships and the newly established Ludovika Fellowship Programme. It also acts as the first contact point for international visitors, be they professors or students. It is also involved in organising events on international relations such as conferences, workshops and welcome days. A well-established series produced by the Office is the Ludovika Ambassadors' Forum, which invites Budapest-based ambassadors as guest speakers each month during the teaching period. An important activity of the Office is establishing formal ties with other universities, including MoUs and Erasmus Inter-Institutional Agreements. A clear aim of the Office is to make Ludovika-UPS more known to possible international partners. As such, it is available for international partners to discuss future academic programmes or partnerships. A special task of the International Office is to manage the Ludovika's English homepage of, and other information tools such as Facebook, Twitter and LinkedIn. The Office is also responsible for the international travels of staff from the University and that of international guest speakers or visiting professors.

Head of the International Office – Bernadett Antal dr
Bernadett Antal holds a cum laude law degree from the ELTE, she graduated in 2016. During the university years she participated in moot courts, such as the Willem C. Vis moot court and pre-moot in Warsaw and Vienna. She fulfilled her internship at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, at the Department of International Affairs. After the graduation she started to work at the Prime Minister's Office, then in law offices, until 2019, when she earned a position at the Legal Directorate. After spending two years, she became the Head of the International Office. Dr Antal is fluent in English, German, Italian, and currently she is learning Turkish. Besides the UPS she is affiliated to the University of Pécs, where she studies psychology. Her long-term goal is to serve Ludovika – UPS with the best professional skills and competencies, to learn new languages, and to finish her psychology studies.

International Director – Amb. Klára Breuer – until 30 November 2021

Ambassador Klára Breuer is a career diplomat, who was appointed as the International Director of Ludovika-UPS and is on secondment from the MFA. She holds an MA degree in English studies and History from the Debrecen University and a degree in Journalism from the MÚOSZ Bálint György Journalism School. She sat for the entrance exam of the MFA in 1991 and since then she has held several positions in the Ministry as well as at Hungarian Embassies. In 1996, she completed the international diplomatic training programme of the British Know-How Fund. In her most recent diplomatic position, she was the Ambassador of Hungary accredited to Portugal (2014-19). Two important highlights of her career were to be the Diplomatic Advisor to President Mádl (2001-2005) and the Chief of Cabinet of the Minister for Foreign Affairs, János Martonyi (2011-2014). She was awarded the Gold Medal of the President in 2005 and was elected DCM of the Year in the London Diplomatic Corps in 2011. She is the recipient of several foreign decorations. Klára Breuer is married and has one adult child.

11.3. STUDY PROGRAMMES FOR INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS

Ludovika – UPS is the sole institution in Hungary to offer degree programmes in public service with a comprehensive approach focusing on the needs of the whole government. It educates the next generation of military, law enforcement, public management and international affairs experts and leaders. A specialised faculty at the University covers the field of water sciences, which is a topical issue for the future of the whole international community. As such, our University operates in a model of cooperation together with national stakeholders and international actors. Due to the merger of these special fields, our University has a very diverse student body, which enables students of different fields of public service to become acquainted with each other and cooperate in many walks of life. Besides benefiting from a common introductory module embedded in each degree programme, students can also participate in joint public service exercises.

A growing number of international students choose to study at Ludovika-UPS as part of exchange or scholarship programmes to gain valuable experience in this unique community, thus broadening their knowledge and know-how already acquired.

Furthermore, Ludovika-UPS not only pays attention to developing world-class education but also to creating a modern, lively, open, and student-friendly environment with a state-of-the-art infrastructure. At the Ludovika Campus, students can enjoy the services of a modern educational building that combines 21st century technology with the tradition and heritage of the former Ludovika Academy. The Ludovika Hall of Residence offers outstanding living circumstances at an excellent location in Budapest with both green areas and the city centre in proximity.





11.3.1. DEGREE PROGRAMMES FOR INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS

Graduate Degree Programmes

BA in International Public Management (language of instruction: English)

Join us and understand better the 21st century's fast-evolving reality, in which new priorities emerge at an unprecedented speed. Identity, belonging to a culture and traditions and also understanding the common values on which your community is built are becoming ever more prominent. Rediscovering our unique European heritage based on the ancient Greek and Roman cultures and more than 2000 years of Christianity is essential.

Our globalised world has been dealing with a series of dramatic shocks and the European Union is no exception. It is safe to say that we do not see the end of these tectonic global shifts. More than ever, there is a need for a league of young and educated people who can safely navigate uncharted territories. There is a need for future administrators and leaders of complex governance structures, who have the skills, the knowledge and the courage to face an ever more volatile geo-economic and geopolitical reality. This new world needs youth who have mastered the skills required at the international level – but are also able to act locally, to understand the potentials as well as the limitations and risks of globalisation or the recently emerging disruptive factors, such as social media or artificial intelligence. A generation of public administrators and leaders that succeeds, not only in a business-as-usual environment but also in crises.

Our world – your world – as it is today, is unsustainable. We must become prepared to face and tackle all the economic, social and governance-related consequences of this fact. Above all, we must cherish our humanity and personal relationships within our community and acknowledge the importance of acting for the public interest.

BSc in Civil Engineering (language of instruction: English or Hungarian)

The purpose of the programme is to train engineers with appropriate knowledge and skills that will enable them to fulfil tasks related to construction, maintenance, operation, management, and professional administration. Graduates will be qualified to manage simple planning and research tasks independently and cooperate in implementing more complex projects. Duration of the education: eight-semester full-time degree programme. The programme belongs to the Faculty of Water Sciences and is based in Baja.

The following specialisations are available:

- Regional Water Management Specialisation
- Water Supply and Wastewater Treatment Specialisation

BSc in Environmental Engineering (language of instruction: English or Hungarian)

The programme aims to train environmental engineers with up-to-date skills in ecology, technology, economics and management, enabling them to be able to detect environmental risks in different areas and manage damage control activities. Duration of the education: seven-semester full-time degree programme. The programme belongs to the Faculty of Water Sciences and is based in Baja.

The following specialisations are available:

- Water Treatment – Wastewater Treatment Specialisation
- Water Management Specialisation



MA in International Water Governance and Water Diplomacy (language of instruction: English)

The two-year MA programme in International Water Governance and Water Diplomacy, starting in September 2020, offers up-to-date, practice-oriented education for practicing and future water managers, diplomats and national and international civil servants engaged in transboundary or global environmental issues. Based on a blend of natural and social sciences, extensive field training and project-based teamwork, the programme aims to enable students to master complex water policy challenges and decision and conflict situations. The programme belongs to the Faculty of Water Sciences and is based in Budapest.

MA in International Public Service Relations – 3-semester-degree programme providing a Master of Arts degree (90 ECTS)

This comprehensive programme is offered both to domestic and foreign citizens, focusing on security and defence studies and European studies. The programme, delivered in the English language, synthesises the methods and approaches of the disciplines of international relations, public administration, law and economics. The effects of globalisation, the law and policy-making of international organisations and the institutions and sectoral policies of the EU, as well as good governance or integrity management, are among the topics covered in this programme. It aims to educate and train students to become experts in their fields in their future positions either at international and EU institutions or in their respective national public administration roles.

Upon completion of the programme, graduates will benefit from a thorough and comprehensive understanding of today's international affairs, as well as the tools that will enable them to assess, analyse and answer global and international problems and policy issues with a critical eye. The programme aims to train experts capable of undertaking duties at international and EU institutions and agencies, in the administration of foreign affairs, defence policy, and law enforcement, as well as in the international departments of NGOs or business entities.

MA in International Relations (2-year programme – 120 ECTS)

The curriculum of the MA programme in International Relations was framed, in collaboration with the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade, to fulfil practical needs.

The syllabus, having been created to provide practical knowledge and to prepare students for careers in diplomacy, is in alignment with the requirements of the foreign affairs administration.

Topics related to foreign economy and economic diplomacy are dominant segments of the study programme.

The following specialisations are available:

- International Economic Relations
- Regional and Civilisational Studies
- European Studies

Upon completion of the programme, in addition to gaining competitive skills and knowledge, graduates will not only be able to build careers in the field of public administration but also in the public sector, the academic sphere and in the field of international relations.



Doctoral Programmes

PhD in Public Administration Sciences

The Doctoral School of Public Administration Sciences is in a unique position within Hungary through its specialisation in the field of public administration. The fields of research at the Doctoral School embrace the history of state and public administration, legal studies, public administration management and sociology, economics, public governance, international and European studies, and human resources in public administration.

Upon successful completion of the programme, students are awarded a PhD degree in Public Administration Sciences. Besides providing top-quality postgraduate education to our students, the Doctoral School's mission is to establish a national centre of excellence for research on public administration that meets the highest standards of the international scientific community.

PhD in Military Sciences

The Doctoral School of Military Sciences has a wide spectrum of research fields: security studies, social aspects of defence studies, general military theory, theories of military science, defence logistics and defence economics, national security and theory of defence information technology and communication. The Doctoral School cooperates with the Ministry of Defence, the Hungarian Defence Forces and with other organisations related to military sciences. Its international scientific recognition can be most easily demonstrated by the fact that the number of international students has been increasing from year to year.

PhD in Military Engineering

In the first approximation, the role of the new branch of the doctoral school can be determined on the basis of the related military and engineering sciences. Accordingly, military sciences can be determined

as a discipline that creates new scientific research findings, satisfying the needs of military users, using the procedures and tools of technical sciences. Their research findings are manifested in new, modern procedures and tools of military technology and the defence sphere in the broadest sense, together with the related fields of science and use (defence industry, defence electronics, information technology and communication, national defence, law enforcement, environmental security, environmental protection, CBRN (chemical, biology, radiology (dirty bomb), and nuclear weapons) defence and non-proliferation, counterterrorism, disaster management, protection of critical infrastructure, energy security, security technology and defence administration).

Military engineering sciences include all disciplines of technical, disciplinary, technological, technology transfer and technical innovations related to the military application of all other engineering disciplines belonging to engineering sciences (civil engineering, electrical engineering, architectural sciences, materials science and technology, engineering, transport and vehicle, bio, environmental and chemical engineering, information technology, agricultural engineering and multidisciplinary engineering).

This kind of PhD degree is unique in Europe and worldwide. There is no doctoral degree in this discipline – as a separate discipline – anywhere else. This special doctoral degree can only be obtained here.

The fields of research at the Doctoral School include the theory of military engineering infrastructure; military technology and robotics; defence electronics, IT and communication; military environment security; military logistics and defence economy; security technology; disaster management; aviation and aeronautics.

In addition, The Doctoral School of Military Engineering is entitled to conduct a habilitation procedure too.

PhD in Law Enforcement

The Doctoral School of Law Enforcement was established in 2015. It is currently the only doctoral school in Hungary explicitly focusing on research issues of law enforcement. In addition to the other faculties, institutes and organisational units of Ludovika-UPS, the Doctoral School intends to involve scholars from external partners (international partners, universities, and research institutes) to enhance the research programmes in law enforcement. The Doctoral School offers several formats of education; so PhD students have the choice of full time (scholarship or self-financed) studies, part-time (self-financed) studies, and individual training (self-financed) or individual preparation.

Research topics of the Doctoral School:

- law enforcement theory, history of law enforcement, national security and law enforcement;
- specialised fields of law enforcement, international and European Union law and policy aspects of law enforcement;
- the legal, criminological, forensic and social sciences aspects of law enforcement.

The Stipendium Hungaricum Programme

The Stipendium Hungaricum Scholarship Programme was launched in 2013 by the Hungarian Government in the spirit of the foreign policy of the “Eastern and Southern opening”. The Programme is managed by the Tempus Public Foundation. Its core mission is to increase the number of foreign students in Hungary and to encourage Hungarian higher education institutions to attract top foreign students. It is based on bilateral educational cooperation agreements signed between the Ministries responsible for education in the sending countries/territories and Hungary, or between higher education institutions.

The educational policy objective of the Stipendium Hungaricum Scholarship Programme is to promote the internationalisation and quality development of Hungarian higher education following the European Union and the European Higher Education Area directives, to strengthen the international relations of the Hungarian academic elite, to increase the cultural diversity of higher education institutions and to promote competitive Hungarian higher education in the world.

CEEPUS (Central European Exchange Programme for University Studies)

The CEEPUS Programme aims at promoting student and teacher mobility in Central and South-East Europe in 16 member countries, including Hungary. Students can spend a study period abroad and teachers can undertake a teaching period at a partner university. The programme is designed to strengthen professional and personal relationships among Central European scholars. In Hungary, the programme is managed by Tempus Public Foundation. The CEEPUS Programme allows students to undertake student mobility for a semester, short-term mobility for a couple of months, and lecturers to undertake short-term teacher mobility.

Fulbright Scholarship Programme

The Hungarian Fulbright Programme is one of the largest Scholarship programmes in the region, and in Hungary it is managed by the Fulbright Hungary Commission. The Fulbright Commission organises the exchange of Hungarian and American graduate students, scholars, researchers, lecturers and artists.

The Commission aims to increase the visibility of the Fulbright Programme in Hungary and expand opportunities for scholarly exchange between the two countries. The Fulbright Degree Programme funds graduate education for students wanting to study in the United States. Students apply for the scholarship in their home country and grantees can pursue a Masters or PhD programme in the United States.

Awards go not only to individual scholars from the academic world but also to specialists in increasingly important areas, such as environmental protection, business, management, micro and macroeconomics, and public and health administration.

11.4. INTERNATIONAL PARTNERSHIPS

Ludovika-UPS, celebrating the 10th anniversary of its establishment, avails of an extensive network of contacts in Europe and worldwide. It is a well-known and recognised institution in the European higher education and research area.

The University currently has partnerships with more than 60 partner institutions, based on bilateral cooperation agreements on education and research (Memoranda of Understanding).

A largest proportion of these partnerships were concluded in Europe, with a significant number of Asian and a smaller number of American and African partnerships. Of the EU Member States, it is Germany where we have the most partners. Looking beyond Europe, we maintain intensive relations with some institutions in Russia, China, Southeast Asia, Korea, the United States, Israel and Africa. We have recently taken significant steps to further strengthen our relations in Western Europe as well as in North America.

The geographical-strategic breakdown of the European partner institutions is the following:

- Western Europe (12): The majority of Western European partner institutions are in Germany (7) (there are also Italian, Dutch, and UK partner institutions).
- Central and Eastern and Southern Europe (27): most of our partner institutions are located in this region.
 - We have 8 partner institutions serving national policy objectives, i.e. Hungarian-language higher education institutions abroad – Slovakia 2, Romania 3, Ukraine 1 and Serbia 2 and
 - 12 partner institutions in the Visegrad countries.

The University has more than 130 Erasmus agreements in more than 30 countries around the world, while most of our partner institutions are located in Central Europe.

The University has institutional membership in 35 world organisations that are catalysts for international networking. Outstanding among these are our memberships in the European University Association (EUA), the International Association of Universities (IAU), and the European Institute of Public Administration (EIPA). We are signatories to the Magna Charta Universitatum.

We receive Fulbright visiting professors and we take part in the Budapest Fellowship Programme. The English language Master's programmes, such as in International Public Service Relations, Water Diplomacy, and the College of Visegrad's intensive course provide regional knowledge and disciplinary knowledge.

The Vice-Rector for International Affairs and the International Office has launched the Ludovika Fellowship Programme, as an old-new tradition. In the framework of the Programme, the chosen fellows may join the lecturers and researchers at the UPS, and carry out teaching, researching and other higher education institutional activities for 1-3 months. The Programme is already a great success; the UPS has received almost 30 applications. The physical fulfilment of the Programme will start in September 2022, when the first fellows arrive.

Goals over a five-year period:

1. Presentation of the University's unique training and research portfolio (public service) to the leading institutions worldwide. Implementation of joint projects.
2. Increase in the number of partner institutions, strengthening relations in Western Europe and North America. Establishment of new relations in Central and South America, Japan, the Gulf region, India, and Australia.
3. Further exploitation of the potential of institutional memberships, holding senior positions in organizations where the University has membership and successful tendering for hosting annual congresses.
4. Increase in the mobility rate: by 2025, 5% of our students and 10% of our teachers will be involved in mobility each year.
5. Increasing the proportion of foreign students at our University to 5%.
6. At least two Bachelor's and five Master's degree programmes in English by 2025.
7. Launch of at least two joint degree programmes by 2025.
8. Involvement in the European Universities Initiative.
9. Rise in international rankings by at least 100 places.
10. Increase in the share of foreign students who also pay tuition fees. Successful participation in one European, one American, and one Asian higher education fair per year.



11.4.1. INTERNATIONAL PROJECTS

Erasmus+ Jean Monnet Chair – bEU Project – Fostering EU resilience through European identity building (Project ID: ERASMUS-JMO-2021-HEI-TCH-RSCH-ERASMUS2027-101047686)

In the autumn of 2021, the European Commission awarded the bEU Project 34,000 EUR of co-financing for its 3 year implementation. Prof. Boglárka Koller, the Jean Monnet Chair, set the ambitious aim of the project to contribute to European resilience by improving the sense of European identity among young European citizens.

In the bEU Project, she aims to promote EU knowledge and identity through a variety of teaching, training and promotional programmes, such as conferences, special university courses, high-school roadshows and taking part in major youth festivals, such as the Sziget.

Erasmus+ KA220-HED – HYBRID WARFARE PROJECT: Interdisciplinary Education and Training on Hybrid Warfare (Project ID: 2021-1-HU01-KA220-HED-000032179)

The Ludovika-University of Public Service submitted a successful project proposal with the title „Interdisciplinary Education and Training on Hybrid Warfare,” as consortium leader under the Erasmus+ Cooperation Partnership in Higher Education Programme in 2021. After the evaluation of the Tempus Public Foundation, the project was awarded a €369,950 grant.

Starting on the 1st of November 2021 Ludovika began the realization of the three-year project with its Italian, Israeli, Slovak, Romanian and Scottish partners. The academic work is coordinated by Colonel Dr Zoltán Jobbágy, vice dean of the Faculty of Military Sciences and Officer Training, while the project management will be led by Ms Edina Zsigmond, chief international officer of the International Office.

The Hybrid Warfare project's primary aim is to develop a common educational programme on security and defence policy matters, to share innovative pedagogical methods, to promote cooperation between the partner universities, and – by all these – to enhance the internationalisation of the universities.

The members of the consortium are the following institutions: Italian Army Education and Training Command and School of Applied Military Studies, University of Turin, Turin, ITALY, Bar-Ilan University, Ramat Gan, ISRAEL, the Nicolae Bălcescu Land Forces Academy in Sibiu, ROMANIA, the Armed Forces Academy of General Milan Rastislav Štefánik in Liptovský Mikuláš, SLOVAKIA and the Centre for the Study of New Security Challenges, Edinburgh, UK.

As the result of the project, three project outputs have to be developed in close cooperation with the partners:

1. Hybrid Warfare Reference Curriculum
2. Teaching methodology for the education, training and simulation of Hybrid Warfare
3. Hybrid Warfare Massive Open Online Course

As part of the project, two international educational events will be organised, closely related to content development: a pilot course and a seminar will be held in Israel and Slovakia respectively. Six transnational project meetings and six multiplication events will ensure proper project management and promotion.

Erasmus+ KA203 Project: EUSECURE – “An Interdisciplinary Training on EU Security, Resilience and Sustainability – A Simulation-Supported Massive Open Online Course” (Project ID: 2020-1-HU01-KA203-078719)

In 2020 the International Office successfully applied with a project proposal within the framework of the Erasmus+ Strategic Partnership in Higher Education programme. As consortium leader, Ludovika, together with its international partners, developed the EUSecure project that is today financed by the European Union. The awarded grant is 335,070 EUR, which is to support the project activities between 1 September 2020 and 31 August 2023.

The mission of EUSecure is to 1) Raise awareness among young people of emerging security challenges, 2) Prepare the next generation of intellectuals to take the right decisions, 3) Create a society that is better able to foresee security issues and tackle them.

The goals of the projects are to

- Develop a genuinely interdisciplinary course curriculum on EU security, resilience and sustainability
- Develop a SimMOOC – a Simulation supported Massive Open Online Course on EU security, resilience and sustainability
- Launch the EUSecure elective course on EU security, resilience and sustainability at our universities, with a blended form of training (based on the SimMOOC), and many interactive, international teaching elements, such as an international teaching staff, and international student teams working on joint assignments
- Creating a course for secondary school students on EU security, resilience and sustainability
- Disseminate the relevance and the results of this project to make it a widely available educational resource

The consortium partners are: Ludovika – University of Public Service; Salento University, Lecce, Italy; Sapientia University, Cluj-Napoca, Romania; University Fernando Pessoa, Porto, Portugal; and the University of Piraeus, Piraeus, Greece.

In the 2nd year of the project a successful Summer University, the EUSecure Pilot Course, was organised in Lecce, Italy, with the participation of 50 international students: <https://sites.google.com/unisalento.it/eusecuresummerschool>.

Erasmus+ KA203 project: „Cyber-Aware Students for Public Administration” (CASPA)

The digitization of administration and public organisations requires a reassessment of security aspects. Cybersecurity has become a strategic issue: state organisations relying on digitized ecosystems face new challenges in cyberspace, not only from a technological standpoint but also from a legal, political, diplomatic, economic and military point of view.

The Cyber-Aware Students for Public Administration (CASPA) project aims to develop and maintain innovative cybersecurity courses, specially designed for university students who will work in public administrations as end-users or as a user having a unique role in cybersecurity. Recognising the needs of the public sector, the aim of the project is dual.

First, we aim to educate our non-technical students, who will serve in the public service in their home countries, on the basics of cybersecurity and their roles and responsibilities, including the legislative, policy and technical aspects.

Second, we aim to develop the cybersecurity competencies of those in public service, who will represent their countries abroad, and engage in cyber diplomacy, and everyone who needs to work in the field of international relations and must understand this new phenomenon.

The three-year CASPA project has four members: Tallinn University of Technology, Estonia (TalTech); Kosciuszko Institute, Poland (KI); University of Public Service, Hungary (NUPS); and Cyex OÜ, Estonia.

Visegrad Grant project: “Visegrad Group Cooperation within the EU: Challenging the Rise of Euroscepticism”, Project ID 22020387

The project is a cooperation between Katowice Economics University, Economics University of Bratislava, Mendel University Brno and University of Public Service (Eötvös József Research Centre, Research Institute of Competitiveness and Economy). In recent years, we could observe growing Euroscepticism in the Visegrad countries, although only in some of them did it turn to overt political contestation of EU order. It can be perceived as a part of the wide phenomenon of European disintegration that has been debated in the literature. This situation puts the V4 countries in new political position, often misunderstood by the general public. The benefits of being an EU member are underestimated and EU criticism is manipulated and subordinated to current political games. However, leaving the EU or staying at its margin would lead to decreased welfare and a reduced political standing of the V4 countries. The aim of this project is to counterbalance these negative tendencies and raise the awareness of challenges that might be faced more effectively on a European rather than the national level.

11.5. EXCHANGE PROGRAMMES

Ludovika-UPS offers several programmes for international students and executives, including full degree and exchange programmes, summer schools, and tailor-made trainings.

Erasmus+ and other exchange students are offered a wide selection of courses organised in thematic modules. With the Erasmus+ student mobility programme, students have a chance to spend an exchange period (one or two semesters) at Ludovika-UPS.

The Stipendium Hungaricum Scholarship Programme of the Hungarian Government was launched in 2013 as a full degree programme. EEA citizens are entitled to apply for state funding, whereas the Hungarian government also regularly announces the Stipendium Hungaricum scholarship for applicants worldwide. For exchange students, Erasmus+ is the primary programme offering scholarships for European and, since 2015, for non-European students as well. The CEEPUS scheme is available for students coming from Central and Eastern Europe.

CEEPUS is an acronym for “Central European Exchange Programme for University Studies”. The main activity of CEEPUS is to create university networks, operating joint courses ideally leading to Joint Degree Programmes. CEEPUS covers mobility grants for students and teachers in this framework.

The Makovecz Programme was founded by the Ministry of Human Capacities of Hungary. It offers grants for one semester for BA, MA and PhD students to study at higher education institutions in Hungary and the Carpathian Basin.

The Scholarship Programme for Christian Young People provides the possibility for young Christian students living in the crisis regions of the world and/or being threatened in their country because of their faith to study in Hungary. After completing their studies, the scholarship fellows will return to their home country to help their community by applying their acquired knowledge; in this way they will participate in the reconstruction of war-destroyed countries and contribute to the improvement of the social situation and the preservation of the culture of Christian communities.

12. THE YEAR AT A GLANCE – ACADEMIC EVENTS

12.1. INTERNATIONAL EVENTS ORGANISED BY THE INTERNATIONAL OFFICE

01 September 2021 – Introduction of the Faculty of Water Sciences to the Network of Scientific and Technological Attachés

Co-organized by the International Directorate and the Ministry of Innovation and Technology (ITM), the Faculty of Water Science (VTK) of the University of Public Service (UPS) was introduced to the Network of Scientific and Technological Attachés on 1 September as part of a webinar.

09 September 2021 – Budapest Fellowship Programme – UPS Orientation Day for Fellows

The Budapest Fellowship Programme was established by the Hungary Foundation together with the Mathias Corvinus Collegium to provide a full-time, fully-funded transatlantic fellowship opportunity in Budapest, Hungary, for young American scholars and professionals. As part, of the opening week of the Programme, the International Directorate welcomed the fellows and showed the Campus and the University to them.

29 September 2021 – Ambassadors' Forum at Ludovika: Slovenia

The International Directorate of the UPS was once again able to organise the Ambassadors' Forum with the Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary of Slovenia, the country then holding the Presidency of the Council of the European Union. The topics of the Ambassadors' Forum, organised by the International Directorate, were the priorities of the Presidency, the challenges that Europe is facing and the issues raised by the Coronavirus epidemic. The event took place on 29 September in the St. László Chapel of the University's Ludovika Main Building.

14 October 2021 – Erasmus Days at Ludovika

In cooperation with the National Agencies, the European Commission organised a pan-European celebration of Erasmus+ programmes between the 14th and the 16th of October 2021, during which all participating institutions were invited to demonstrate their activities. The student organisations, the Erasmus Student Network and the Students' Union, in cooperation with the International Directorate, held the #ErasmusDays at Ludovika on the 14th of October with the participation of a significant number of international students studying at the University. During the event, teams of international students presented their creativity and skills in the Ludovika Race around the Ludovika Campus.

20 October 2021 – Ambassadors' Forum at Ludovika: Japan

The Ambassadors' Forum of the University of Public Service's (UPS) International Directorate continued its series of events with an evening on Japan, where not only Hungarian-Japanese relations were discussed, but also the pillars of Japanese diplomacy and the Summer Olympic Games.

02 November 2021 – Focus on the Creation of a Virtual AI Centre

Dr. Boglárka Koller, Vice Rector for International Affairs of NKE hosted Ágnes Martony and Andrew Dolan, the heads of the Centre for the Study of the New Security Challenges (CSNSC) Ltd. The meeting was attended by Amb. Klára Breuer, International Director of the UPS and dr. Antónia Kováts, Head of International Office.

25-26 November 2021 – Ludovika – UPS at the Largest Education fair in the Netherlands

The Go-Abroad Study Fair was held in Utrecht under strict epidemiological measures. The educational and research opportunities of Ludovika – UPS were presented by dr. Antónia Kováts, Head of the International Office, and Rita Ábrahám, officer at the Secretariat of the Vice Rector for International Affairs. The stand of Ludovika – UPS was visited by numerous young people. The students were interested in the Central European region and the UPS's courses, and they also asked questions about medical and engineering training opportunities in Hungary. The discussions revealed that many visitors were keen to visit Hungary.

02 December 2021 – 2nd International Scientific Student Conference at the UPS

The International Directorate, in cooperation with the University Scientific Students' Association, organised the 2nd International Scientific Student Conference in an online format on 2 December, 2021, with 14 speakers and a significant size of audience. Ambassador Klára Breuer, International Director of the University, opened the event highlighting the importance of interdisciplinarity in today's complex world. The participants had the opportunity to enjoy excellent presentations, which helped them to increase their knowledge in specific topics and receive new information about their fellow students' scientific research and results.

11-16 December 2021 – Delegation at the Dubai World Expo

A delegation from the Hungarian Rectors' Conference, including Boglárka Koller, Vice-Rector for International Affairs of UPS, and Csaba Krasznay, Head of the Institute for Cyber Security at Eötvös József Research Centre, were invited to the Knowledge and Learning Week. On 12 December, Prof. Boglárka Koller and Amb. Klára Breuer, International Director of the UPS, gave a presentation on women's equality and empowerment, and the following day the delegation was welcomed by Mohammad Abdullah, Head of Dubai International Academic City/Dubai Knowledge Park.



09 February 2022 – International Welcome Day at Ludovika – UPS

The ceremony was held on the 9th of February to welcome the 50 foreign guest students, who arrived as part of the Erasmus+ mobility programme to spend a few month at Ludovika – University of Public Service. As part of the International Welcome Day, the students also had the opportunity to meet the head of the student representation of the UPS.

10 February 2022 – Information security conference on the centenary of Estonian-Hungarian diplomatic relations

A commemorative conference on e-government and cybersecurity was held by the Ludovika – University of Public Service (UPS) and the Embassy of the Republic of Estonia in Hungary to mark the centenary of Estonian-Hungarian diplomatic relations. The event, held in a hybrid format on 10 February, addressed topics such as Estonia's role as a cyber-power, the digital development of public administration and cybersecurity.

15 February 2022 – Erasmus+ Expo

The event's primary aim was to increase students' willingness to participate in mobility programmes. Students who had already completed their mobility presented their experiences, and international coordinators explained the different mobility programmes and the application process.

23 February 2022 – Ambassadors' Forum at Ludovika: France

France, then holding the rotating Presidency of the Council of the European Union, was represented at the traditional Ambassadors' Forum at Ludovika organised by the International Directorate of the University of Public Service. The guest of the evening, held at the Ludovika Main Building, was the French Ambassador in Budapest, Pascale Andréani, who spoke about the Presidency's agenda and the current challenges of the European Union (EU).

04-05 April 2022 – EUSecure Transnational Project Meeting

On 4-5 April, the UPS organised a transnational project meeting for the EUSecure Project and hosted the representatives of project partners from Piraeus University (Greece), the Salento University (Italy), Sapientia University (Romania) and – in an on-line form – the University Fernando Pessoa (Portugal). The meeting served to discuss key milestones and issues related to the project, but also to provide the opportunity for the project participants to meet finally in person after 18 months of online cooperation.

05 April 2022 – EUSecure Info Day

On 5 April 2022, the EUSecure Info Day – an international conference – was held at the University of Public Service. The EUSecure project – with consortium partners from Italy, Portugal, Romania, Greece and Hungary – aims to make European youth, university and high school students, and future intellectuals in general aware of the diverse security challenges Europe is facing and to help them prepare for taking the right decisions in the future. The conference – just like the EUSecure Project itself – embraced a variety of topics, from traditional military security to climate security, from linguistic resilience to the global megatrends shaping the international system.

06 April 2022 – Ambassadors' Forum at Ludovika: Israel

His Excellency Yacov Hadas-Handelsman, the Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary of the State of Israel to Hungary, was the guest of the Ambassadors' Forum at Ludovika on 6 April. His presentation focused on the upcoming challenges of both his country and the European Union and the transformation of the rapidly changing international political scene.

07 April 2022 – UPS has expanded its international relations with another partner institution

A Memorandum of Understanding was signed to establish the cooperation between the Asian Institute of Technology (AIT) and the University of Public Service. The signing ceremony of the Memorandum took place online. In the name of UPS, Boglárka Koller, Vice-Rector for International Affairs, signed the Memorandum in the presence of Bernadett Antal, Head of the International Office, professor András Szöllősi-Nagy and professor Imre Miklós János. Rector Eden Y. Woon represented the AIT. This cooperation aims, among others, to develop dual degrees and joint degrees for master's and doctor's programs, exchange technical information and materials for education, research, and commercialisation purposes, depending on the available resources, or co-organise training courses, workshops, and conferences.

30 April 2022 – UPS students from abroad in the footsteps of Sisi

On 30 April 2022, the international students of the University paid a visit, organised by the International Office, to the Grassalkovich Castle in Gödöllő, one of the largest baroque castles in Hungary.

15 May 2022 – The history of the United Nations Association of Hungary is the history of Hungary

Prof. Gergely Deli, Rector of the University of Public Service, and Ambassador Katalin Bogay, President of the United Nations Association of Hungary (UNA-H) and former President of the UNESCO General Assembly, signed a Memorandum of Understanding. The agreement aims to establish joint professional, and working relations in education, research and career guidance between the two institutions. The ceremonial signature took place in the John Lukacs Lounge of the Ludovika Side Building on 12 May. Besides

Ambassador Bogay and Rector Deli, Boglárka Koller, Vice-Rector for International Affairs, Miklós Lengyel, Deputy Secretary of State for International Training Programmes at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade and László Lovász, Ministerial Commissioner, Secretary-General of UNA-H and Senior Research Fellow of UPS, gave speeches.

16-22 May 2022 – New Prospects for UPS Internationalisation in India

Boglárka Koller, vice-rector for International Affairs, and Tibor Bíró, dean of the Faculty of Water Sciences, visited India upon the invitation of and organised by the Hungarian Embassy in New Delhi between 16 and 22 May. Thanks to the fruitful negotiations, a Memorandum of Understanding was signed to establish cooperation between Marwadi University of India and the University of Public Service on 7th June 2022 at UPS.

19-20 May 2022 – DISPA meeting 2022

The annual meeting of the Directors of Institutes and Schools of Public Administration (DISPA) took place in Paris from 19 to 20 May 2022, at which Bernadett Antal, head of the International Office, represented the University.

07 June 2022 – Stipendium Hungaricum conference

On 7 June 2022, vice-rector for international affairs Boglárka Koller attended a round table discussion on the topic of the internationalisation efforts of the Hungarian Universities. In total, three Universities and the Tempus Public Foundation were represented, by Anita Pelle from the University of Szeged (SZE), Anna Kadrova from Eötvös Loránd University (ELTE) and Gábor Dobos, director of the Tempus Public Foundation (TPF).



15 June 2022 – New paths to internationalisation: Morocco and SNSPA

On 15 June 2022, Boglárka Koller, vice-rector for international affairs, welcomed H.E. Karima Kabbaj, Ambassador of the Kingdom of Morocco to Hungary. The meeting aimed to raise diplomatic relations between the two countries to an academic level. On the same day, Boglárka Koller greeted Liliana Popescu, vice-rector of the Romanian National University of Political Science and Public Administration (SNSPA).

20 June 2022 – Vice-rector's visit to the Embassy of South-Korea

On 20 June 2022, H.E. Park Chul Min, Ambassador of South Korea, hosted Boglárka Koller, Vice-Rector for International Affairs, at the embassy residence of South Korea.

23-24 June 2022 – Freedom, Subsidiary and the Spirit of Gift – International conference in the UPS

As the result of almost two years of successful planning and execution, the University of Public Service (UPS) hosted and co-organised the conference Freedom, Subsidiary and the Spirit of Gift, the twelfth international conference on catholic social thought and business education; and the eighth colloquium on Christian humanism in business and society, with the University of St. Thomas, Minnesota, USA, between 23 and 24 June 2022. The conference's costs were financed by the project TKP2020-NKA-09, "Sustainable Security and Social Environment".

17-22 July 2022 – EUSecure summer university in Lecce, Italy

Between July 17 and 22, joining another 40 international students, 10 Hungarian students and several lecturers of the University of Public Service participated in the EUSecure Pilot Course – a summer university in Lecce, southern Italy. The event was financed by the European Union as part of the EUSecure Project implemented within the framework of the Erasmus+ Strategic Partnership in Higher Education programme.

28-29 July 2022 – Organization of Turkic States Human Resources Meeting

Between the 28 and 29th of July 2022, Bernadett Antal, Head of the International Office of the Ludovika – University of Public Service, participated in the first Human Resources Meeting of the Organisation of Turkic States

31 July 2022 – Rákóczi Association diaspora delegation visit at UPS

The International Office welcomed the delegation of the Diaspora Programme, organised by the Rákóczi Association, to the University of Public Service on 31st July 2022. At the meeting, Éva Dudás presented the activities and international relations of the university, with special attention to the Stipendium Hungaricum and Diaspora Scholarship. This was followed by a detailed campus tour of the university, led by Ms Panna Ványi.

12 August 2022 – The Jean Monnet Project of UPS at Sziget Festival 2022

As the Jean Monnet Chair of the bEU project, Boglárka Koller, PhD (Head of Department of European Studies, Vice Rector for International Affairs of UPS) had the opportunity to participate in an exciting roundtable discussion at the SZIGET Festival – one of Europe's largest music and cultural events in Europe – with Mátyás Maksi, acting head of the Representation of the European Commission in Budapest.



12.2. INTERNATIONAL EVENTS ORGANISED BY THE FACULTY OF PUBLIC GOVERNANCE AND INTERNATIONAL STUDIES

2. September 2021: Orientation Day

In accordance with tradition, the semi-annual informational event, called an Orientation Day, was held by the International Department of the Faculty of Public Governance and International Studies for the Erasmus+ scholarship students in the 2021-2022 Autumn Semester. The event was opened by the new Dean of the Faculty, Gergely Deli, who warmly greeted the students at the Faculty. He highlighted the character-shaping role of foreign part-time studies, emphasised Ludovika's role in combining tradition and modernity, which will certainly affect anyone who turns up on campus and states that whoever once studied here will certainly be a "Ludovician" for the rest of his life.

Following the opening ceremony, Vice-Dean for International Affairs Péter Krisztián Zachar, guided the students through the history of the University and the structure of the Faculty, mentioning topics which are about to be held through the foreign language courses and the courses offered this semester, and briefly informed them about the sport and recreational opportunities on the Campus.

25. October 2021: Bulgaria, EU and diplomacy as seen by the Ambassador

At the invitation of the International and European Studies College, one of the faculty's professional student colleges, Christo Polendakov, Bulgaria's Ambassador to Hungary, visited the Faculty. The Ambassador's presentation covered the everyday work of the ambassadorial post, gave an insight into the behind-the-scenes secrets and difficulties, and then also touched upon Hungarian-Bulgarian diplomatic relations and the current challenges facing the EU.

3. November 2021: Romanian delegation to visit the Faculty

A high-ranking Romanian delegation visited the Faculty of Public Governance and International Studies on 3rd November, which was of particular interest to the teaching and research activities of our faculty, in particular to certain current developments in administrative law, the legislative process of the General Administrative Procedure Act, the Code of Administrative Court Procedure and the experience of law enforcement. The delegation was welcomed at the Faculty by Dean Gergely Deli. He emphasised the peculiarities of the university and the faculty, which can be of particular interest to all guests. One of these is the search for synergies between certain branches of public service education in the broadest sense. This is complemented by the university's mission to strive for a harmonious balance between past traditions, current challenges and future opportunities, as well as to provide good service that establishes good governance and reflects a student-friendly attitude.

The delegation, which was led by the Ministry of Public Works, Development and Administration of Romania and included more than 20 representatives of the Romanian Ministry of Justice, local authorities and several universities, was not only received during its stay in Budapest by the Hungarian Ministry of Justice, but also by the capital's local government and several public institutions.

19. November 2021: The Day of Hungarian Diplomacy was celebrated

In 2012, the Hungarian government decided to celebrate the diplomatic profession on 19 November, a symbolic date that reflects both the past and the present: the 1335 Visegrad meeting of the Visegrad Council and the importance of the Visegrad cooperation launched after the change of regime. Every year, the Faculty of Public Governance and International Studies organises a conference to mark the occasion, featuring the thoughts of practitioners.

In her welcome speech, the State Secretary of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade, responsible for the Hungarian Diplomatic Academy and the Stipendium Hungaricum Programme, stressed that "on the Day of Hungarian Diplomacy, we remember the friendships and alliances that have been decisive in Hungarian history." Among other things, Orsolya Pacsay-Tomassich spoke about the background to this important date, pointing out that the Visegrád countries are linked not only by their common past, but also by their broad common interests. Referring to the current Hungarian presidency of the V4, the State Secretary outlined the main goal: "in the changed situation caused by the pandemic, the Visegrad Four must be among the winners of the global economic changes." In defining diplomacy, Orsolya Pacsay-Tomassich pointed out that it is a complex concept, but that the institution of diplomacy should always be expected to represent the interests of the citizens of a given state. "Overall, diplomacy is a tool that helps to resolve conflicts between states, thus contributing to the prosperity and security of a given region," she said. The State Secretary mentioned the Diplomatic Training and Diplomatic Leadership Training Programmes of the Hungarian Diplomatic Academy, which she hoped would contribute to Hungary's success in foreign trade and foreign policy by providing up-to-date and internationally competitive training. She added: "Our goal is to make Hungarian diplomacy a key factor in the Central European region," strengthening the common identity of the region.



7-8. December 2021: The challenges of globalisation conference

Researchers from Ludovika – UPS were invited to present at the “Challenges of Globalisation in Public Administration” – an online conference organised by the Lomonosov Moscow State University (MSU) on the 7th and 8th of December. The main themes of the conference were focused on the phenomenon of deglobalisation and its economic, political and cultural processes, as well as the social impact of digitalisation and global pandemics. Norbert Kis, Vice Rector for Institutional Development of UPS, spoke about the impact of digital communication in transforming public administration. László Lovász, Márton Gellén, Kitti Pollák, and Péter Koronváry, members of the Faculty of Public Governance and International Studies, participated in a roundtable discussion on the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on national governance and public administration.

7. December 2021: First International Christmas

In preparation for the holidays, the International Christmas Evening was organised on 7 December 2021 by the International Committee of the Student Council of the Faculty of Public Governance and International Studies, the International and European Studies College and the Erasmus Student Network. Guests studying at the Faculty in an exchange program were welcomed with mulled wine and, of course, Hungarian sweets, while the Hungarian students were introduced to French, Kazakh, Turkish and Italian cuisine, among others. All foreign students also received a Santa Claus package with the help of the International Department of the Faculty. As the ceremony progressed, the singing was accompanied by a ukulele and lots of fun.

2. February 2022: Orientation Day

In accordance with tradition, the semi-annual informational event, called Orientation Day was held by the International Division of the Faculty of Public Governance and International Studies for the Erasmus+ scholarship students in the 2021-2022

Spring Semester. The event was opened by the International Vice-Dean, Péter Krisztián Zachar. He presented the history and structure of the University and the Faculty, the topics taught and the foreign language programmes, as well as the courses offered this semester. He described the professional, sports and recreational opportunities provided by the campus. This was followed by video messages from teachers, in which they greeted students and talked about their foreign language subject being taught and the topics they were researching. The international committee of the faculty's Students' Union described its activities and members, after which the staff answered students' questions.

16 March 2022: Outlines of possible future cooperation with Latvia

Gunārs Kūtris, former President of the Constitutional Court of the Republic of Latvia and Acting Director of the Department of the Criminal Sciences of the Faculty of Law at the University of Latvia, visited Ludovika-UPS to exchange ideas on future cooperation possibilities. Mr. Kūtris was welcomed by two of the Faculties, the Faculty of Public Governance and International Studies and the Faculty of Law Enforcement to discuss the opportunities for their further cooperation and exchange some experiences in the field of Law. During the meeting, the Head of the Department introduced the current situation and the special characteristics of legal education at the University of Latvia, especially the general training profile of the Faculty of Law, including specific aspects of constitutional law, criminal law and law enforcement. On behalf of the Department of Constitutional and Comparative Law, Iván Halász, Head of the Department, presented the educational and research activities of the Faculty of Public Governance and International Studies related to constitutional law. Miklós Hollán, Associate Professor of the Department of Criminal Law at the Faculty of Law Enforcement, also analysed the educational and research activities of his Faculty related to criminal law, including the various issues of international criminal cooperation and transnational criminal law.



4. May 2022: Extraordinary foreign policy masterclass with the Ambassador of Ireland

The Ambassador of Ireland to Hungary, His Excellency Ronan Gargan, gave a guest lecture to Hungarian and international students at the University on 4 May 2022. The Ambassador, who was appointed in 2019, gave a 90-minute presentation on Ireland's foreign policy, including its development in the 20th century and current priorities, such as climate change policy and dealing with the consequences of Brexit. Ronan Gargan was welcomed by Dr Péter Krisztián Zachar, Deputy Dean for International Affairs and Head of the Department of International Relations and Diplomacy. In his short welcome speech, he stressed that Irish-Hungarian relations have always been characterised by a sense of historical common destiny and mutual cultural interest. The two countries can rightly learn from each other, given that they share a common foreign policy toolbox, including the promotion of international cooperation and foreign economic relations, as well as cultural diplomacy and support for communities abroad. At the end of the lecture, the audience asked the Ambassador many questions, including about the opportunities for Irish-Hungarian cooperation and Irish cultural diplomacy. In concluding his presentation, Ronan Gargan stressed that the main objective of Irish foreign policy is to preserve Irish national identity and Ireland's international reputation in a rapidly changing international order, to support effective multilateralism and to remain at the heart of the European Union.

9 May 2022: Europe Day

Europe exists in a changing global economic and political environment; the celebration is bittersweet because of war. Still, the crisis holds the potential for a continental rebirth – which was expressed at the Europe Day Conference in the Széchenyi Assembly Hall on the 72nd anniversary of the declaration of the Schuman Plan, which laid the foundations of the European Union, which Hungary joined 18 years ago. The conference speakers presented the journey Hungary has taken since 2004, the challenges of today and the EU's future.

As a member of the Western alliance of values and interests, Hungary's task is to play an active role in shaping the future of the European Union, and the anniversary is an opportunity to take stock and plan for the future. “Just like Hungary, our university is openly embracing its European identity, representing the traditional values of European culture and believing in the importance of preserving them”, Rector Gergely Deli opened the conference. According to the Rector of the University of Public Service, what makes us European is our history, respect for fundamental human rights, gender equality, and freedom of expression. He declared that integration was the guarantee of peace and has evolved into cooperation, but now, with war raging in our neighbourhood, this must be followed by action.

“The desire for peace has returned to Europe as a fundamental need,” said Boglárka Koller, Vice-Rector for International Affairs. In her view, the current conflict shows that Europe is unable to extend its values beyond its borders, which is due to the lack of a standard foreign policy. The conflict has also broken the cohesion of Visegrád cooperation. We will not forget 24 February 2022, and “looking back, we will know that Europe and the European Union have reached a real epochal threshold”, said Boglárka Koller. She added that, in these times, culture, faith and identity give hope to the continent and that the crisis holds the potential for rebirth so, despite the circumstances, there is reason to celebrate Europe.

“Europe is declining, but it always survives”, said János Martonyi, referring to the most successful process in the continent's millennial history, the extraordinary story of European integration. “There is no more time to wait; Europe must create its own security and defence dimension, with all its elements”, said János Martonyi, who argued for the concept of strategic autonomy for the standard foreign, security and defence policy. All this must be built not against NATO but within the framework of North Atlantic cooperation. In addition, the creation of the single market must be completed, efforts to undermine it must be rejected, and ideological aspects that spill over into daily politics must be taken off the agenda.



12-13 May 2022: Global Conference on Parliamentary Studies

The Global Conference on Parliamentary Studies was held at the University of Public Service (UPS) on 12-13 May 2022. The two-day international event, which brought together researchers and students studying parliamentarism for the sixth time, was opened on 12 May by Gergely Deli, Rector of the UPS. In his greeting, he emphasised that the University had permanently attached great importance to scientific efforts focused on democracy and the principles of the rule of law and international cooperation. The speakers of this year's conference are truly global: they represented 15 countries from 4 continents. The issues of the contributions show a wide range of the most recent results of parliamentary research, covering the limits of legislative power, supranationalism, democratic decay, the COVID-crises and many more.

31. May 2022: Diversity Day of the Faculty

Just before finishing the Spring Semester of the 2021/2022 Academic Year, a Diversity Day was held by the International Committee of the Student's Union at the Faculty of Public Governance and International Studies for its international students. It was a good opportunity to loosen up a bit during the exam period and get to know each other better. The purpose of the event was to unite foreign and Hungarian students so they could share their mobility experiences here at Ludovika – UPS or abroad. They also had the possibility to swap useful information before deciding on their next destinations. The event took place in the area of the popular 'Chill Zone' where the students also had a chance to try different board games while sipping some refreshing drinks and having some international snacks.

4-15 July 2022: The 10th Minority Rights Summer School at Ludovika

The Global Minority Rights Summer School (<https://mrss.uni-nke.hu/>) this year was opened on 4 July 2022 and held its closing session on 15 July. The program reached a milestone, as it was the 10th minority rights summer school organised by Ludovika – University of Public Service and the Tom Lantos Institute. Due to the lasting impacts of the COVID19 pandemic on international travel, this year the GMRSS was still organised in an online format in cooperation with the Human Rights Consortium (School of Advanced Study, University of London), the Minority Rights Group International and, for the first time in the history of the summer school, in partnership with the Addis-Ababa University School of Law. On the occasion of the 30th anniversary of the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Persons Belonging to National or Ethnic, Religious and Linguistic Minorities, the GMRSS Summer School brought together internationally-known experts, activists, policy makers, civil society representatives, academics, and other key stakeholders in a two-week interactive programme. Among the keynote speakers on the two-week program, Fernand de Varennes, UN Special Rapporteur on Minority Affairs, Alexandra Xanthaki, UN Special Rapporteur on cultural rights, and Lóránt Vincze MEP, president of the Federal Union of European Nationalities, offered insightful presentations. This year 21 participants from 14 countries and 4 continents joined the GMRSS.

12.3. INTERNATIONAL EVENTS ORGANISED BY THE FACULTY OF MILITARY SCIENCE AND OFFICER TRAINING

January 2020 – Guest Teach-in at Sapientia in the framework of the Makovecz Programme

At the Sapientia University of Transylvania, the Faculty of Military Science and Military Officer Training performed online teaching tasks by teaching a full course within the framework of the Makovecz Programme. As part of the Makovecz Student Scholarship Programme, in January 2020, students from the university's colleges had the opportunity to participate in professional academic programmes at the faculties of Cluj-Napoca, Târgu Mures and Miercurea.

June 2020 – Signature of an MoU for the Multinational Land Forces (MLF)

A draft Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) for the Multinational Land Forces (MLF) to organise cooperation better was finalised and signed by the Commander of the MLF and the Heads of the Universities in June 2020. In January 2020, taking advantage of the cooperation opportunity, faculty members had participated, at the invitation of the Commander, in the pre-deployment mission training of the Juliet Mountain Brigade in Afghanistan, which was highly appreciated by the Italian side.

May 2021 – Adriatic Strike 2021 International Exercise in Slovenia

The third and fourth-year military officer candidates of the Faculty of Military Science and Military Officer Training, Military Leadership, Rifle Course of the University of Public Service, accompanied by their instructors, participated with 34 participants in the Adriatic Strike 2021 international NATO all-force exercise in Slovenia from 15 to 22 May. The exercise was conducted in parallel at several locations, where the participating countries' air and ground forces jointly performed various training exercises. The objective of the exercise was to complete and validate the annual JTAC (Joint Terminal Attack Controller) military reconnaissance exercise. In this, the officer candidates participated as assault forces, which allowed the JTAC soldiers to practice tracking and supporting ground elements in combat. The Hungarian soldiers represented a light rifle platoon force, in which the command positions were held by the fourth-year Honvéd officer candidates, as this training exercise also served as a final examination for them. The international environment provided an excellent opportunity to develop foreign language skills further, as the JTAC soldiers were only allowed to communicate with the officer candidates in English, and to practice requesting and directing air support, air rescue and artillery fire.

12.4. INTERNATIONAL EVENTS ORGANISED BY FACULTY OF LAW ENFORCEMENT

9 December 2020 – International Scientific Conference “The Impact of the Digital World on the Leadership Management Process of Law Enforcement Agencies”

The international online conference was organised by the Department of Law Enforcement Leadership Management and the Hungarian Law Enforcement Scientific Association. The main topics were the possibilities of working from home for law enforcement officers; good practices in working digitally; the current and future possibilities in the field of artificial intelligence and the characteristics of the leadership management system during digital work. The lecturers were professors from the Hungarian host department and international lecturers from the Police Education and Training Unit of the Police of the Czech Republic, from the Academy of the Police Force in Bratislava (Slovakia) and from the 'Alexandru Ioan Cuza' Police Academy in Bucharest (Romania).

11-13 December 2020 – INTERPA General Council Meeting and 9th Annual Conference “Challenges of Police Academies for the Near Future”

The International Association of Police Academies (INTERPA) held the 9th Annual INTERPA Conference with the title ‘Challenges of Police Academies for the Near Future between’ on 11-13 December 2020 via the Zoom platform. Police Brigadier General Gábor Kovács, department chair of the Faculty of Law Enforcement, delivered a presentation with the title “The New Methods of and Appropriate Answers to the near Future Challenges of Hungarian Law Enforcement Bachelor’s and Master’s Education. The University of Public Service’s application for membership was approved by the members of the council at the meeting.

26 April 2022 – II. Fire Engineering & Disaster Management Pre-recorded International Scientific Conference

The Faculty of Law Enforcement, together with the online Journal Védelem (Protection), organised an online conference, in which a total of 89 speakers (21 foreign, 68 Hungarian) participated. The event featured 54 presentations in 5 different sections (fire engineering; fire protection; firefighting and rescue operation management; disaster management; and safety and security). The primary goal of the conference was to present the current scientific research in the field of fire engineering and other areas of fire protection. Most of the presentations targeted fire protection, but there were also several presentations focusing on certain aspects of disaster management and safety.

12.5. INTERNATIONAL EVENTS ORGANISED BY THE FACULTY OF WATER SCIENCES

7- 10 July 2020 – 10th Conference on Fluvial Hydraulics, River Flow 2020

The Faculty of Water Sciences participated at the 10th conference on Fluvial Hydraulics, River Flow 2020, organised under the auspices of the Committee on Fluvial Hydraulics of the International Association for Hydro-Environment Engineering and Research (IAHR) by IHE Delft, Netherlands, on 7-10 July. 2020. The conference was held online and Ludovika gave two presentations.

3 December 2020 – 9th HydroCarpath International Conference

The conference was organised around the topic “Processes, patterns and regimes in the hydrology of the Carpathians: coupling experiments, remote sensing, citizen science and modelling”. The event was organised jointly by the Slovak University of Technology in Bratislava, Slovakia, the University of Sopron, Hungary, the Vienna University of Technology, Austria, the Vienna Doctoral Programme on Water Resource Systems and the University of Natural Resources and Life Sciences, Vienna, Austria.

April 2021 – EGU General Assembly 2021

The Faculty of Water Sciences participated and held a presentation at the online EGU 2021 General Assembly that took place on 19-30 April. 2021. The EGU General Assembly 2021 brought together geoscientists from all over the world to one meeting covering all disciplines of earth, planetary, and space sciences. The EGU aims to provide a forum where scientists, especially early career researchers, can present their work and discuss their ideas with experts in all fields of geoscience.

April 2021 – DAREFFORT Final Conference

The Faculty of Water Sciences participated in the DAREFFORT Final Conference and 6th Periodic Project Meeting, and the 2nd Danube Forecasting Forum (DAFF). This conference consisted of three parts: the DAREFFORT Final Conference was a public event to demonstrate and exhibit the major achievements of the DAREFFORT project; the 6th Periodic Project Meeting, with SAB and SCOM meetings comprised sessions exclusively for DAREFFORT project partners and associated partners; and the 2nd Biennial Danube Forecasting Forum (DAFF) was a public conference about the status and developments of flood and ice forecasting in the Danube basin.





12.6. INTERNATIONAL EVENTS ORGANISED BY THE EÖTVÖS JÓZSEF RESEARCH CENTRE

Institute of Central European Studies (KEKI)

6 November 2020 – ASEEEES Convention

The Institute of Central European Studies (KEKI) took part in the 2020 international “virtual” ASEEEES Convention on 6 November 2020. The Convention’s central theme was Anxiety and Rebellion. The research team from KEKI joined the Convention with their own panel on urban history: “Cities between History and Memory in post-1989 Central Europe: The Examples of Budapest, Košice, and Western Romania”. The chair of the panel was director Pál Hatos, and Róbert Balogh participated as discussant. Pál Hatos presented his paper “From the City in Revolution to the City of Evil: The Memory of 1918–1919 Budapest”, Veronika Szeghy-Gayer focused on “Politics of Memory and Local Identity in Post-1989 Košice, Slovakia”, and Csaba Zahorán presented his paper called ‘Towns in captivity’: Transformation of the Towns of Transylvania in the Interwar Period: The Hungarian Point of View”. ASEEEES is a constituent society of the American Council of Learned Societies, the National Council of Area Studies Associations, and the Coalition for International Education. ASEEEES was a founding member of the International Council for Central and East European Studies and is housed at the University of Pittsburgh in the United States of America.

January 2021 – Launch of the English language journal Central European Horizons

The Institute of Central European Studies launched a new, electronic, international English language journal Central European Horizons at the beginning of 2021. The authors and editors had been working for months to give the journal a new shape that enables the Institute to expand its scope and potential reach. It also earned a DOI identifier that will make the Institute’s presence permanent. Central European Horizons appeared in the EPA electronic database.

22 February 2021 – Roundtable Discussion on Researching the Environment

Research fellow Róbert Balogh organised the Institute of Central European Studies’ first English-speaking online ‘round table discussion’ that addressed the possible ways of researching the environment. He invited three speakers from different areas of expertise and from three Central European countries, Daniela Neubacher from the Institute for the Danube Region and Central Europe (Vienna), Miha Kozorog from the University of Ljubljana, and András Vadas from the Loránd Eötvös University in Budapest. The title of the event was “Green Danube? What else?” and took place 22 February 2021.

15–16 April 2021 – international conference “Crossing the Lines between Marxism and Christianity in 20th Century East/Central Europe”

Director Pál Hatos participated in the online international conference “Crossing the Lines between Marxism and Christianity in 20th Century East/Central Europe,” organised by the Institute for Historical Studies (in Slovenia) on 15–16 April 2021. The title of his presentation was “The French Connection”.

29–31 May 2021 – Online Conference of the Hungarian Studies Association of Canada

Senior research fellow Miklós Mitrovits took part in the annual international online conference titled “Hungary: Northern Relations,” held by the Hungarian Studies Association of Canada on 29–31 May 2021. The panel’s Title was Polish-Hungarian Relations in the Era of Late Socialism. Miklós Mitrovits gave a presentation entitled Polish-Hungarian Relations in Opposition (1976–1989).

Institute of Cybersecurity

February 2021 – Book launch: Information and cybersecurity

The information society created by the socio-economic changes caused by digitalization presents new types of challenges, both at the individual level and at the national or global level. In addition to the positive benefits of data-driven processes, accelerated technological development and innovation, it is fraught with many threats that must be addressed to be effective at all levels of life. On the topic of information and cybersecurity, this study reviews the different dimensions of R&D and an innovative ecosystem, the theoretical (regulatory) and practical aspects of critical information infrastructures, the role of international institutions, and the importance of data protection law and the consequences of the platform economy. In the second half of the volume, cyber diplomacy is presented as an emerging field of research and discusses basic concepts and theoretical debates and their role in international relations (with concrete examples) and the foreign economy.

This volume also exemplifies how the Institute of Cybersecurity of the Eötvös Research Centre is building an unparalleled knowledge base and continuing the information and cybersecurity research activities of Hungarian higher education using the most robust social science approach. The work is available on the Knowledge Portal of the University of Public Administration, with 12 studies in Hungarian and 6 in English.

December 2020 – Cybersecurity Handbook for Industrial Control Systems in Electricity

The book, published in December 2020 by the Special Service for National Security, National Cybersecurity Centre, is the first significant product of the SeConSys (Security for Control Systems) collaboration. The Hungarian Electrotechnical Association and the University of Public Service brought together 20 experts to cover this niche topic, recommended to companies and organisations involved in the subject. One of the SeConSys collaboration coordinators is Dr. Csaba Krasznay, head of the Institute of Cybersecurity.

24 February 2021 – Lessons from the Solarwinds case – the state of play of the Russian-American cyber-strategy game in early 2021

US security firm FireEye announced in mid-December 2020 that its IT system had been attacked, in which, among many other state and non-state companies, Microsoft was also involved. The event, organized by the Institute of Cybersecurity, invited participants to analyse the events, clarify the technical parameters and summarise the policy options.

Talent development and youth education at the Institute of Cybersecurity

Mentoring talented students has been one of the main priorities of the Institute of Cybersecurity. As a result, our students won many distinguished awards this year: In June 2021, the US-based Second Annual White Hat Conference took place virtually with a Cybercrime Investigation Competition organised by the Boston University Metropolitan College’s Cybercrime Investigation & Cybersecurity programme. Students of the University of Public Service won first place in a strong field.



In the 7th Cyber 9/12 Challenge held in Geneva on 11–12 May 2021, our students faced a gradually escalating cyber crisis in Europe, presenting policy proposals to a panel of expert judges. The TalTech-UPS joint team (Tal-UPS) finished in second place, while the individual UPS team received the “Most Creative Response” award among groups of the world’s highest-ranking universities. Many of our students were accredited to the XXXV. National Scientific Students’ Associations Conference, where the two first prizes and one second and one thirdrd prizes, and many special awards were presented.

Motivated students participated in the Cybersecurity Hackathon on 2–4 October 2020 organised at the UPS with Hungarian universities and market participants, such as the OXO Cybersecurity Lab.



October 2020 – European Cybersecurity Month at the UPS

Based on our traditions, the European Cybersecurity Month series of events, supported by the ENISA and the European Commission, was organised at the University of Public Service by the Institute of Cybersecurity. In 2020, workshops and roundtable discussions were held online on digital skills and cyber-hygiene, online threats and the cybersecurity of autonomous vehicles.

15 June 2021 – China’s Quest for Foreign Technology – online book launch

The Institute of Cybersecurity, together with the American Studies Research Institute, organised an online book launch of “China’s Quest for Foreign Technology: Beyond Espionage” on June 2021 with Didi Kirsten Tatlow, co-editor and co-author of the book, published in 2021 (Routledge). She is a senior fellow in the Asia Programme at the German Council of Foreign Relations (DGAP) in Berlin, Germany, and a Senior Non-Resident Fellow in Projekt Sinopsis in Prague, Czech Republic.



American Studies Research Institute

Roundtable discussions on the US situation

The American Studies Research Institute has launched online roundtable discussions many times to evaluate the situation in the US and its presidential elections. Together with associated scholars, experts of the Institute aimed to discuss both domestic and international challenges faced by the US.

Research Institute for Politics and Government

19 March 2022– The Post-Liberal Turn and the Future of British Conservatism

The one-day international conference was organised by Phillip Blond (UPS/ResPublica), Daniel Pitt (UPS/Sheffield University) and Ferenc Hörcher (UPS), in cooperation with the Danube Institute. It served as a final assessment of the three-year research project run at the Research Institute for Politics and Government of the University of Public Service on British conservatism, with Ferenc Hörcher as its project leader. A special circumstance also helped to realise the project: that two visiting research fellows, a senior and a junior one, work this year on this topic as a guest of the institute and the university, respectively.

The aim of the conference was to see the present state of affairs and potential of the conservative movement in Britain. This moment is characterised by two factors: it is a Post-Brexit moment, from the point of view of Britain’s external relationships, and a Post-liberal moment, as far as the internal ideological debate is concerned. Due to these factors, together with further risk factors, including the pandemic, migration crisis and the continental threat resulting from the Russian-Ukrainian conflict, the future of British conservatism seems to be open, and subject to different, often conflicting, interpretations. The conference served as a platform for different assessments of this moment. Its organisation in Budapest gave it a special flavour, as Hungary is in the focus of much conservative attention recently, on an international level. It gave us the opportunity to invite the freshest, mostly British researchers, on this theme to Budapest, in order to let them establish new contacts with Hungarian colleagues.

International events organised by Institute for Strategic Studies

January 2021 – Conference on the occasion of John Lukacs's 97th birth anniversary "Tocqueville, Lukacs and the situation of American Democracy"

The conference was dedicated to the memory of the famous American historian of Hungarian descent, John Lukacs, who died in 2019. At the joint online event of the Institute for Strategic Studies at the University of Public Service and the Otto von Habsburg Foundation, former colleagues and friends also revealed the legacy of John Lukacs through anecdotes and personal stories.

The conference – moderated by Director Gergely Prőhle – was opened by András Koltay, Rector of the University of Public Service. David Contosta, Professor at Chestnut Hill College, a friend and former associate of John Lukacs, spoke about how Lukacs had tried to interpret the past and how he saw human nature. Géza Jeszenszky, a historian and former Hungarian Foreign Minister, reminded the participants that John Lukacs had been present in Hungarian university life since the 1970s. The former foreign minister noted that although Lukacs had lived far from his homeland, he had always been proud of his Hungarian origin. The audience was also able to listen to Ferenc Hörcher, historian and research professor, Máté Botos, historian, Gergely Szilvay, historian and journalist, and Tamás Magyarics, historian, former ambassador and university professor. More than two hundred people – including Professor Lukacs's former students from the US – registered for the conference.

May 2021 – Conference on the occasion of the 30th anniversary of the Visegrad Cooperation "The Role of the Visegrad Cooperation in shaping the Future of Europe"

The last three decades have brought several changes into the life of the V4 countries, but the most important development was that they have become an institutionalised part of the European and Transatlantic cooperation for more than 15 years. As members of the EU and NATO, in the sense of "Central-European togetherness" they toned to find the way to be able to seize the opportunities resulting from the regional cooperation and thus contribute to the success of the European Union.

The conference was opened by Gergely Prőhle, Director of the Institute for Strategic Studies, and Edit Szilágyiné Bátorfi, Ambassador and Executive Director of the International Visegrad Fund. Hubert Védrine, former French Foreign Minister, Jerzy Buzek, former Prime Minister of Poland and MEP of the European Parliament and János Martonyi, former Hungarian Foreign Minister spoke about the importance and the future of the V4 cooperation and about its role in the European Union. Beside the Hungarian audience, there were participants from Poland, France, Germany, United Kingdom, Spain and Bosnia – Herzegovina as well.

September 2021 – Online conversation series "Quo vadis Europe after the German and French elections?"

In September 2021 there will be parliamentary elections in Germany and in April 2022 presidential elections will be held in France. In this context, the online conversation series of the Institute for Strategic Studies was aimed at recalling the developments of the last decades and analysing the trends that are already detectable. The first guest of the conversation series (on 4 June 2021) was Klaus von Dohnanyi, a German politician from the Social Democratic Party (SPD) and former Mayor of Hamburg. At the second event of the online conversation series (on 28 June 2021) Alexander Graf Lambsdorff, a German politician and Deputy Group Chairman of the Free Democratic Party, spoke about current German internal affairs, and the chances of the different political parties three months before the elections.

7 June 2021 "Christianity and Policy Space in the 21st Century"

The discourse on the future of Europe cannot be without a dialogue on the fundamental values of the continent. It was therefore worth recalling the millennial Judeo-Christian tradition and also taking into account how the ideas of the Enlightenment prevail – how the complex phenomenon of modernisation affects churches, denominations, political communities and European society as a whole. The conference was opened by Cirill Hortobágyi OSB, Archbishop of Pannonhalma, and András Koltay, Rector at the University of Public Service. After the introductory speech by Gergely Prőhle, Director of the Institute for Strategic Studies, Cardinal Kurt Koch, President of the Pontifical Council for Promoting Christian Unity, Katalin Novák Minister for Family Affairs, Vice President of the FIDESZ party, Dr Jan Peter Balkenende, former Prime Minister of the Netherlands and Mgr. Matthieu Rougé, Bishop of Nanterre, tried to find answers to the questions above.
